The Regional Project on Democratic Dialogue in Latin America and the Caribbean was initiated in 2001 and finalized in March 2008. The Project Document sent to PAC corresponds to the second phase of the initiative.

The new project's strategic approach is aligned with the priorities laid out in UNDP's Strategic Plan and the LAC Regional Programme Document for the period 2008-2011. It will directly contribute to the Focus Area in Crisis Prevention and Recovery and will especially contribute in strengthening capacities of national institutions to manage crisis.

Particularly, the project will contribute to the following two outcomes within the Crisis Prevention and Recovery Focus Area: **outcome 3.1** - capacities of national institutions to manage crisis strengthened. Through its support given to the joint border initiatives between Colombia and Ecuador, the project will also contribute to the **outcome 3.3** - joint border area development initiatives are strengthened.

The overall strategy of the project aims at strengthening democratic institutions by making them more responsive to citizen's needs and demands through the provision of innovative social methodologies and capacities to prevent conflict, manage crisis and build consensus.

The project is based on the experience of a previous project which accumulated 6 years of practice by participating in the design, facilitation and evaluation of dialogue processes throughout the region. It has also systematized and disseminated knowledge on dialogue, thus expanding and defining the field of dialogue in the region, while contributing to its development globally. The publication, in March 2007, of "Democratic Dialogue: a Handbook for Practitioners" together with International IDEA, the OAS and CIDA has brought together this knowledge and allowed the project to identify new areas of support, notably in capacity building.

For the period 2008-2011, the project proposes to work in three key areas: 1) an articulated capacity development strategy aimed at social and political leaders, facilitators and UNDP/UN personnel to strengthen facilitation skills and raise the capacity of leadership to promote and structure dialogic processes and approaches to face collective problems.; 2) a demand-driven support to dialogue processes in the region with a strong emphasis on support to national strategies; and 3) the consolidation of a Community of Practice and Learning which will constantly work on creating and systematizing knowledge on dialogue and acts as a pool of expertise that will guide the support given at the national level. The project will also include a special outcome to promote consensus building in crucial border areas.

The implementation of the project's activities will be based on strong and articulated partnerships with UN agencies such as BCPR and BDP, regional projects (particularly with the regional project on Political Analysis and Prospective Scenarios for Improved Governance), and with international and regional institutions such as International IDEA, the Carter Center, the nIMD, CIDA and Latin American Universities.

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I. SITUATION ANALYSIS

Notwithstanding notable progress over the last decades in deepening democracy and sustaining economic growth, Latin America and the Caribbean remains the most unequal region in the world with almost 40% of its population (some 209 million people) living in poverty and more than 15% (81 million people) living in extreme poverty or indigence (ECLAC, 2005). Additionally, although democracy continues to be the preferred political regime, support for democracy has decreased 4% in 2007. As highlighted by UNDP's Democracy Report (UNDP, 2004) the region's development and the consolidation of democracy in the region will require strengthening the capacity of institutions and leaders to effectively promote, convene and facilitate dialogue to manage and resolve conflicts without violence.

The capacity to promote and articulate dialogue processes and approaches is particularly important given the recent political and social polarization, the introduction of new actors in the political realm, and continued social fragmentation in many countries. Furthermore, part of the disaffection with democracy stems from the difficulty of democratic institutions to effectively tackle those challenges, improve livelihoods, process citizen's needs and collectively articulate people's aspirations. The key challenge is not so much to avoid institutional rupture, but to assure democracy's credibility and legitimacy by enabling it to effectively tackle today's complex societal challenges.

As the 2007 Democratic Dialogue Handbook demonstrates, dialogue, when used in the right context and with the appropriate methods, allows new realities and innovative solutions to unfold. Democratic dialogues are participatory and inclusive processes that foster understanding among participants and seeks to identify new options and develop shared visions while promoting a culture of participation and democracy. As an approach, dialogue can also promote the development of a culture of democracy by fostering citizen's participation – especially of those that are most vulnerable – by providing processes that enable the peaceful resolution of conflict, the collaboration across party lines, and the promotion of strategic and constructive visions and agendas for action.

UNDP's and other institutions' experience in the region and globally has showed how democratic dialogues participate in the strengthening of democratic institutions and their capacity to deliver by providing spaces where stakeholders can share their vision and understanding of complex problems. By developing a comprehensive understanding of a problem dialogue processes help foster deep deliberation processes and create sustainable and creative options that reflect the needs of all segments of society.

