Brief Description

Since 2015, the UNDP-Regional Bureau for Arab States has increasingly invested in youth programming to strengthen the organization's approach to supporting, enabling, engaging and empowering young people to lead the change they want to see in their near future. Opportunities, challenges, gaps and lessons learned have been observed and assessed paving the way for the development of a more holistic Youth Project. This initiation plan is for the development of the Youth Engagement and Empowerment Regional Project, which will aim to build on the successes of the previous years' achievements but aim to build an approach that lends itself to more impact and support to young people in the Arab Region.

The outputs sought are:

Output 1: Youth and partner networks expanded and mechanisms institutionalized to create an environment for acceleration of youth innovation and SDGs.

Output 2: Youth Empowerment and Engagement Project developed with identified partners and funding.

Output 3: Youth leaders' capacity strengthened, and their knowledge enhanced.

To transition from YLP to the new YEEP, 2020 will operate in two parallel tracks: the first is to continue YLP programming and test new approaches where relevant so that both momentum is not lost as YEEP is developed and new elements are tested and if successful, used in the YEEP. The second track is to develop the YEEP in consultation with all stakeholders, and this will include the larger vision, detailed project document, and the foundational tools needed to enable the project's success.

I. PURPOSE AND EXPECTED OUTPUT

Over the last five years, the Regional Bureau for Arab States has increasingly invested in youth programming to strengthen the organization's approach to supporting, enabling, engaging and empowering young people to lead the change they want to see in their near future as change makers. The Youth Leadership Programme (YLP) the activity for which this project is building from, was first started under the regional project Mosharaka. There was a dedicated output for YLP and in 2019 the project was closed, and YLP was made a separate component.

Opportunities, challenges, gaps and lessons learned have been observed and assessed paving the way for the development of a more holistic Youth Programme. This initiation phase is for the development of the bureau's Youth Engagement and Empowerment Regional Project (YEEP), which will aim to build on the successes of the previous years' achievements, but aim to build an approach that lends itself to more impact and support to young people in the Arab Region.

There are three notable results from 2015 - 2019 that will further be built on to develop a more holistic project:

1. Increased youth trained and youth serving organizations participating as partners (hence increased momentum) and as a result youth and partner networks expanded;

2. Developed training manuals to support consistent training of Design Thinking; and

3. Enhanced National, Regional and Global YLP's engagement inclusive of the development of a new partnership with the Arab Youth Center (AYC) funding 11 youth positions in UNDP Country Offices (COs) and Hub which have supported increased capacity to youth programming

Specific achievements since 2015 have shaped up the development of this new phase. Largest achievement from YLP was the momentum created over the last five years. Between 2015 - 2019, 21,000 youth have been trained and about 80 partnerships with youth serving organizations have been established. The momentum has grown in both youth participation and partnerships with Youth-Serving Organizations (YSOs). In 2019, 45 YSOs received capacity building and offered youth training. On the outreach, social media following also jumped in 2019, Cumulative (total): 15,454 (Facebook), 2082 (twitter), three times the amount from the previous year, indicating the increasing interest. Also, one important partnership was established, with the Arab Youth Center in Abu Dhabi September 2019 leading to the funding of 11 youth positions at both the regional team and country-level¹ youth teams in 2020 to increase capacity to youth programming for UNDP. Finally, another notable achievement in 2019 was the development of a Design Thinking Guidelines that provided the basis for partners to use, which has been quality assured, to train both the youth-serving organization and youth. Several of the activities under YLP require foremost a systematic quality-controlled approach aimed at a larger scope that is impact oriented.

These interventions over the years have been activities based, and now there is a need for a holistic approach that ensures quality control, consistency in our programme offer and clear monitoring and evaluation tools for sustained impact. Country Offices and the regional context with all its varying typologies in which they work call on greater youth programming and the need for regional leadership to pave the standards and path for improved support to county level youth programming. Therefore, this initiation phase is vital to transforming the gains achieved over the last 5 years into a project that sustains momentum for youth programming and increases regional support for better programming. The outputs sought are:

Output 1: Youth and partner networks expanded and mechanisms institutionalized to create an environment for acceleration of youth innovation and SDGs.

Output 2: Youth Empowerment and Engagement Project developed with identified partners and funding.

Output 3: Youth leaders' capacity strengthened, and their knowledge enhanced.

To transition from YLP to the new YEEP, 2020 will operate in two parallel tracks: the first is to continue YLP programming and test new approaches where relevant so that both momentum is not lost as YEEP is developed and new elements are tested and if successful, used in the YEEP. consultation with all stakeholders, and this will include the larger vision, detailed project document, and the foundational tools needed to enable the project's success.

II. MANAGEMENT ARRANGEMENTS

This initiation phase will require a UNDP Team inclusive of a Project Manager, and a consistent team of United Nations Volunteers (UNVs) and Consultants. Two UNVs will be assigned to this team with knowledge and expertise in youth programming, and a young person from the region, recruited as part of the partnership with the AYC, will also be assigned. Several consultants will be required to help develop various aspects of the new project and support activities.

III. MONITORING

The work plan will be monitored by the indicators against the set targets. Monitoring will happen at two levels, by the team through the implementation of the activities outlined to achieve the outputs, and with the Country Offices participating in youth programming (that receive regional support). The UNDP team will hold monthly calls with appointed Youth Focal Points in 16 COs², and bi-weekly calls with youth appointed delegates in each of the offices in order to receive updates and follow-up on the activities listed in the required National Action Plans and their implementation. National Action Plans is a document with the listed activities and timeline agreed with the participating COs for implementation of youth activities supported by RBAS. Also, CO will submit to UNDP Team a quarterly report on achievements and challenges.
