## **Executive Summary**

The Rights, Empowerment and Cohesion for Rural and Urban Fijians (REACH) project outcome is to strengthen and promote sustainable and democratic governance by adopting a peaceful, socially cohesive, and socially inclusive approach. The project duration is June 2015 till June 2018 with a total funded budget of USD 2.685 million. The REACH project will support the Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation and the Legal Aid Commission on the following two components; First, to improve awareness and service delivery to people in urban informal and rural communities in the areas for the Ministry of Women, Children of people's right to social and economic wellbeing; and for the Legal Aid Commission in the area of people's right to justice, focusing on legal aid; and Second, to support research and analysis for evidence based policy making.

The project's outputs are:

Output 1: Capacity Building for Peace Building and Social Cohesion on Democratic Governance, Access to Justice, Rule of Law, Human Rights and Gender Equality.

Output 2: Support Research and Analysis for evidence based policy making.

Output 3: Project Management and effective Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) is applied to enhance project results.

The project employs the following two strategies for meeting its aims; First, improve awareness and service delivery to people in urban informal and rural communities in the areas for the MWCPA of people's rights to social and economic wellbeing, and for the LAC in the area of people's right to justice, focusing on legal aid; and Second, support research and analysis for evidence-based policy making. The overall strategy adopted by the project is summarized in the representation below:



Key developments and achievements during the Inception Period include:

- Project commenced in June 2015. Local Project Appraisal Committee Meeting held on 9 June 2015 and 2015 Annual Work Plan was approved.
- Agreement to conduct project pilot of awareness activities in Northern Division and Joint Scoping Mission undertaken 29 June to 4 July. Consultations undertaken with 17 government stakeholders (Women:5; Men:12) and 145 people (Women:95; Men:50) in all three provinces in Northern, including nine villages and communities in seven districts. Agreement to focus on the development of the mobile teams to raise awareness and service delivery, to commence operation of mobile teams as soon as possible, and to have a series of follow up meetings including development of options paper for transportation options for the mobile teams.
- During period of July to December regular consultations between Project and Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation (31 Jul, 6 Aug, 6 Oct, 13 Oct, 14 Oct and 5 Nov) and Legal Aid Commission (14 Jul, 10 Aug, 8 Sep, 11 Sep, 12 Oct, 19 Nov, 2 Dec, 7 Dec, 10 Dec, and 15 Dec) in Suva on the progress with mobile team outreach services and the transportation options for the mobile teams.

- During the period of July to December meetings (3 Aug, 4 Aug, 10 Sep, 6 Nov, and 17 Nov) in Suva between Project and the Government of Japan on the progress of the project.
- During period of July to December ongoing (generally weekly) consultations between Project and Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation; Legal Aid Commission; and Commissioner Northern teams in Labasa and SavuSavu in relation to the planning and conduct of the pilot mobile services (including 8 missions by project team to Northern Division).
- During period of 14 Sep to 9 Dec there was 17 days of mobile teams outreach in Northern Division and full data on these missions reported in more detail below and in the attached.
- Two day workshop for Lessons learned from the pilot mobile services conducted in Labasa with participation of 32 (Women:20, Men:12) people (including UNDP) comprised of all those involved in the Northern Division mobile teams and also participation of Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation; and Legal Aid Commission teams from Western, Central and Eastern Divisions; and UNDP Team to facilitate commencement of mobile teams activities throughout Fiji in 2016. Commissioner Northern and Director Legal Aid Commission participated in the two day workshop.
- In addition to the pilot mobile services two other key events since project commencement. First, 3 Aug request from Ministry for support to Women's Expo. Discussions then held with Project partners (Government of Japan and Legal Aid Commission) to obtain endorsement to alter Annual Work Plan and how best to link Women's Expo to project objectives. Data on results reported below and in the Annexes. Second, commencement of institutional strengthening support to Legal Aid Commission, through engagement of Consultant to Legal Aid Commission to provide support for development of strategic plan and conduct of functional review.
- Key information-communication materials, including brochures, factsheets and banners, have been developed and disseminated and showcased.

