SECTION 1 - KEY DEVELOPMENTS DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD

In Quarter 2 the **HIV Project was successful in raising \$956,873 to support HIV work in Somalia**. UNDP signed an HIV Prevention Project Proposal and MOU with UNICEF, the Principal Recipient for the HIV Global Fund grant for Somalia in May 2016. Total value of the MOU is \$681,200. This funding will assist UNDP to support the following activities in Somalia between 1st June 2016 and 31st December 2017.

HIV Prevention Project

- 1. Support Peer Education for Key Populations in Somalia
- 2. Prevention with Positives (PwP)
- 3. Mainstream HIV in Line Ministries
- 4. Human Rights and medical ethics training for Health Providers
- 5. HIV Regional and District Sensitisation training
- 6. Conduct a Mid-cycle Review of National Strategic Plan 2015-2019 and M & E Plan 2015-2019
- 7. World AIDS Day support
- 8. Participate in International AIDS Conference
- 9. Ministry of Health and National AIDS Commission exposure visit

To complement the above, and at the request of the UNICEF, **UNDP also signed an Amendment with the PR on 21**st **June 2016** for \$275,672 to support additional two activities, as outlined below:

- 1. **PR Review Meeting** for all three Global Fund Grants for Somalia HIV, TB and Malaria. This will take place in September 2016
- 2. **Exposure Visit** for the AIDS Commission, Ministry of Health, Health Workers, People Living with HIV and CSO Representatives to Rwanda, which is planned to take place in October 2016

A significant amount of time in Quarter 2 (2016) was therefore dedicated to finalizing UNDP's proposal to the Global Fund, and preparing the necessary paper work to support the transfer of funds from UNICEF to UNDP. To support this new project, in Quarter 2 the HIV Project also developed a new HIV Annual Work Plan (AWP) for 2016, an M &E framework to help ensure the smooth implementation of this new project, and in collaboration worked with PPU to set up new Award for this new HIV Project in Atlas.

Noting that the HIV Project has secured additional funds to support HIV related activities in Somalia for 2016 and 2017, means that UNDP will no longer be closing the HIV Project (as was envisaged might be the case in December 2015).

Lastly, to support this new HIV Project, in Q2 the HIV and Gender Projects jointly conducted Project Board Review Meetings in Garowe and Hargiesa. Board Meetings discussed activities included in the new project, the annual work plan and funding challenges.

Narrative update on Progress towards Output

To support the above output, in Q2 the HIV Project completed all the paper work (mentioned in the Introduction above) to support the implementation of the following activities, which will commence in Q3.

- i. Conduct a Risk Assessment of Key Populations in Somalia
- ii. Provide Technical Assistance to develop a comprehensive PLHIV intervention package which includes PLHIV Peer Counsellor training on Positive Self-Management Program for HIV (PSMP) and the development of job aids to support this work.
- iii. Develop a Prevention with Positives (PwP) Strategy for Somalia to protect the human rights of people affected by AIDS, mitigate gender-related vulnerability, and address the impact of AIDS on women and girls.
- iv. Develop job aids for PLHIV Peer Education
- v. Facilitate Training for 9 Training of Trainers on the above training curriculum
- vi. Development of Peer Education guidelines and support package for PLHIV including managing stress; healthy eating and understanding medications and their side effects
- vii. Submit report with findings from the assessment of the current strategy for PLHIV in Somalia and with recommendations

Output 2 - Ensure an enabling environment for the response

Narrative update on Progress towards Output

In Quarter 2, UNDP focused on resource mobilization and finalizing all paperwork and agreements with the Global Fund and UNICEF (Principal Recipient for the Global Fund Grant in Somalia). The HIV Prevention project that UNDP will support, will assist the 3 AIDS Commissions in leading a multi-sectoral response to HIV in Somalia. In Quarter 2, UNDP was successful at mobilizing \$956,872.40 from the Global Fund to support this work. As a result, very few activities were actually implemented in Q2, the majority of activities the HIV project supports will commence in Q3.

