# MINUTES OF THIRD PROJECT REVIEW BOARD MEETING- STRENGTHENING RULE OF LAW IN MALAKND PROGRAMME (SRLMP)

Third Meeting of the Project Review Board of SRLMP was held on February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2013 at Khyber Pakhtunkhwa House, Islamabad. The meeting was co-chaired by the Mr. Attaullah Khan, Additional Chief Secretary (ACS) and Marc-Andre Franche, Country Director (CD) UNDP Pakistan. The meeting was attended by the representatives of Peshawar High Court, Economic Affairs Division, P&D, Home, Finance, Law, Local Governments, Police and Prosecution Departments. Representatives of the Embassy of Kingdom of Netherlands and Peshawar High Court Bar Association were also present. List of Participants is at Annex-A.

The meeting started with the recitation of the Holy Quran. In his opening remarks, the ACS welcomed all the participants and also extended warm welcome to Mr. Marc-Andre Franche, as new Country Director for UNDP Pakistan and said that UNDP role to assist the host government, particularly KPK Province would be further strengthened with a young and dedicated leadership. He, on behalf of the Provincial Government assured full support to UNDP Pakistan for undertaking development interventions in the Province. Marc-Andre Franche while acknowledging warm welcome by the ACS appreciated him for convening the PRB meeting. He welcomed the representatives of the KP Government for their participation in the meeting. CD UNDP thanked the Govt. of KP and the Embassy of Netherlands for the trust and confidence on the UNDP and for joining hands as cost sharing partners. He appreciated the support provided by the Judiciary, Police, Prosecution, Home and P&D Deptt; of KP for the smooth implementation of the Project. He stated that 2013 would be the year of achievements for the SRLM and it will be an example for other Rule of Law Project in term of its achievements and delivery. He further said that the reception and ownership demonstrated by partners was commendable. The forum expressed their firm commitments and support for Rule of Law and Justice Sector initiatives in KP Province.

After opening remarks by the Co-Chairs, the meeting was conducted as per following agenda items:

#### 1. STATUS OF THE DECISIONS OF 2ND PRB:

Mr. Qazi Jamil, Criminal Justice Specialist, SRLM presented the progress regarding the decisions taken in the last PRB. He stated that in light of the PRB decision, Prison Sector has been included in the project scope, Cost-Sharing Agreement had been signed between the Govt. of KP and UNDP, Secretary Finance, KP had been added as PRB member. Similarly the implementation plan of SRLM has been prepared in consultation with the partners. The participants showed satisfaction over the actions taken on all decisions.

#### 2. PROJECT PERFORMANCE 2012:

Ms. Sharmeela Rassool, Chief Technical Specialist, Rule of Law, UNDP presented the overall progress of SRLM during 2012. She stated that the project had adopted a holistic approach meeting the needs of all actors of justice and had shown almost 100% progress. She stated that after successful TNA exercise, 8 modules were developed and 93 Master Trainers trained from prosecution, judiciary, police, Bar and Musalihati Jirga. She explained that in 2012 KP Judicial Academy was operationalized & capacitated to start trainings and district judiciary process service branch was strengthened. Similarly, the training facilities in Police Training College Hangu were improved including up-gradation of female residential facilities and Forensic Science Lab for training purposes. In order to strengthenProsecution, books and journals for libraries were provided to 7 district prosecution offices of Malakand. To improve the informal justice mechanisms, Musalihati Jirga members and community paralegals were trained and policy level interventions were undertaken to amend the MJ Rules, 2006. To improve access to justice and legal aid system, 6 legal aid desks were established and 124 mobile legal aid clinics conducted which benefited more than 5000 community members and policy level initiatives undertaken for amending legal aid framework.

On Financial part, Mr. Ashraf Khan (PM SRLM) informed that the KP Government contribution was not received during first half of financial year (July-Dec 2012) of the Provincial Government; therefore Rs. 127.268 was spent on the activities under implementation against available fund of Rs. 128.809 Millionwith UNDP.This indicated 99% financial delivery of UNDP budget by the PMU.

After presenting the detailed physical and financial progress, the ACS invited members for their comments on the results showed by SRLM. Chief Foreign Aid P&DD and Additional Secretary Finance advised to share item wise expenditure. PM assured that details will be shared with Finance and P&D Department at the earliest. The ACS advised that item wise expenders should be shared with PRB when upcoming meeting are conducted. Forum expressed their satisfaction over the progress and appreciated SRLM for making good efforts to achieve the targets.

Mr. Theo Oltheten from the Embassy of Kingdom of Netherlands showed his utmost satisfaction and fully appreciated the achievements of the project. He also conveyed message of His Excellency the Ambassador of Kingdom of Netherlands.

