Objective(s) of Mission:

- 1. Support the SLCS during the training programme and follow-up to ensure SLCS successful implementation of training capstone(s) upon return to Sierra Leone
- 2. Strengthened awareness of correctional management and international best practices

Background:

On 1 October 2016 the Sierra Leone Correctional Service (SLCS) with support from Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs under the US Department of State (INL/US) and United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) launched their new 27 month 'From Prisons to Corrections' project to: (1) Improve institutional capacity of Correctional Facilities in accordance with international human rights standards for inmates and staff, and (2) Strengthen capacity of SLCS staff to improve on the welfare of inmates and ensure the safety and security of society.

The project is in its last year of implementation. Sequentially, the INL/US have been funding SLCS Officers to attend Correctional Management and Industries training at the International Corrections Management Training Center (ICMTC) in Canon City, Colorado. So far 20 SLCS Officers have benefited from this training and which have seen improvements such as SLCS procedures for key and tool controls, prison farming activities commenced, individual Facility Managers developing action plans for Centres to mention a few. From 13 – 25 August 2018, INL has offered its third training opportunity for 9 SLCS Officers and 1 Officer from Prison Watch (PWSL) a local civil society organisation. The training team will be together with a similar mission team from Central African Republic where INL equally is supporting correctional reform. As per previous practice, INL has requested UNDP to accompany the mission team and also ensure follow-up on training objectives, capstone and commitments once the SLCS Officers return to their posts in Sierra Leone.

Main Findings:

 The Sierra Leone delegation was led by Regional Commander South, Ms. Salimatu Bangura and comprised 9 SLCS officers, including facility managers, reception officers and also SLCS HQ support staff as well as 1 PWSL staff member – the research, monitoring and evaluation officers.

- The delegates remained interested and participated actively throughout the 10 days of training. The SLCS officers appreciated the different modules offered during the Correctional Management Training and reflected on these against their local context. One example is the classification and management module and the visit to the Denver Intake facility where prisoners are classified following sentencing by the Colorado Courts. Several of the SLCS Officers had participated in the development and implementation of the pilot inmate classification tool prior to the ICMTC training and valued the opportunity to witness a fully functional classification system and appreciated how this effectively assists the Correctional Service in Colorado to ensure placement of inmates against their needs and security risk;
- Already from the first week, the delegates started to discuss and identify suitable capstones which was not an
 easy process for them, as they also wanted to be sure that the two capstones would be realistically attainable
 upon return to Sierra Leone. The two groups final selection was 1. Classification and, 2. Security Development
 of Riot Control Policy and training of staff (see Annex 1 and 2) which were presented to the ICMTC trainers and
 other participants;
- During debriefing with UNDP INL Project Manager, the delegates discussed strategy to ensure achievement of these same capstones. This included presentation of capstones to Senior Management SLCS upon return to Sierra Leone and holding a follow-up meeting for Colorado Team 1, 2 and 3 on their respective capstones and progress so far in October 2018, which UNDP committed to also discussing with the SLCS Director General and Deputy Director General. (The debriefing meeting and presentation to SLCS senior management took place immediately upon return);
- Delegates also placed emphasis on new acquired knowledge from the ICMTC training and that this would prove helpful if their future work, including to support implementation of the ongoing classification pilot, the industries masterplan and already ongoing initiatives in relation to educational programmes for both Correctional Officers and inmates;
- A key finding by the SLCS Officers and UNDP also included that of the lack of a preventive maintenance plan (PMP) for the Correctional Service in Sierra Leone, UNDP will support discussions with SLCS Senior Management to develop a PMP;
- The delegates urged the UNDP INL PM to recommend to the INL/US that more SLCS Officers be considered for a similar training programme in the future. In furtherance, they queried whether it could be possible also to receive the ICMTC trainers in Sierra Leone in support of further progressing their reform priorities under the SLCS Strategic Plan.
- The UNDP INL Project Manager also sincerely appreciated witnessing the ICMTC trainings and methods applied by senior Correctional Training Advisers and not least field visits to Correctional Facilities.

Recommendations:

- Given the upcoming intervention within the UNDP/INL project support to SLCS in enhancing the Correctional Training Academy capacity including to review and further develop the training school curricula, it is a key recommendation of this report that the possibility to collaborate with the ICMTC Training Institute and trainers be explored. Given the vast experience of the trainers also with providing training at ICMTC and at their own training academy for new officers, but also the advantage for the ICMTC in terms of also gaining further contextual knowledge of challenges and opportunities for advancing correctional management in countries such as Sierra Leone;
- That possible future US/INL trainings offered to SLCS staff also include a representative from UNDP as this
 provides a useful insight into capacities of the Correctional Service officers participating and allows UNDP to
 follow-up on commitments made in terms of capstones;
- UNDP INL PM will support the initiative of the SLCS Officers to hold a capstone meeting with 'Colorado ICMTC 1,2 and 3 in October 2018.
