	The Employment Offices (EO) and Vocational Training Centre (VTC) in the northernmost municipalities remarkably increased their capacities on how to support economic reintegration of (potential) GBV/DV survivors but also on how to deliver, monitor and evaluate different active labor market programmes, some of which being implemented for the very first time in the Mitrovicë/a Region. The improved quality of counselling services also has had an impact on the number of clients who choose to use EOs services (74 companies and 1422 jobseekers) comparing to no clients before this programme was initiated. Prior to initiation of the Joint Programme on GBV and the ALMP project, the most recent data on citizens seeking services from employment offices were registered as back as 2008.

	Despite all steps undertaken so far and the positive impact the Programme has had, there is much more ahead to be done in order to effectively deal with GBV/DV issues, as many of the underlying causes are of nature that considerable take time to change. Municipalities have a key role to play for the establishment and the sustainability of the Coordination Mechanisms. Signing the respective MoU is only the first step towards a better coordination, but the implementation of such MoU needs dedicated human and financial resources. As such, the project systematically paid attention to the sustainability element of the interventions, to make sure project results are long-lasting. However, much remains to be done in dealing with the issue of GBV.
