Key Results:

- 1. A significant portion of the budget requirement for the ENIPAS rollout in 2020 was obtained from the national government. The requirement is Php 3,207,399,402 however, only Php 1,440,110,000 was included in the 2020 National Expenditure Program or NEP, thus, a budget deficit of Php 1.8B. A Legislators' Forum was organized with the Biodiversity Management Bureau and the Office of Congresswoman Josephine Ramirez Sato where 11 members of the House of Representatives pledged their support for increased budgets for protected areas. As a result, an additional Php 500 million was allocated by the House of Representatives which will be tackled in the Bicameral Conference Committee. Alternately, the Philippine Senate also approved an additional Php 90-million for Samar Island Natural Park Protected Area's budget.

 2. By taking advantage of technology in resource mobilization, BIOFIN partnered with GCash through it's GCash Forest to raise funds to restore the Ipo Watershed with World Wildlife Fund. BIOFIN facilitated the MOA signing between G-Cash and World Wildlife Fund (WWF) and as a result, Mynt donated Php 15,000,000 to WWF. GCash developed a promotional video for the partnership which won an award from the 2019 the Global Sustainability Film Awards under the Sustainable Transactions category. The annual Global Sustainability Film Awards celebrate short films showing authentic and innovative sustainability initiatives from companies and institutions worldwide. The awarding ceremony was held last November 18 in London.
- 3. Favorable outcomes emerged as an offshoot of the 2018 BioCamp, a camp co-organized with DENR Tamaraw Conservation Program (TCP) for tamaraw conservation month through 2 BioCampers. Two fund-raising activities came into fruition: production and launch of "Suwag o Suko" documentary film and roll out of the "Keep Them Wild" care of Celine Murillo and Nella Lomotan, respectively. Details of each activity are indicated under Section C, Output 2 (Crowdfunding) of this report. Both activities have the potential to sustain funds for tamaraw conservation and for the improvement of the Wildlife Rescue Center of Ninoy Aquino Parks and Wildlife Nature Center (NAPWC). BIOFIN will continue to support TCP and NAPWC by capacitating them in effectively engaging with the private sector.

BIOFIN was able to achieve 84% (Php 6.5-B) of its Php 7.7-B financial target for 2019. The target is a combination of a) funds raised and b) funds tagged and branded as contributing to the achievement of the 20 PBSAP Targets. Furthermore, the amount mobilized by BIOFIN is equivalent to the 34% of the Php 19B annual financing gap for the PBSAP implementation from 2015 to 2028, which means that BIOFIN was able narrow down the annual financing gap for 2019 to about two-thirds (76%).

B.5 Lessons learned and ways forward Leadership and sponsorship

Key stakeholders that need to be strategically engaged have to be identified, the stakeholder network strengthened and continuously engaged to ensure clear communication of objectives to achieve a shared vision. This was done in Phase 1 and continued in Phase 2. A very good example is BIOFIN's engagement with Cong. Josephine Ramirez-Sato who champions at least 3 policies on biodiversity financing. She also spearheaded the Legislators Forum which brought in an additional Php 500-million for the roll-out of the E-NIPAS. She served as Head of Delegation of the Philippines in the 40th General Assembly of the ASEAN Inter-Parliamentary Assembly (AIPA) where BIOFIN provided technical support to her Office and to the Biodiversity Management Bureau (BMB) through the development of a concept note proposing the creation of a Committee on Biodiversity. Another example is NEDA Regional Director VI Ro-Ann Bacal who issued Regional Development Council VI Resolution No. 61 series 2018 requesting the DENR Region VI and the DENR-BMB to provide technical assistance in the formulation of a Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan for Panay and Guimaras Islands. She also expressed interest in shepherding the process of mainstreaming biodiversity in all sectors. The current leadership of the Biodiversity Management Bureau in the person of OIC Assistant Secretary Dir. Ricardo Calderon provides full support to the project which has facilitated project implementation. It is also important to stress the leadership of the Project Board who have provided excellent guidance and support to BIOFIN. Decisions in project implementation are transparent and collegial.

Sustainability

A year before Phase 1 was completed, BIOFIN prepared a sustainability plan to ensure institutionalization of initiatives. One of these is the creation of the Technical Secretariat for the Implementation of the PBSAP which is seen as the body that can mainstream the BIOFIN methodology within the BMB. BIOFIN will develop an appropriate capacity-building program for this body to enable it to fully understand and appreciate the BIOFIN methodology and to implement relevant finance solutions.