Since 2001, UNDP/RBLAC together with its Community of Practice has helped systematize and learn from experiences in the region and in the world. As the evaluation of the Regional Program 2003-2007 highlighted, the project effectively supported, through its support network, numerous dialogue processes in over 12 countries. It also structured a community of practice helping it to define the field, develop alliances and systematize experience and learn from them. Nonetheless, institutions and individuals remain ill equipped to effectively transfer and apply this experience and require sustained support to use dialogue to strengthen its democratic institutions and prevent violent conflict.

II. STRATEGY

The Regional Democratic Dialogue Project will contribute to crisis prevention and democratic governance through three action components: (i) strengthening regional, national and local capacity to promote, convene and facilitate democratic dialogue processes and other dialogic approaches for change; (ii) providing technical assistance to national and regional initiatives to use dialogic change processes as tools for democracy-building and the prevention of conflict; and (iii) consolidating a community of practice and learning to generate valuable knowledge for the field of dialogue and provide support resources to the work of the Project in both capacity-building and technical assistance. In turn, capacity-building and technical assistance will be mutually reinforcing and will catalyze each other's work. As an exit strategy, the Project is clear that it has to work for installing sustainable local institutional mechanisms for dialogue and conflict transformation.

Capacity building will be aimed at social and political leaders, dialogue practitioners and facilitators, and UNDP/UN staff to increase awareness and provide skills and competences to respond dialogically to complex and multi-layered challenges, and to incorporate dialogic approaches to their work and fields of action. This component will include a regional curriculum for dialogue facilitators, mentoring and coaching programs, learning journeys for practitioners, toolkits and virtual courses on democratic dialogue. As capacity building programs are rolled-out, technical assistance will change in nature from direct support to coaching and accompaniment.

Technical assistance to dialogue and other change processes initiatives and programs will be provided at two levels: national demands through the Country Offices, and regional processes and projects. The Project will establish alliances with other regional programs in order to articulate conflict assessment, conflict prevention and intervention strategies. Technical assistance will include conflict analysis, design, facilitation, systematization, logistics and assessment of dialogue and other change processes for crisis prevention. Most importantly, for both national and regional support, the Project will support the Country Offices's strategies or the regional projects' strategies rather than provide ad hoc support. The Project will partner with COs and regional projects to develop those strategies and incorporate dialogue to them.

The capacity building and technical assistance components are related in most interventions on the ground. Technical assistance to country offices usually provides guidance to better achieve constructive change processes, not only through conflict analysis and process design, facilitation and systematization, but also through developing and strengthening dialogic capacities on local stakeholders in order to foster sustainable initiatives.

The community of practice and learning will generate knowledge for the field of dialogue, both in the region and globally, and strongly support the implementation of the Project's actions. It will include institutions and experts working at the national and regional levels. In this respect, the partnership with COs, to engage and support those experts and institutions they work, with will be crucial. Supporting, empowering and networking local communities of practitioners will help to install a culture of dialogue that could improve effectiveness in the implementation of UNDP/UN development and governance programs. Systematized knowledge and relevant information on national and regional contexts valuable for the practice of dialogue will be continuously disseminated through bulletins, publications and the Project's website.

Dialogue processes may have different applications for conflict transformation and crisis prevention, not only in addressing concrete issues but also poor relations. Lack of clarity about the purpose, goal and expected outcomes might lead to failure or fatigue on conveners and

participants. Dialogue interventions must be strategically designed taking into account the context of application and setting a strategic connection with formal decision making process. Dialogue is not a panacea and that, if not used properly, there may be downsides in using it.

For implementing its three action components, the Project will work in partnership with UNDP's Bureau for Crisis Prevention and Recovery (BCPR). The Project will support BCPR and BCPR will provide support to the Project, in mainstreaming dialogue within the organization, at a global level and in accordance to UNDP Strategic Plan. Other key partners include: the Department of Political Affairs, the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), the Generative Change Community (GCC), UNDP's Learning Resource Center (LRC)/Virtual Development Academy (VDA), the Carter Center (TCC), Universities, the Regional Project on Political Analysis and Prospective Scenarios (PAPEP) and Country Offices. In terms of partnership, an alliance with the Folke Bernadotte Academy could be considered given that they are investing in a course on Facilitation of Dialogue Processes and Mediation Efforts.

