<b>A. <u>Brainstorming on Program Environment /Opportunities</u></b>	
<b>1. Civil Society Funding Regulation Bill:</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Harmonise the position of CSOs on the bill and facilitate a Strategy session to map out strategies for engagement on the bill;</li> <li>• CSO members of the Committee should pay an advocacy visit to the Chairman of ICPC;</li> <li>• To strengthen CSO position it may be useful to document how CSOs are complying with the SCUML regulation;</li> <li>• To form a small technical team to engage on the bill.</li> </ul>	
<b>2. Soap Opera on Anti-Corruption:</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The project should consider buying into already existing initiatives on DSTV and not re-invent the wheel.</li> <li>• A partnership with Nollywood will be more strategic by getting producers to be more conscious of anti-corruption programming;</li> </ul>	
<b>3. Opportunities:</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Increasing media coverage of anti-corruption issues;</li> <li>• Increasing community level engagement on anti-corruption issues;</li> <li>• Introduce revenue expenditure as a thematic area of engagement;</li> <li>• Increase the capacity of the media on reportage of CSOs engagement;</li> <li>• Provide opportunities for CSOs to monitor the performance of ACAs, especially as it relates to activities supported by the project;</li> <li>• Leverage skills that CSOs share and provide opportunities to learn from each other</li> <li>• Engagement on anti-corruption policies like whistle-blowing laws, amending ACAs act and Proceeds of Crime bill.</li> </ul>