An initial capacity building exercise during the first quarter has been conducted for the Technical Secretariat and key BMB technical staff based on a training needs assessment. This will also be extended to Project Board members and to other key stakeholders to enrich current wisdom and to help stakeholders see the entire picture. Included here are participation of selected Project Board members and partners to BIOFIN regional workshops and possible South-South exchanges. BIOFIN was able to mobilize in-kind resources from individuals for biodiversity conservation. In particular, the video production of "Suwag o Suko," a documentary on the tamaraw was completed due to the efforts of Ms. Celine Murillo who participated in Biocamp, a 2018 BIOFIN-sponsored activity to celebrate Tamaraw month, organized by the Tamaraw Conservation Program. The video production cost is estimated at PhP1.7 million. Another participant, Ms. Nella Lomotan from Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf was so inspired by the experience that she put up Eco Explorations, a sustainable ecotourism outfit that customizes tours focusing on nature and its conservation. Eco Explorations donates a portion of proceeds to the protected area or to the community where tours are conducted. In the case of Mt. Iglit-Baco, it has been supporting the logistical requirements of the rangers such as uniforms and solar lamps. A factor that may have led to the very strong support from Misses Murillo and Lomotan is that Biocamp was able to meet both BIOFIN's and the participants' expectations and goals. Thus, it is important to properly design activities to consider sustainability aspect. BIOFIN cites its partnership with the Philippine Biodiversity Conservation Foundation (PhilBio) in localizing the BIOFIN methodology and notes that PhilBio has slowly embraced biodiversity finance as an important aspect in conservation and has echoed this loudly with the project's LGU partners.

Cohesion and relationship management

Good relationship management which includes constant communication with and feedback from key stakeholders is important. BIOFIN will continue to provide various opportunities to exchange ideas and articulate project goals and objectives to stakeholders. These venues help ensure transparent communication and help develop trust among stakeholders. When people are aware of the relevance of the project for them and their institutions and of what their specific contribution is, they stay engaged. However, there are times that it is difficult to keep stakeholders aligned behind the overall goal and "backdoor diplomacy" and informal consultations are needed to keep them onboard. This quarter, BIOFIN continues to nurture its relationships with its partners such as the private sector (G-Cash, Canon, Faber Castell Philippines, Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf), its government and LGU partners (DENR regional offices CALABARZON, 6, 7, 9, 12, Negros Oriental, Negros Occidental) to implement its respective finance solutions and legislative partner (Office of Congresswoman Josephine Sato).

Clustering of the Finance Solutions

BIOFIN Annual Work Plan will be implementing the Board approved clustering of the finance solutions into 8 which are finance solutions aiming to: 1) improve biodiversity expenditure, 2) mainstream biodiversity in DENR regional programs, 3) mainstream biodiversity in LGUs, 4) increase funding in protected areas, and FSs involving 5) the private sector, 6) citizenry, 7) studies, and 8) support to policies.

The special screening of "Suwag o Suko" (crowdfunding) on October 30 resulted to pledges from civil society and private sector partners which can ensure the sustainability of the tamaraw ranger fund.
	An outcome of the Legislators Forum (PA investment program) is that an additional PhP 500 million for the Expanded National Integrated Protected Areas (ENIPAS) roll-out in 2020 has been allocated by the House of Representatives. Philippine Senate also approved an additional Php 90-million for Samar Island Natural Park Protected Area's budget. The more legislators are aware of PAs, their importance, and their role as PAMB member, it will hopefully translate to more supporters in Congress in securing budgets for PAs. There have been inclusions in the budgets of the provinces of Negros Oriental and Negros Occidental for biodiversity projects. DENR regional offices' costing of their BSAPs can also be used as forward estimates and for future project development.

	The creation of the Technical Secretariat for the Implementation of the PBSAP is seen as the body that can mainstream the BIOFIN methodology within the BMB. The Philippine Commission on Women or PCW officially requested its exclusion from the PBSAP-BIOFIN Project Board and Technical Working Group last Jan. 6, 2015. The reason cited was that "the commission puts its trust on the Department of Environment and Natural Resources-Biodiversity Management Bureau's GAD focal point system to ensure the mainstreaming of gender equality and women's empowerment into national strategies."

To date, representation at the project board consists of 21 males and 15 females while the technical working group consists of 18 males and 17 females.

The case of Vicky Mari, Population Program Officer 1, Environment and Natural Resources Division of Negros Occidental province demonstrates how the BIOFIN methodology can empower women in mainstreaming biodiversity into local plans. She participated in BIOFIN's localization activities, particularly in the formulation of their finance plan, and has been instrumental in crafting their province's costing of biodiversity programs. At the beginning, it was unclear to her how the localization of the BIOFIN methodology can facilitate mobilization of resources for the conservation of Negros Oriental's biodiversity. Coupled with uncertainty and lack of confidence due to

limited representation of relevant PLGU's personnel in the finance planning activities, she continued attending a number of workshops with BIOFIN and PBCFI where she learned how to prioritize their province's biodiversity programs as well as to come up with the costing. To date, they have costed their priority programs (51 actions across the PBSAP targets) amounting to Php 354,269,330.00 from 2020 to 2028. With her persistence and dedication, along with her team composed of the Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Officer and Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Offices of Sta. Catalina, Negros Oriental serves as a model for other provinces (i.e. Cebu and Negros Occidental) in terms of mainstreaming biodiversity into local plans through the BIOFIN methodology.