#### 3. ANNUAL WORK PLAN AND BUDGET 2013

Before presenting major activities under four outputs of SRLM, Mr. Qazi Jamil informed that the AWP 2013 was prepared in consultation with the key partners including PHC, Home Department, Central Police Office, Local Governments Department and Prosecution Directorate. He further informed that detailed AWP was already shared with all members along with working papers. After presenting the major activities, the ACS invited members for their suggestions and inputs. The representatives of PHC, Home, Prosecution, Local Governments and Prosecution acknowledged that their inputs had already beensolicited for draft AWP 2013 which was shared with them along with working papers. However, there were some suggestions, presented by some members and requested the forum for inclusion in AWP 2013. Representative of EAD pointed out that target for training of judges was fixed as 125 in each module while target fixed for court staff was 150. He suggested increasing number of court staff as their overall strength in a district is greater than judges. UNDP appreciated the points and responded that the target would be rationalized in AWP 2013 in consultation with the concerned department. DG Prosecution informed that list pertaining to the needs of district prosecution offices was provided to SRLM last year and now the needs to be addressed on priority basis. Additional Secretary Home pointed out that Prosecution was being assisted through ADP scheme excluding seven districts of Malakand as it was devised that those districts would be covered under SRLM Project. Chief Economist P&DD said that capacity building and support of justice sector organs were adequately covered in AWP 2013 of SRLM. However, he added that there was an urgent need to include revenue courts in the ambit of SRLM scope as land disputes resulted into unrest and deprivation of justice for common citizens. The forum also pointed out that Revenue Courts needed to be included because 80% of the criminal cases were generated from revenue issues. The Chair (ACS) directed UNDP to include revenue courts in the capacity building component of SRLM and conduct their human and institution capacity assessment in consultation with Commissioner Malakand and come up with recommendations for effective working of revenue courts. Dr. Khurshid Iqbal (KPJA) suggested that there was issue of land settlement in the Malakand Region and there was need to address this issue. The ACS advised that this issue should be addressed in SRLM revenue court interventions.

The ACS asked the representative of PHC for his input regarding the Annual Work Plan. The Director P&D of Peshawar High Court expressed his satisfaction on the proposed activities and stated that the plan had been chalked out in consultation with High Court. Ms. Sharmeela appreciated suggestions of members and said that their inputs would be incorporated in approved AWP 2013.

The budget for 2013 was also presented to the PRB. It included a total budget of Rs. 416.910M including Rs. 283.910 M as UNDP contribution and 133.000 M as KP Government contribution.PM SRLM while clarifying this contribution said that previous year expenditure of UNDP from Jan-June 2012 (Rs. 18.5 M) and expenditure from Jul - Dec. 2012 (Rs. 108.768 M) would also be accounted for KPK Government share on the ratio of 1:3 (Government:UNDP).He further informed that KP Govt share for SRLM budget 2013(Jan-Dec) include full year ADP 2012-13 allocation (Rs. 67 M) plus half year allocation (Rs. 66 M) of ADP 2013-14. Chief Foreign said that the Provincial share will be released based on actual expenditure on the basis of 2 installments.

Mr. Ali Raza, Chief Foreign Aid (CFA) stated that original budget and actual expenditures should be reflected in the presentation. He raised reservations on 3% GMS to be charged by UNDP and requested to exclude the same from budget. While responding to his query, the CD , UNDP said that 3% and 7% GSM were standard UN rates on the Govt. and other donors' funding respectively. PM SRLM informed that 3% GMS was a mandatory provision as it was part of cost sharing agreement signed between UNDP and KP Government on Aug 17, 2012 (Article II). Mr. Azhar Saeed (ACD) informed that UNDP Executive Board had approved application of 3% GMS on Government funding and 7% on donor funding wherein GOP is signatory.

On a point, DIG Malakand stated that the Police had established Musalihati Committees at the Police Station levels which showed encouraging response from communities and producing good results. He suggested that all the ADR mechanisms should be given weightage. On this the CTS responded that the Project was planning to conduct a workshop to analyze the linkages amongst various ADR mechanisms including Police Musalihiti Committeesto create a synergy for sustained working.

Representative of Peshawar High Court Bar Association appreciated the UNDP support for building lawyers' capacity and strengthening Bars. He stated that Peshawar High Court Bar Association had successfully completed a series of expert lectures which may be continued in future.

#### **DECISION:**

After detailed discussion, the forum approved the Annual Work Plan (Annex-B) with the projected budget of Rs. 416.910Million including Rs. 133 Million as KP Government contribution and Rs. 283.910 Million as UNDP share.

