#### 2. Contents

### (1) Summary of the project

The project aims at supporting early recovery efforts in Gaza through livelihoods stabilization. The project will be engaging **430** youth in the productive sectors in order to strengthen their coping ability and productive capacities in the current adverse environment. In addition, it will offer employment to the most vulnerable youth by using different schemes and job placements that are geared towards sustaining stability and contributing to strengthening social cohesion. The following activities will be carried out through the Japan Supplementary Fund:

- Developing the Geographical Information System (GIS) for the Municipality of Rafah by engaging **70** graduates in coding and numbering of Rafah buildings.
- Supporting the Safe Summer Sea initiative, by providing decent employment opportunities for **60** lifesavers working on the Gaza seashore.
- Improving the humanitarian, health, social and cultural services for the benefit of the Gaza population through organizing apprenticeships for **300** youth in the most needed sectors mainly in health, education, sports and reconstruction.

\*It is important to highlight that the financial figures in this report are temporary figures, and may be corrected at a later stage due to exchange rate fluctuations, realised gain/loss or any other possible corrections. UNDP/PAPP's financial system operates in such a manner that the financial system closes in early December of each year and that final expenditure reports reflecting the disbursements and GMS of the previous year are only published in March of the following year.

#### 4. Any special notes or remarks

All the project's activities are being implemented and fully completed as planned. The remaining resources, amounting to USD 61,173 will be fully disbursed by 31 March 2017. During the implementation period, some lessons learned and opportunities were raised as highlighted below.

- Lessons Learned: Continued investment is needed in vocational and technical training to increase specialized skills to meet the local demands of the labour market (international demand in the area of e-work and outsourcing), especially for the benefit of persons with disability.
- **Opportunities:** Apprenticeship schemes have proved to be an effective mechanism towards meeting the needs of employers and graduates. Fresh graduates have the opportunity to build experience and network, while the employers receive subsidized

human resources. On the other hand, the public sector is willing to incubate the graduates and improve the level of service to people.
