SECTION 1 – KEY DEVELOPMENTS DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD

- The bill establishing the National Independent Electoral Commission (NIEC) was passed by Federal Parliament on 11 February 2015 on the last day of that parliamentary session. The UN Integrated Electoral Support Group comprising UNSOM and UNDP advisers provided advice and recommendations to the parliamentary committee together with a senior electoral consultant engaged by UNDP. Several of the recommendations that were made to the committee were adopted and reflected in the final NIEC law.
- The selection process for the nine NIEC commissioners commenced on 11 March when the Ministry of Interior and Federal Affairs (MoIFA) announced vacancies for the NIEC and the Boundaries and Federation Commission (BFC). The UN Integrated Electoral Support Group collaborated with the UNSOM Public Information Office to develop a news story and video on these vacancies for publication and broadcast by Somalia's media outlets to disseminate information widely and encourage applications.
- Two plans were developed for the physical establishment of the NIEC's office in Mogadishu: a medium term plan to establish the NIEC together with the BFC at a site on Airport Road and, in response to a request by the Prime Minister's Office, an interim plan for NIEC and BFC to be temporarily established at Villa Somalia. UNDP engaged an architect and utilized in-house engineers who conducted site assessments of both locations, drew up plans and prepared budget estimates. Preparations to procure contractors, pre-fabricated structures as well as office equipment and furniture were initiated.
- A new Joint Programme for electoral support developed together with MoIFA received initial endorsement¹ by the Somalia Development and Reconstruction Facility (SDRF) Steering Committee for funding from the UN Multi Partner Trust Fund (MPTF). The Joint Programme is for a six month period (1 April to 30 September 2015) focusing on four priority areas: (i) the physical establishment of the NIEC, (ii) capacity development of the NIEC, (iii) development of the legal framework for elections and referendum and (iv) raising awareness of the legal framework and electoral processes. The budget for the initial six month period is US \$3 million. The Joint Programme builds on the work of the Project Initiation Plan (PIP) which will roll over into the Joint Programme once that is fully established.
- During this quarter a new Prime Minister took office and a new cabinet was installed. Progress and the passage of the NIEC bill had been delayed due to political uncertainty and the preoccupation of parliament in approving the new cabinet. The bill was eventually passed on 11 February. A new minister for Interior and Federal Affairs was named as part of the new cabinet.

A draft Joint Programme for approval by the SDRF was developed together with MoIFA. The PIP will roll over into the Joint Programme once the latter is fully established.

Recruitment was initiated for three national assistants – Project assistant, Administrative and Finance assistant, and Procurement assistant.

An international Operations Specialist was brought onboard on a detail assignment to support the project.

SECTION 3 – CROSS-CUTTING ISSUES (GENDER, PEACE AND CONFLICT, HUMAN RIGHTS)

Two of the key recommendations by UN advisers on the NIEC bill were to set a minimum number of women commissioners and to broaden the criteria for NIEC membership to enable more women to qualify as commissioners. These were reflected in the final NIEC law which provides for a minimum of two out of the nine commissioners to be women (the recommendation had been for a minimum of three out of nine) and includes experience working for civil society as one of the possible criteria to qualify as commissioner.

SECTION 4 – CHALLENGES / LESSONS LEARNT

The main achievement in this quarter was the passing of the NIEC bill incorporating several of the UN's recommendations. The bill was passed on the last day of the session despite concerns that passage of the bill would be postponed due to parliament's preoccupation with approving the new cabinet. The determination of the Speaker and FGS to prioritize the NIEC bill together with continued engagement by UN leadership with the FGS leadership were instrumental in enabling the bill to be passed without further delay. Similar engagement with the FGS will be necessary to ensure that the appointment of the NIEC commissioners and drafting of the electoral law are expedited in the next quarter.
