Executive Summary

During the reporting period UNDP in close collaboration with Planning and Development Department, Government of Balochistan decided on cost sharing for the Balochistan Economic Development Project (2018-2019). The project has been reflected in the Provincial/ Balochistan PSDP 2016-17 and 2017-18 with the project ID Z2016.0063. BEDP strives to enhanced access to livelihood and economic opportunities for vulnerable youth and women and increase in the productivity of the private sector by applying the SDP methodology to at least 100 companies. This will lead to improve stability in the province, promoting economic development in Balochistan.

The consultant was identified for the development of BEDP PC-1 document, the Balochistan Economic Development Project document (PC-I) developed by consultant, reviewed by the project team and UNDP Country Team, feedback incorporated and submitted for Provincial Development Working Party (PDWP). The PDWP meeting conducted and approved the BEDP PC-I.

Technical and Vocational Skills is the key for the youth of Balochistan especially in the context of emerging opportunity i.e. China Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC). Before devising activities under BEDP PC-I a detailed Labour Market Survey was conducted. The Survey findings informed the BEDP PC-I.

Consultative meetings were continued with key stakeholders including Additional Chief Secretary Planning & Development Department (P&DD), Secretary P&DD, Secretary and Director General Industries and Commerce, Chief Foreign AID, Provincial Chief Small and Medium Enterprise Development Authority (SMEDA), Director B-TEVTA, UN agencies and private sector. These meetings helped in the preparation of the BEDP document. The Cost sharing agreement developed and signed with P&DD Government of Balochistan.

Youth engagement activities were carried out during the reporting period which consists of

international youth day celebrated in Quetta on August 16, 2017. More than 80 youth, males and females participated including persons with disabilities and minorities. Another event on Youth Entrepreneurship was arranged in collaboration with Sardar Bahadur Khan Women University (SBKWU) Quetta where 69 youth from different institutions participated.

While supporting the Sub-Office running cost, BEDP allocation helped the office in designing new projects for the province including, Community Resilience and Sustainable Livelihoods (RAHA-II) project, Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) Project, Strengthening Electoral and Legislative Processes (SELP) project, Rule of Law (RoL) Roadmap for Balochistan Initiative, Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM) project, Coordination with Government of Balochistan and other stakeholders for Integrated Water Management initiative through Green Climate Fund – (GCF) and China-Pakistan Humanitarian Response Initiative project.

The monitoring for the intended actions and activities planned in AWP 2017 continued. Result and expenses updated on the cumulative progress and financial expenses tracking database (R&R) were recorded. The result and expenses which have been tracked during the reporting period were uploaded along with the evidences in support of the progress in the STAR.

Introduction

The Balochistan Economic Development Programme (BEDP) in close collaboration with Planning and Development Department, Government of Balochistan decided on cost sharing for the Balochistan Economic Development Project (2018-2019). The project has been reflected in the Provincial/ Balochistan PSDP 2016-17 and 2017-18 with the project ID Z2016.0063.

Balochistan Economic Development Programme strives to (i) enhanced access to livelihood and economic opportunities for vulnerable youth and women, this supports youth entrepreneurs to set up and expand their businesses through establishment and strengthening their enterprises, this component also focusses on demand driven skill development and employment generation in emerging and expanding industries for the youth of Balochistan; (ii) increase the productivity of the private sector by applying the Suppliers' Development Programme (SDP) methodology to at least 100 companies through improved market linkages for Small and Medium Enterprises and by improving their productivity, efficiency and eventually the quality of products and services. This will lead to improve stability in the province promoting economic development in Balochistan.

Project Performance

1.1.1.a: Technical support for SDP transfer from UNDP El-Salvador.

The technical support for the SDP transfer from UNDP EI-Salvador was continued, the SDP team in Balochistan was supported via emails and skype meetings in the 1st quarter of 2017. Documents were reviewed and finalized.

1.2.1.a: Identification, training and certification of SDP consultants.

The identification of consultant for the SDP 2nd batch were advertised in the newspapers and broadcasted in through Radio Pakistan for extra coverage. Emails were shared with FAO, SMEDA, BUITEMS, SBK Women university, Quetta Chamber of Commerce and Industries, Women Chamber of Commerce, Industries and Commerce Department, P&D Department and in order to attract more applicants.

89 applicants submitted their application and showed their interested in the SDP. The grading of the assigned deliverables of SDP consultants were completed through online Moodle. Gradebook was finalized for consultants in Balochistan with support of the SDP management team. The candidates were shortlisted on the basis of their educational background and experience in the private sector, interviews conducted and candidates were selected for the 2nd batch of SDP training in Balochistan. Due to limited funding, the 2nd batch of SDP training were kept on hold.