Some of the key challenges and related recommendations are outlined as follows:

- Requirement of baseline data collection and analysis, for which coordination with the MWCPA was advised during the Project Board Meeting (held on 18 December 2015, minutes attached).
- The broad scope of the project design may present a challenge for achieving transformational results. In this relation, initial refinements to activities of the project have been proposed and agreed upon during the Project Board Meeting and will be monitored throughout 2016.
- The need for clearer clarification of one of the key objectives of the project, being gender equality, to be undertaken in the project documentation.

The project's inception period was completed in December 2015 over a six month period. This report describes how the project engaged stakeholders, and achieved its objectives and targets during the Inception Period.

# Project Background

UNDP maintains a successful and track record in supporting Fiji at both the country-level and regional governance-related programming on issues related to parliamentary development, civic education, local governance, human security and youth leadership. Following the return to parliamentary democracy in 2014, opportunities for UNDP's engagement in the field of governance emerged in Fiji. The REACH project addresses the development challenge of strengthening and promoting sustainable and democratic governance through a peaceful, socially cohesive, and socially inclusive approach. The REACH project supports key government agencies in becoming more effective and accountable in their provision of greater transparency and justice through the rule of law (SDG 16), whilst promoting the rights of women (SDG 5) and the youth.

The project primarily works with the MWCPA and the LAC seeking to achieve the following key results:

- Increased awareness in urban informal and rural communities of constitutional rights social and economic wellbeing and justice, focusing on legal aid, through the provision of mobile teams.
- Enhanced delivery of services provided by the MWCPA and the LAC through the provision of mobile teams visiting urban informal and rural communities.
- Strengthened capacity of the MWCPA and the LAC through support to strategic planning, monitoring of results, and support of coordination for effective and coordinated service delivery to urban informal and rural communities.
- Informed policymaking based on evidence through research and analysis on the relevant areas related to empowerment of women and girls, promotion of peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provision of access to justice for all and building effective, accountable and inclusive institutions.

## Project Activities and Progress During the Inception Period

The two outputs targeted in the Inception Period included: Output 1 - Capacity Building for Peace and Social Cohesion on Democratic Governance, Access to Justice, Rule of Law, Human Rights and Gender Equality; and Output 3 - Project Management and effective Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) applied to enhance project results.

In relation to operational start-up issues the decision was made to conduct a pilot of the outreach activities to test the proposed model of service delivery and to inform the design of the mobile service delivery units. Stakeholder identification had already been undertaken as part of the project design, and during the pilot of the outreach activities roles and communications channels were formalised, including arrangements with local area authorities, such as Commissioner Northern. In relation to groups and stakeholders that will benefit from the project, during the Inception Period it was agreed for the project to reach as many Fijians as possible during the project cycle. Noting this, it was discussed to utilise the measure of 'number of districts covered' as a key project target for outreach across Fiji. In Fiji there are 196 Districts that are grouped into 15 Provinces which are administered under 4 Divisions (Northern, Eastern, Central and Western). An evaluation of the project approach was undertaken, as discussed above, and agreed to narrow the scope of the project to focus on the key priority issues of awareness raising and service delivery that have direct and immediate impact on the most vulnerable. It was also noted that the project document had some shortfalls, not fully completed, and this would need to be addressed.

## **Cross Cutting Issues**

### **Gender Mainstreaming**

- Women and men had an almost equal access to mobile services (Women: 464; Men: 507).
- An additional number of women participated through several activities related to the Women's Expo in October 2015 (Women: 78, Men: 1).
- Mobile service delivery varied, dependent upon the agency. Men accessed more legal assistance than women (Women: 66, Men: 103), while women gained more service from the Department of Women (Women: 410; Men: 9). The Department of Social Welfare provided assistance to an almost equal number in both genders (Women: 70, Men: 71).
- The gender gap, in terms of the numbers who received service delivery, can be partially explained by women's comments provided during evaluation. In particular, a small number of women responded that they found difficulties in comprehending and following legal terms and language. Another reason for the uneven number is due to a system of the Department of Women's services of providing assistance

mainly through the Women's Club rather than individual consultations; i.e. providing training and assistance for income generation programmes etc. This resulted in an outcome of a greater number of women than men (details reflected in the data analysis).