#### 4. RESOURCE MOBILIZATION:

Mr. Azhar Malik ACD, UNDP shared status on resource mobilization for SRLM and inform that so far UNDP had been successful in securing funding from Embassy of Kingdom of Netherlands (\$ 2 Million), Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (\$3.75 Million) and UNDP own resources \$ 1.18 Million. He informed that negotiations were underway with SDC for funding of \$ 3 Million. Regarding US Embassy support, ACD informed that negotiations were also held and they were interested to support the programmein kinds i.e. a specific number of slots in their sponsored training for police and prosecutors. He informed that EU Mission was due but they were not still sure to get EU's funding. On this point, the ACS suggested that they were interested in Malakand, therefore, efforts should be made to get EU funding. Chief Economist said that that Provincial Government was pursuing anti-termism strategy and various departments had been involved in the process. Therefore he suggested close interaction between PMU and the Home Department for pursuing rule of law interventions in KP.

#### 5. ANY OTHER BUSINESS:

#### a. Forensic Science Laboratory

The Additional Chief Secretary appreciated UNDP's initiative of establishing a mini forensic laboratory at PTC Hangu to be used for training purpose and the plan for establishment of a Forensic Laboratory in Malakand Division. He advised that the selection of location for this FSL should be such that it should be accessible to all areas of Malakand Division, for instance Malakand Agency. Most of the participants referred to Punjab FSL which is one of the best laboratories at international level. The participants showed concerns over depleted condition of Peshawar laboratory and urged for the establishment of state of the art lab at Peshawar. Ms. Sharmeela Rassool suggested that there was need to study the Punjab model and establishment of FSL at Peshawar with various options including the cost, ownership, transparency, management structure, etc. She suggested constitution of working group to study various options for establishment of FSL. It was decided that a Working Group chaired by the Secretary Home Department with DIG Malakand, Director FSL and a UNDP representative as members would study the establishment of a FSL at Malakandwhile UNDP will provide technical assistance for the same.

#### **DECISIONS:**

- Working Group on FSL was constituted under the Chairmanship of Secretary Home Department with representation of DIG Malakand, Director FSL Peshawar and representative of UNDP as members.
- ii. Location of Mini FSL for Malakand Division would be recommended by the Working Group.

#### b. KP Justice Steering Committee (JSC)

Ms. Sharmeela Rassool, CTSinformed that there was an urgent need of better coordination among justice sector stakeholders and the donors currently planning new Rule of Law programs for KP. She proposed to constitute a Justice Steering Committee (JSC) with anaim to share the information related to the programme interventions, coordination among donors justice sector stakeholders, to provide strategic guidance andbringing together all efforts under oneframework of Rule of Law, help in avoiding duplications and provide in-timely guidance and steering SRLM implementation. The forum supported the idea and suggested that SRLM will perform secretarial function and will act as the official convener for JSC while Home Department will host and chair the forum. PRB also suggested meeting of JCSC on

quarterly basis whereas Terms of Reference of the forum would be prepared in consultation with forum members. Representative of Embassy of Kingdom of Netherlandsalso appreciated the formation of JSC and said that various donors were working in KP on justice sector and this forum would ensure better coordination and synergy among all actors.

- 7. Coordinator PCNA Implementation Support Unit (ISU), P&D Department
- 8. Deputy Secretary (Development) Local Governments Department
- 9. Director General, Human Rights, Central Police Office KPK
- 10. Director General Prosecution, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa
- 11. Inspector General of Prison, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa
- 12. National Technical Specialist SRLM-UNDP
- 13. Programme Manager, SRLM UNDP (Secretary of the Committee)



#### **DECISION:**

PRB approved the constitution of JSC with the composition suggested by the members

#### c. National Technical Specialist:

Ms. Sharmeela Rassool, CTS explained that the multifarious activities of the SRLM in 2013 required close and regular supervision to ensure better delivery as well as on spot guidance and support to the team. She further explained that the travel plans of the international staff from Islamabad to Peshawar, (particularly Malakand Region were) frequently disrupted due to security concerns. This warranted creation of a new post of National Technical Specialist so that there was a competent expert based in Peshawar so as to supervise the work in all the thematic areas.

#### **DECISION:**

After thorough discussion in the issue, PRB approved the position of NTS at PMU level and advised to share the TORs with Home Department.

#### d. SRLM M&E system:

Mr. Liaqat, IT Officer presented key features of M&E data base which contained information about project activities with targets, benefiacry data, stakeholder's data, etc. Ms. Sharmeela informed that it would be a web- based database which will be accessible to all the partners for monitoring progress of project activates. The participants appreciated M&E Database which would ensure transparency and access to information regarding SRLM results and beneficiaries.

#### e. ISSUES:


