The Disaster Risk Management Project mission to East New Britain together with ABG and Bougainville Disaster and Emergency Services Office Staff was to meet with the RVO and the ENB PDC was for the purposes as stated above. The team then went onto Bougainville after the mission in East New Britain. Below is the summary of the mission outputs/findings;

1. Field Trip to Rabaul Volcanic Observatory(RVO)

- <u>ARoB Volcano Risk</u>: In addition to Mt. Bagana (active), three other volcanoes Billi Mitchel, Balbi, both near Bagana, and Lolohu, on the southern end of the Bougainville Island are considered of potential risk (i.e., having erupted in the last 1,000 years or less);
- These three other volcanoes should be monitored locally as they may move from dormant to active quickly, with the risk that people near the volcano do not realize the changing risk until too late. The RVO noted that an advantage for Bagana is that its constant eruptions keep people alert and away from the more dangerous parts of the volcano;
- A detailed assessment of volcanoes was conducted for Bougainville island in the 1970s by Australia. The RVO will see if they still have a copy;

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- Offer to have AROB Government arrange for a new observer for Bagana.

2. Technical Visit to ENB Provincial Disaster office

- It was a learning opportunity for the ABG and the Bougainville Disaster Office staff around how well East New Britain managed natural hazards and disasters with focus on volcano as it poses a great risk for Bougainville as well. Example of such was the response and recovery of the Mt Tavurvur Eruption in 1994;
- The establishment of Gazelle Restoration Authority(GRA) was basically focusing on Restoration programme on Health, Education and Infrastructure;
- The biggest advantage that lead to the success of GRA and the overall recovery and restoration programme in ENB was the acceptance of the Internally Displaced Persons(IDPs) by the host communities;
- Collaboration between the Government, Private Sector, NGOs including formal and informal community groups played a key role in the success of GRA;
- Taking Proactive approach based on the Early Warning Messages help to reduce the impact of the disasters that enable effective and coordinated response that led to successful recovery.
- Small craft safety issues were also discussed to look at ways of better coordination in response to missing small crafts at sea bordering East New Britain and Bougainville.

3. AROB Field Visit

- The 3 days workshop started with the review of the DRM Capacity Assessment by AROB disaster Office, representatives from various agencies within ABG and the NGOs;
- Other discussions include the planning needs and further development of DRM Plan in AROB as well as the discussion on Core Disaster Risk Management Plan with the aim of standardizing it across agencies;
- Development of the Tsunami Evacuation and Response Plan that includes how to plan for and manage evacuation, what to do once the tsunami has hit and how to reduce the impact of a tsunami before it occurs

As usual, the team had a Security Briefing with the UNDP Bougainville Office Local Security Associate and later had workshops in the 3 days followed by the debriefing with the Secretary of Community Government, Mr Wesley Kenneth.

A total of 18 participants (14 males and 4 females) attended the workshop on the first day. On the second day, there were 17 participants (3 females and 14 males) while on the third day, there were only 13 participants (3 females and 10 males).

Additional Update:

IOM has been supporting the DESO in the development of a Disaster Risk Reduction Strategic Plan 2017 - 2022.¹ The strategic plan and related documents have already been reviewed by the government, e.g., President's Office, and appear to be in near-final content. Work is underway to explain the strategy and plans to district officials. In sum, the IOM-supported efforts are well advanced, and extend beyond Buka Town.

The Director, DSD, explained that the overall disaster risk reduction strategy and plan development process underway is as follows:

- 1. The AROB Government is developing an overall (developmental) strategy.
- 2. Once this overall strategy is approved (gazetted) then a disaster-specific strategy can move forward for approval by Bougainville Executive Council(BEC).
- 3. This process may also include the establishment of an ARoB-specific disaster act before or after the disaster strategy is approved.

¹ The Strategy Plan document provided by IOM in Port Moresby was said to not be complete when compared to the document currently used in ARoB.

- 4. An ARoB disaster strategic plan will be aligned with the (draft) National DRR Framework.
- 5. The establishment of an ARoB disaster strategy/plan will be linked to the establishment of the ARoB disaster committee. The committee has a TOR in place
- 6. The Department of Community Government is also developing strategic plan, and it has not been decided how disaster planning will be part of this plan.
- 7. The DESO Multi-Hazard Response Procedures will remain a stand-alone document.
- 8. A monitoring and evaluation framework will be added to the current disaster risk reduction strategic plan draft.
- 9. The DESO expects to have a single disaster strategy and plan document as a product.
- 10. The degree to which the DRM Core Content or (draft) ARoB Disaster Recovery plan documents can be incorporated into the current Disaster Risk Reduction Strategic Plan is unclear, in part because the full plan has not been provided and because it is unclear how points 1 to 8 will affect the planning process and final product.

Potential for Partnerships in DRR:

- 1. There is a great potential for partnership in DRR at the local level especially with agencies such as CARE, Plan, Red Cross and few others that are currently doing DRR work at the community level;
- 2. There is a need for better coordination at the regional level to ensure partnerships are enhanced and each agency to have some basic idea of who is doing what and where.

Observations/Challenges:

- 1. Lack of leadership and coordination at the regional level;
- 2. Funding remains a challenge;
- 3. Each agency doing their own plan, hence a need for core content of DRM Planning to be accepted that provides uniformity in planning;
- 4. Regular field visit and support from UNDP to ensure the activities are fully implemented and results achieved.