- There were no inquiries regarding gender based violence (GBV) during dispensation of mobile services. This can be partly explained due to the mobile services covering inclusive topics and being open to all genders. This open forum modality is considered not a conducive approach for provision of safety and security for women to discuss sensitive issues. However a small group discussion approach was also undertaken, especially with small groups of women, and this will be further adjusted during 2016.
- Project staff can address gender issues through training and advocacy work for stakeholders and communities, if requested. At the same time, it was deemed necessary to coordinate with existing Ministry programmes/projects and that of NGOs to work effectively. Also, it is inevitable to coordinate with and work closely with the Legal Aid Commission, law enforcement officers, and the Government of Fiji to develop provisions and protection policies.
- The support to empowerment of women initiatives was assessed as an important project focus, especially noting the project outreach to community areas. As a result support was agreed under the project to the National Women's Expo, given that it involves women from small communities across all of Fiji.

### Partnerships

As agreed during the Local Project Appraisal Committee Meeting held on 9 June 2015, the REACH project conducted consultations and meetings with key stakeholders in July 2015 and August 2015 to introduce the project, identify needs and possible other stakeholders, as well as roles of each government agency, and logistical arrangements in support of the project to commence pilot mobile services. MWCPA and LAC agreed to provide staff to participate as part of mobile teams for the pilot project, and vehicles of each agency were agreed to be used for mobile services. MWCPA also agreed to provide workspace for UNV personnel to be stationed in the Ministry's Office in Labasa, and for the REACH project to fund furniture and equipment for the pilot phase. The project also coordinated and in majority of cases undertook all logistical and administrative arrangements, including deployment of an advanced team to prepare arrangements with targeted communities. MWCPA and LAC provided awareness sessions and on-the-spot service delivery. UNDP undertook monitoring and evaluation of awareness sessions. UNDP prepared field monitoring reports (using the 'Back to Office Reporting' tool) and consolidated and analysed the detailed data collected during the mobile service delivery.

The Ministry continued working with other UN Agencies including UNICEF for child protection, UN Women for zero tolerance of violence against women, and UNFPA for reproductive health and rights. Additionally, the Ministry also works with NGOs in areas of women's empowerment and protection. The LAC was in consultations with UNDP in relation to the development of a new project, Fiji Access to Justice Project, to be funded by the European Union.

## **Environmental Considerations**

The REACH project was reviewed under the UNDP Social and Environmental Screening procedure and no risks were identified. The project will ensure that with the purchase of the three buses that these are environmental friendly vehicles as agreed upon by the Local Project Appraisal Committee Meeting on 9 June 2015.

## **Changes/Alterations Required**

Based on the Inception Period and initial implementation potential key changes were discussed at the Project Board Meeting on 18 December 2015. The key changes discussed and agreed by the Project Board (minutes attached) related to the issues to narrow the scope of the project (especially noting that since REACH Project was designed other new projects will be commencing in some of these areas and some events such as establishment by the government of Community Legal Centres have not eventuated), to increase visibility of gender equality and empowerment components of the project (such as through support to National Expo) and to reflect such in changed project documents.

In addition, after the Lessons Learned Workshop that took place from 1-2 December 2015, the following were identified as directions for future implementation:

- In terms of the modalities of awareness-raising activity undertaken under REACH, the
  presentations delivered were deemed lengthy. However, the group discussions which
  ensued were interactive and afforded opportunities for participants to activity
  engage and share their experiences, opinions and feedback on different issues under
  consideration. The need for keeping up the morale and interest of participants
  benefitting from the training was also conveyed. Response: Activities has been
  designed to be more interactive, having presentations which encourage dialogue and
  providing practical examples that may be used to facilitate understanding.
- The need to integrate and mainstream gender into all outreach presentations.
   **Response**: Targeted presentations on gender and related issues will be improved and mainstreamed into the project's key areas of work and outreach strategies. In all capacity development activities the subject matter of gender equality and empowerment will be further highlighted.
- There was a suggestion to attempt to further include the relevant decision-makers from the provincial/district level in the outreach missions. **Response**: To the highest extent possible, the relevant stakeholders have been identified and invited to participate. However, owing to the relative remoteness of the field missions sites and limited availability of some officers (due to conflicting schedules), it is difficult to have full participation of all the concerned officials.

## Friday, 18 December 2015 at UNDP Offices, Suva, Fiji

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#### Introduction and Opening

- The Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation opened the meeting by first welcoming the Project Board Members and participants to the first meeting and congratulating the Project on the achievements made over the past six months. The Permanent Secretary advised of the full commitment of the Minister and the Ministry to this project and the importance of taking services out to the people, to delivering services to the disadvantaged, to be empowering women and assisting children. The Permanent Secretary noted the important partnership with the Legal Aid Commission and UNDP and that 2016 needs to be a year of further results, include the delivery of the transportation units for the mobile teams.
- The Director, Legal Aid Commission, advised that as a major partner in this project Legal Aid Commission was happy with the progress made and confirmed that the Legal Aid Commision stands fully committed to do whatever is required to ensure the project activities are successful, and in particular ready to take the project activities to the next level with the commencement of activities throughout Fiji.
- The Government of Japan representative, also welcomed the opportunity to discuss the progress of the project and future plans.
- The Deputy Resident Representative, UNDP, welcomed the Project Board Members, to UNDP for this important meeting, explained the importance of the meeting to review progress made by the project, to undertake planning for 2016, including approval of the Annual Work Plan. Endorsement of the Agenda for the meeting today was obtained from the Project Board Members.

### Project Manager Briefing

The Project Manager provided the following introductory briefing:

- Project commenced in June 2015 with project inception period. Local Project Appraisal Committee Meeting held on 9 June 2015 and 2015 Annual Work Plan was approved.
- Agreement to conduct project pilot of awareness activities in Northern Division and Joint Scoping Mission undertaken 29 June to 4 July. Consultations undertaken with 17 government stakeholders (Women:5; Men:12) and 145 people (Women:95; Men:50) in all three provinces in Northern, including nine villages and communities in seven districts. Agreement to focus on the development of the mobile teams to raise awareness and service delivery, to commence operation of mobile teams as soon as possible, and to have a series of follow up meetings including development of options paper for transportation options for the mobile teams.
- During period of July to December regular consultations between Project and Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation (31 Jul, 6 Aug, 6 Oct, 13 Oct, 14 Oct and 5 Nov) and Legal Aid Commission (14 Jul, 10 Aug, 8 Sep, 11 Sep, 12 Oct, 19 Nov, 2 Dec, 7 Dec, 10 Dec, and 15 Dec) in Suva on the progress with mobile team outreach services and the transportation options for the mobile teams.
- During the period of July to December meetings (3 Aug, 4 Aug, 10 Sep, 6 Nov, and 17 Nov) in Suva between Project and the Government of Japan on the progress of the project.
- During period of July to December ongoing (generally weekly) consultations between Project and Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation; Legal Aid Commission; and

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Commissioner Northern teams in Labasa and SavuSavu in relation to the planning and conduct of the pilot mobile services (including 8 missions by project team to Northern Division).

.

During period of 14 Sep to 9 Dec there was 17 days of mobile teams outreach in Northern Division with the results reported below.

# Better access to justice and services for people of Fiji

20 April 2015

Suva, Fiji – The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the Governments of Fiji and of Japan today launched the Fiji REACH Project to support the Fijian Government's push to improve service delivery to disadvantaged populations, particularly for women, youth, minorities and communities in rural and urban informal settlements.

The Project for Improvement of Access to Social Services on Justice and Gender Related-Issues for All Fijians (REACH: Rights, Empowerment and Cohesion for Rural and Urban Fijians) aims to strengthen sustainable democratic governance by promoting peacebuilding, social cohesion and inclusiveness through raising awareness on equal human rights and domestic violence, creating better access to social services, legal aid and capacity building of people and key governance institutions in Fiji. In doing so the Project aims to provide more effective, accountable and coordinated provision of social services to the poor and those in rural communities at the same time improving their access to justice and rule of law which will promote the rights of women, youth and disadvantaged communities.

This three-year, US\$2.49 million project will be implemented by UNDP in partnership with the Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation, and is generously funded by the Government of Japan.

Minister for Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation, Hon. Rosy Akbar said the REACH Project will be a pathway to expand the reach-out of government services to the rural and maritime communities in Fiji. Hon. Akbar has acknowledged the great support given from the Japanese Government and the United Nations Development Programme for making this project a reality for the communities in Fiji.

"People centred initiative by the Government of Fiji is closely identifies two of the main concepts of Japanese ODA, namely 'Strengthening Human Security' and 'Encouraging Gender Equality' towards building resilient societies.