Finally, the project will devote particular attention at fostering dialogue and consensus building in particularly vulnerable border areas. A number of border areas in the region suffer an accumulation of conditions and factors which increase the potential for violent conflict and violence with its destabilizing consequences on the region. The project will therefore support multi-country dialogue and consensus building processes, joint planning and joint initiatives to build trust and develop joint development programs.

V. MANAGEMENT ARRANGEMENTS

- This RBLAC Project will be managed as part of a portfolio of projects in conflict prevention within the Democratic Governance Cluster. Strategic direction will be provided by the Regional Program Board, and it will be supported by a Program Adviser and the entire conflict prevention team.
- The project will be directly executed by RBLAC and implemented by the project team based in the region. In addition to the team based in Guatemala, the project will count on its network of consultants and its Community of Practice and Learning to attain its objectives.
- Annual work plans will be prepared by the Project Coordinator with support from the RBLAC Program Adviser and shared with the Board.
- The regional project on Democratic Dialogue will operate under Direct Execution, and UNDP Guatemala will be the implementing agency.
- The project board will meet at least once a year and will bring together in addition to the Program Adviser and the Regional Project Coordinator: 2 Resident Representatives where the project has been working, one practitioner, one institution member of the community of practice, a representative of BCPR and a government representative.
- The Board will receive progress report from the Project Coordinator and provide strategic advice and inputs on the strategy, outputs and activities.
- According to the UNDP cost-recovery Policy, 7% of General Management Services (GMS indirect costs) should be applied to Third-Party Cost-sharing and Trust-Funds. Only if otherwise instructed by the donors in the cost-sharing agreements, the interests of costsharing generated with the contributions received should be used for reprogramming by the regional project.
- If contributions from government or other financial sources are not received in accordance with the project's payment schedule, or if the financial resources to be mobilized by the project are not sufficient to cover the activities planned within the present Project Document, they may be reduced, suspended or terminated, following UNDP rules and regulations.

VI. MONITORING FRAMEWORK AND EVALUATION

In accordance with the programming policies and procedures outlined in the UNDP User Guide, the project will be monitored through the following:

Within the annual cycle

- On a quarterly basis, a quality assessment shall record progress towards the completion of key results, based on quality criteria and methods captured in the Quality Management table below.
- An Issue Log shall be activated in Atlas and updated by the Project Manager to facilitate tracking and resolution of potential problems or requests for change.
- Based on the initial risk analysis submitted (see annex 1), a risk log shall be activated in Atlas and regularly updated by reviewing the external environment that may affect the project implementation.
- Based on the above information recorded in Atlas, a Quarterly Progress Report (QPR) shall be submitted by the Project Manager to the Project Board through Project Assurance, using the standard report format available in the Executive Snapshot.
- A project Lesson-learned log shall be activated and regularly updated to ensure on-going learning and adaptation within the organization, and to facilitate the preparation of the Lessons-learned Report at the end of the project.
- A Monitoring Schedule Plan shall be activated in Atlas and updated to track key management actions/events.

<u>Annually</u>

- A **mid-term report** will be prepared by the core team and submitted to the Project Manager and Project Advisor on July.
- Annual Review Report. An Annual Review Report shall be prepared by the Project Manager and shared with the Project Board and the Outcome Board. As minimum requirement, the Annual Review Report shall consist of the Atlas standard format for the QPR covering the whole year with updated information for each above element of the QPR as well as a summary of results achieved against pre-defined annual targets at the output level.
- Annual Project Review. Based on the above report, an annual project review shall be conducted during the fourth quarter of the year or soon after, to assess the performance of the project and appraise the Annual Work Plan (AWP) for the following year. In the last year, this review will be a final assessment. This review is driven by the Project Board and may involve other stakeholders as required. It shall focus on the extent to which progress is being made towards outputs, and that these remain aligned to appropriate outcomes.
- The core team will prepare an **Annual Progress Report** and submit it to the Project Manager and Project Advisor on January of the following year.
- Final external evaluation to assess the progress achieved.

