In order to be immediately operative, the project management has been able to secure and temporarily finance, through in-kind contribution from UNOPS, OCHA, and UNWOMEN, the recruitment of the positions of M&E Officer, Communications Officer and Coordination Specialist, respectively. Recruitment processes for these positions through the project are under way.

5. Lessons Learned

Unexpected outcomes/activities and how these impacted on project implementation

This is a highly political and demand driven project, whose success depends on its capacity to support MOPIC in its endeavor to coordinate Jordan's response to the Syria crisis. Addressing and responding to unexpected requests - and undertaking unexpected/unplanned activities - is therefore an intrinsic component of the project team's work.

6. Anticipated Next Quarter Key Activities

During next quarter, the project will be focusing on providing support to MOPIC in the coordination of the JRP 2015 implementation and in the preparation of the new Jordan Response Plan 2016-18. In particular, the project will closely work with the HRCU to strengthen its capacity to monitor JRP2015 progress through JORISS. Also the project will be coordinating the vulnerability assessment framework exercise which aims to provide MOPIC and other relevant stakeholders with a basis for prioritizing the needs of different sectors according to national standards, and a baseline for measuring change over time. The project will also work on the elaboration of relevant documents to guide the preparation of the next plan. The project will also seek to support MOPIC in the operationalization of the recommendations included in the report on MOPIC's humanitarian and crisis response coordination, as needed.

Finally, the JRPSC Secretariat will be expected to support the operationalization of the Jordan Resilience Fund (JRF), acting as JRF Secretariat.
