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I. BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE INITIATION PLAN/ AF PFG

Objective & Final Outputs

The objective of the AF PFG is to develop the project pre-concept into a full project proposal for "Building the Resilience of Persons with Disabilities to Cope with Climate Change in the Asia Pacific Region in Bangladesh, Cambodia, Nepal, Thailand, Pakistan, Indonesia, and Philippines." As described in the project pre-concept, the overall objective of the project is to build the capacity of participant countries to more effectively take action in improving the resilience of persons with disabilities to climate change and climate related disasters. This project will enhance the resilience of persons with disabilities, along with improving the climate change early warning systems, and enabling disabled people organizations to design effective adaptation options with persons with disabilities. Thus, this initiative aims to strengthen the climate resilience of persons with disabilities and disabled people organizations. The project will work with persons with disabilities and disabled peoples' organizations to build their capacity on adapting to climate change, raise awareness so that they can be empowered, and work with government and the private sector to design effective climate change adaptation policies and strategies, which are inclusive and address the concerns of persons with disabilities. A major focus of the project will be the development of early warning systems, specifically for persons with disabilities, through the introduction of cutting-edge technology, working with disabled people's organizations and the private sector, using a human-centred design process to design products specifically tailored to persons with disabilities which will be scaled up, and reproduced.

As described in the project pre-concept document, the project will engage with governments and disabled people's organizations, providing the governments technical advice and designing specific tools for persons with disabilities on climate change, while facilitating the inclusion of person with disabilities and disabled people's organizations, in the overall policy development discussion in the country. Overall, the project will build the capacity of the participant countries to take effective actions to improve the resilience of persons with disabilities to climate change and climate related disasters.

The project components are:

- 1. Capacity Building for Disabled People's Organizations, Persons with Disabilities and Governments to address Climate Change, and Enhance Institutional Frameworks;
- 2. Early warning infrastructure and last mile services targeting the specific needs of persons with disabilities to better manage and reduce vulnerability of climate change induced risks;
- 3. Knowledge generation, codification and dissemination of the effectiveness of targeted measures to reduce the vulnerability of persons with disabilities to climate change risks.

During the initiation plan period, a number of studies and stakeholder consultations will be undertaken with the view to further develop the approved project concept into a fully formulated project document. The final output of the initiation plan will be a full project proposal for submission to the Adaptation Fund Board.

Management Arrangements

The Initiation Plan will be conducted in close consultation with the following UNDP Country Offices: Bangladesh, Cambodia, Nepal, Thailand, Pakistan, Indonesia, and Philippines as well as national counterparts including stakeholders from national and regional disabled persons organizations, international organizations, IFRC, government agencies, ministry officials, relevant non-profits, civil society organizations, and representatives from the private sector. UNDP-GEF will lead the project development process and manage the Initiation Plan budget. UNDP-GEF will assign UNDP Bangkok Regional Hub as Responsible Party through the Sustainable Development and Resilience Cluster (SD&R). As Responsible Party, the SD&R cluster will undertake full programmatic and administrative-financial control and responsibility for implementing the project and will be responsible for approving deliverables prior to their reporting to the AF by UNDP.

II. STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT, PUBLIC DISCLOSURE AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS

To ensure strong country ownership, and in line with the stakeholder engagement requirements outlined in UNDP's <u>Social and Environmental Standards</u> (SES), the development of the project to be undertaken during this AF PFG phase will be done in full consultation and close engagement with government, CSO and other relevant stakeholders – in particular those who will benefit from and be directly involved in the implementation of the project (i.e. direct project beneficiaries). A list of these stakeholders will be prepared and included in Annex to the proposal.

If the Social and Environment Screening Procedure (SESP) included in Annex to the proposal, has an overall safeguard risk rating of <u>moderate</u> or <u>high</u>, the following disclosure requirements apply:

- 1. A final validation workshop report will be prepared summarizing the outcomes of the validation workshop and other consultations undertaken during the PFG phase. This report must demonstrate strong country ownership and will become a key reference document should an environmental and social safeguard complaint/grievance be filed during project implementation.
- 2. At the latest by the LPAC meeting, the project document, SESP and related management plans, and other relevant information/documents (e.g. ProDoc annexes) will be made available to the public on the UNDP website or <u>open.undp.org</u>. It is recommended to make these documents available for 30 days in advance of the LPAC meeting for moderate risk projects, and 120 days in advance for high risk projects.