IX.2 BACKGROUND OF THE DEMOCRATIC DIALOGUE PROJECT: 2001-2007

In 2001, the UNDP RBLAC (Regional Bureau for Latin America and the Caribbean) established the Democratic Dialogue Project based in Guatemala. Since then, the project has constituted an active service instrument to dialogue initiatives requested by national governments to UNDP Country Offices in Latin America and the Caribbean. It develops, disseminates and applies diverse social technologies to support conflict prevention and governance strengthening efforts. It compiles and systematizes experiences, lessons learned and good practices, provides specific technical advice to country needs supported by a network of dialogue practitioners, and establishes partnerships with other regional and world institutions committed to democratic dialogue. Within the UN system, the project's strategy has received the strong support of BDP and more recently BCPR.

During its initial phase (2001-2003), the primary purpose of the Project was to systematize experiences, lessons learned and good practices of dialogue processes carried out or under way mainly in the Latin American and Caribbean region. Case studies and learning histories were prepared about Visión Guatemala, Visión Paraguay, Vision Jamaica, the Tri-Sectorial Approach in Philippines, the Mont Fleur Scenarios in South Africa, Argentine Dialogue, Peruvian National Agenda, Bambito Dialogues I, II and III in Panama, Destino Colombia, and Multiparty Dialogue in Guatemala. Furthermore, around 40 short dialogue experiences, mainly in the Latin American region, were mapped. With inputs from its network of dialogue practitioners, the Project produced a Dialogue Typology based on contexts and results, which contributed to the definition of the field of study. Additionally, methodological guidelines to systematize new experiences and case studies were developed.

All these efforts to create collective knowledge were channeled through learning workshops that gathered around 65 dialogue practitioners (facilitators, promoters, leaders, public officers, UNDP Resident Representatives) working together to develop both concepts and practical tools for democratic dialogue.

In 2003, the democratic dialogue network was expanded to include some of the most prominent organizations working in the field of democratic dialogue to share and build new knowledge and to put together a Community of Practice on democratic dialogue. The Project has supported the efforts of RBLAC to establish partnerships and alliances with like-minded organizations engaged in the growing field of democratic dialogue, around the common goal of improving the effectiveness of dialogue efforts. The Community of Practice on Democratic Dialogue seeks to create a space for the establishment and expansion of a network of organizations that share a passion for dialogue and who wish to deepen their knowledge and expertise in this subject by meeting on a regular basis. At present, the following organizations are members of the Community of Practice:

Bureau for Crisis Prevention and Resolution of the UNDP (BCPR) Bureau for Development Policy of the UNDP (BDP) Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) Department of Political Affairs of the United Nations (DPA) Generative Dialogue Project (GDP) Global Leadership Initiative (GLI) IDEA International Inter-American Foundation (IAF) International Institute for Sustainable Dialogue (IISD) Interpeace (formerly WSP International) Mediators Foundation Netherlands Institute for Multiparty Democracy (nIMD) Organization of American States Oslo Governance Center of the UNDP The Carter Center Third Side Network University for Peace Wageningen University

All these institutions played an important role in the initiative during the consolidation period, and their involvement with this effort shows the broadening of UNDP's commitment to democratic dialogue beyond the Latin American and Caribbean region.

During 2004-2007, the Project's priorities were centered on the preparation of a Handbook on democratic dialogue for dialogue practitioners, which was finished and published, the construction of a Network to provide substantive support to dialogue processes in the region, the consolidation of the Community of Practice, and continued knowledge creation and codification in the field. The Project provided responses to technical support and capacity building demands coming from several countries: Argentina, Bolivia, Ecuador (including Galapagos), Guatemala, Haiti, Jamaica, Mexico, Nicaragua and Saint Kitts and Nevis. The Project also strengthened its communications strategy focused inside and outside UNDP to disseminate all the knowledge accumulated during the past years. Within the framework of this strategy, a Strategic Outlook and a Policy Note on Democratic Dialogue were prepared, a website was developed¹ and launched, and a quarterly electronic bulletin was published. Several other dissemination activities were carried out in order to strengthen the link of the Project with the broaden community of practitioners, stakeholders and like-minded institutions.

With the publication of the Handbook on Democratic Dialogue aimed at dialogue practitioners worldwide in March 2007, the regional project increased its emphasis on building/development dialogic capacities for societal leaders, not only throughout the region but also globally. The above-mentioned virtual course on Democratic Dialogue, which was based on the Handbook, was prepared in partnership with BCPR and LRC/VDA, and several activities for capacity building on dialogic approaches were carried out in Bolivia, Guatemala and Mexico through on-site training and learning processes.