1.3.1.a: Identification of lead companies and suppliers, diagnostics, develop, finalize and implement improvement plans for suppliers and lead companies.

During the reporting period coordination were continued with private sector, a detailed list of SMEs working in Quetta developed with the help of Quetta Chamber of Commerce and Industry (QCCI), SMEDA and UNDP coordination, however SDP applied for only one value chain (Jaan Broast) in Quetta.

3.1.1.a: Conduct mapping to identify industries with high demand for skilled labor in Balochistan

In order to identify demands for skills in different industries, an individual consultant was hired who carried out labor market assessment in five districts laying on CPEC western route (Gwadar, Khuzdar, Quetta Killa Saifullah and Zhob). The labor market assessment came up with the following skill sectors in demand:

- Construction Industry
- Mining
- Marble and Granite processing
- Tourism
- Hotel
- Ports and Shipping
- Computer, Chinese Language, Health

3.2.1.a: Identify government and private training institutes to provide vocational trainings

After the identification of demand oriented, marketable, employable skills through labor market assessment, training institute were identified. Coordination with College of Tourism and Hotel Management Karachi, SZBTECH Hyderabad, Technical Training Center, Women Training Center and with Public Health School were conducted.

Apart from this, the team coordinated with private sector in Quetta i.e. Sahaar bakers, Wow Fries, Ziaqa Hotel, Osmania restaurant, Balana Restaurant, Jaan Broast and Quetta Serena Hotel for skilled human resource requirement in their enterprises. The trainings could not be started due to lack of funding.

Action 3.2.1.b: Workers trained in high demand skills at vocational training institutes

Selection criteria for the identification of youth on high demand skills were developed, selection strategy for skill enhancement also developed. The trainings could not be organized due to non-availability of funds.

3.3.1.a: Research collaboration with selected provincial institutions to understands the linkages between unemployment and armed violence

In order the identify the linkages between unemployment and the armed violence in Balochistan, coordination done with ORIC, University of Balochistan and Balochistan University of Information & Management Science (BUITEMS) however, the management decided not to conduct this study.

3.4.1.a: Social engagement, critical skills training and sports activities for up to 250 youth

Youth engagement activities were carried out during the reporting period which consists of international youth Day celebrated in Quetta on August 16, 2017. More than 80 youth (males and females) including persons with disabilities and minorities participated in the event.

Youth's role for peacebuilding was discussed in relation with the 3 E's (engagement, education and employment) since disruption in access to either of these has a dramatic impact on achieving sustaining peace. Each participant was given a file containing handouts explaining Resolution 2250 and the 3 E's. This concept was explained to participants before commencement of the dialogue and was explained in greater detail to the moderators to ensure that the conversation remains positive and focused.

Three Main Areas discussed included;

- 1. What are the challenges that the Youth face in terms of preventing violence and extremism (PVE)
- 2. What are the opportunities that Youth sees in terms of PVE
- 3. What is required from the policy makers for the Youth to avail the opportunities

Event Summary;

- Program Manager introduced the event, and explained the rationale behind it.
- The participants were divided into two group, one was labelled as 'Youth' and the other as 'Policy Makers'. They were asked to 'role play' according to their assigned groups.
- 4 moderators were chosen from within the groups. They were tasked with note-taking and moderating the group. 2 facilitators (UNDP staff) sat with each group, they did not participate in the discussion, however, when required steered the conversation back onto track.
- Ice breaking sessions were conducted within the groups and members introduced each other.
- In the first session, the youth group was asked to discuss the challenges whereas the policy makers discussed the challenges. In second session, the policy makers discussed the solutions to the challenges identified by youth, whereas the youth discussed what is required to avail the opportunities identified by the policy makers. At the end of the two sessions, both groups presented key recommendations.

Two youth nominated and facilitated to participate in the International Youth Day Summit held at Lahore.

Youth Entrepreneurship workshop arranged in collaboration with SBK Women's University Quetta, 69 youth from different university and colleges participated in the Event.

Youth's role in Entrepreneurship Ecosystem was discussed in relation with key players (Government, Private Sector, Civil Society, Academia/Universities). since the players has a dramatic impact on Entrepreneurship ecosystem in Pakistan. Each participant was given a file containing handouts explaining the entrepreneurship ecosystem. This concept was explained to all participants before the commencement of the dialogue on Entrepreneurship. Pre-event meetings were conducted with the moderators and concept of Entrepreneurship ecosystem in Pakistan was discussed in detail, importance of social enterprises highlighted in greater detail to ensure that the conversation remains focused.

- c. Capital/Funding
