a) Rationale for this project:

The Mano River Union (MRU) is an intergovernmental organization which aims to strengthen the capacity of Member States to integrate their economies and coordinate development programs. Covering four West African countries, Guinea, Ivory Coast, Sierra Leone and Liberia, the organization was born in 1973 from the need to coordinate Development programs in all aspects of economic and social life of the Member States.

The EVD erupted to be another common issue for this West African sub-region and UN Agencies proposes this project for supporting MRUs activities in districts (prefectures) located at the frontiers with Sierra Leone and Liberia. MRU is member of the central committee of the National Coordination Unit (Cellule Nationale de Reponse, NCU), under the direct guidance of the President of Guinea.

The project aims to focus on two levels of intervention:

 At the national level the MRU will serve to conduct advocacy and lobbying activities towards a regional integration in the fight against EVD. At the same time, MRU will be instrumental in gathering political and leadership support in promoting social cohesion, preventing political strife and coordinating efforts at parliament and cabinet levels.

Promotion of social cohesion will be done through conduction of social and educational activities at community level, including sport events, social gatherings, and house by house visits.

Prevention of political strife will be done by MRU leadership at national, district and town levels, through political meetings and radio debates.

At the field level and in close alliance UN agencies and government actors in the field, MRU will conduct sanitary and training activities through the TRUs, aimed at reestablishing social cohesion and promoting prevention and positive social attitudes. These activities will be held in coordination with UNDP's, UNICEF and UNFPA's regional offices, which will be crucial in ensuring project quality and delivery.

The field activities of the CBU will have the following axis:

- Support the Community Watch Committees in aspects concerning trans-frontier movement, security, ethnic cohesion, de-stigmatization of Ebola patients and their families.
- MRU, through its community based networks, will organize training and sensitization sessions focused on Ebola prevention. Special attention will be given to networks of motorcyclists, market women and driver's unions, as MRU and UNDP/UNFPA/UNICEF considers these networks as crucial partners in tracing and identification of new EVD cases.
- MRU jointly with UNFPA/UNDP/UNICEF personnel will organize training sessions for women, in the most affected EVD regions. At the same time, the project will provide start-up microcredits to these women in order to mitigate the economic impact of the epidemic.

 Media involvement, by organizing radio activities including the dissemination of NCU messages and conduction of radio debates and programming.

 Social mobilization, by organizing sport events and trans-frontier ethnic cultural gatherings.

Jointly with specialized microfinance agencies, UNDP, UNFPA and UNICEF will distribute 400 USD to affected families and women using local microfinance mechanisms already established in the project areas. The amount of 400 USD was determined by the microfinance agencies at the national level, and will be used accordingly to established and proved protocols. Selection of loan recipients, consequently, will be done by these microfinance agencies, and UNDP will supervise procedures to ensure they are properly followed.

As the EVD has no frontiers and has intensely affected the three countries, the role of MRU is critical in coordinating initiatives in the Guinean frontier region. At the same time the project addresses one of the consequences of EVD in the region: the disruption of relationships at community level, as the EVD creates tensions and stops trading and relationships between them. This social tension has caused riots and unrest, as rumors and miscommunication fuel the natural fear against this unprecedented EVD.

Another important component which is addressed by the project is the discrimination and social rejection that EVD survivors and their families, and families of deceased people suffer. CBUs, under the coordination of Community Watch Committees (CWC) will address the issue and prevent discrimination.

b) Coherence with existing projects:

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UNDP has been supporting the MRU efforts in peace prevention and promotion of social cohesion since 2012. Following to this support, MRU has been able to establish community based structures which have been instrumental in improving trans-frontier coordination with Sierra Leone and Liberia. At the same time, MRU has promoted social cohesion amongst the diverse peoples of the region, which are located in the three countries affected by the EVD. This experience will serve to promote EVD prevention activities, with a culturally adapted approach at the field level. These MRU-UNDP projects have been supported by the Peace Building Fund and the European Union.

This project complements a previous proposal sent to MPTF jointly by UNICEF and UNDP, which aims to install Community Watch Committees (CWC) in the region, set up rural radios following the protocols established by the NCU. The CBUs will report directly to the watch up committees, and members of them will be part of their local committees.

UNICEF is providing Community Integrated Management of Childhood Illnesses to MRU border health posts as well as psychosocial support to orphans from Ebola.

Also, UNFPA has hired an health system strengthening specialist and two logistician who will be based in the MRU borders through a regional MRU/UNFPA project. These health specialists will be dedicated to support the promotion of access to health services, especially for women and girls in the context of the EVD crisis. 50 midwives have also been recruited to be deployed in the most affected areas in order to ensure community based provision of reproductive health services to the most affected communities and timely referral to the referral centers.

c) Capacity of RUNO(s) and implementing partners:

UN agencies have been working together in the most affected regions since the onset of the EVD, jointly with MRU teams. As a result of this coordination, a geographical distribution of the support for the Community Watch Committees was done and will serve as technical frame for the activities of this project.

MRU will schedule activities with UN agencies in each district, establishing coordinated actions for each region, varying them based on the social and cultural characteristics of the region. These UN offices are fully staffed and functional and have been in the leadership of the EVD response in the region.

MRU has a team and representation in the three countries. At this time, it is under the direction of a Guinean citizen and has a team with strong political support at national levels; this strength will serve to support the lobbying and high coordination needed for the project activities. UNDP, UNFPA and UNICEF will be coordinating field activities with MRU to ensure rapid deployment of materials and provide logistic and technical support.

d) Proposal management:

The project will be managed by a Supervisor Committee with participation of the three UN agencies (UNFPA, UNICEF, and UNDP) and MRU leaders utilizing the most appropriate implementation modality. The Committee will gather monthly to follow project activities and monitoring indicators.

Each agency, including MRU, will develop an Action Plan, with detailed activities and attached calendar linked to the activities. UNDP and UNFPA will install Ebola teams in two districts, in order to provide logistic and M&E support to MRU.

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Signature of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU). The three UN agencies jointly with MRU will sign a MoU following UN models, in which each agency, including MRU, will have a clear role and distribution of labor.

- Meetings and reporting

Monthly meetings will be held at both sites in which target and activities will be jointly evaluated with MRU personnel. Monthly reporting will be send to the Country Office, in which indicators evolution and main achievements and bottlenecks will be mentioned. MRU has an updated Manual of Procedures and Guidelines, and is subject to an international audit once a year. The MRU finances department is composed by a Financial Officer, and an assistant to the financial officer, procurement officer (1).