In Quarter 2 the HIV Project supported mainstreaming HIV into several Sectors, an area where UNDP is expected to take the lead, as per UNAIDS Global Division of Labour.

For example, the HIV Project in collaboration with UNAIDS, WHO and UNICEF provided inputs to support HIV mainstreaming in the **National Development Plan 2017-2019**, currently being developed by the Federal Government.

In Puntland, the HIV Project also worked with the Rule Of Law (ROL) and UNDP Gender project to mainstream HIV into activities they carried out. For example, the Judiciary Project at UNDP mainstreamed HIV in a Letter Of Agreement (LOA) they signed with Puntland State University (PSU). This resulted in approximately 25 judges participating in 3 day HIV sensitization training at Puntland State University (PSU) between 2nd and 5th June 2016. The Judges that participated in this training came from all different regions in Puntland. Sensitising the Judiciary about the stigma and discrimination that People Living with HIV in Puntland, to help better support the rights of People Living with HIV in Puntland.

In addition, HIV was mainstreamed into training carried out for the Police in Puntland. Recognising that the Police are considered a high risk group in Somalia (and globally) this collaboration with the Police Project at UNDP is considered particularly important.

Output 3 - Support Programme Management and Coordination

Narrative update on Progress towards Output

In Quarter 2 the HIV Project succeeded to mobilise \$956,873 to support HIV work in Somalia over the next 18 months – 1st July 2016 – 31st December 2017. To ensure strong Programme Management and Coordination of this new project, the HIV Project spent Quarter 2 developing the necessary project management tools, listed below, to support the roll out of this new project.

- 1. HIV Annual Work Plan for 2016 developed to support the implementation of this new project
- 2. **HIV Monitoring Framework developed** to monitor and track progress of all activities included in 2016 workplan
- 3. New HIV Project Award opened in Atlas where the budget for this new project has been inputted
- 4. **The HIV Specialist** at UNDP will provide the necessary technical input for all activities. This will include reviewing all curricula to support HIV training carried out for Key Populations, People Living with HIV, Health Workers, as well as the Agenda for the PR Review meeting and Exposure Trip to Rwanda. This will help ensure that all of the above training and meetings are as effective as possible.
- 5. **UNDP HIV Project Officers based in Somalia** will participate in the majority of activities included in this proposal, to provide the necessary technical input and ensure that all activities are carried out to a high standard
- 6. UNDP Somalia's **Monitoring and Evaluation Specialist and Project Officer** will provide oversight and help monitor the implementation of all activities included in this new project.
- 7. **Third Party Monitoring** UNDP Somalia has engaged a Third Party Monitoring organisation to help monitor all work UNDP supports in Somalia. The overall objective of their work is to assess whether project objectives are being met, evaluate impact and to establish the challenges thereof in the in the implementation process. The Third Party Monitoring organisation will help assess whether intended outputs, outcomes, and impacts are achieved by this project; establish if implementation process for the projects were adhered to and obtain beneficiary feedback through Focus Group Discussions with direct and indirect beneficiaries of this project. This will allow UNDP to capture success stories as well as challenges in future reports to the Global Fund.

Section 3 - Cross-Cutting Issues (Gender, HIV/AIDS, peace and conflict, human rights)

The HIV and Gender Projects continue to support several joint MCGs with CSO partners to support Community Conversations on HIV and Gender. Both projects have found this to be good practice to help implementing partners of both projects address both of these cross-cutting issues. This also makes sense noting that gender issues such as FGM, GBV and other cultural practices make women more vulnerable to HIV infection than men.

SECTION 4 – CHALLENGES / LESSONS LEARNT

As mentioned above, the HIV and Gender Projects at UNDP, that both fall under the Cross Cutting Unit at UNDP continue to look at ways they can complement each other's work, recognizing the close overlaps between HIV and gender issues in Somalia.

By working in close collaboration with the UNAIDS Joint Team on AIDS for Somalia, and the Principal Recipient for the Global Fund HIV Grant for Somalia (UNICEF Somalia), in Quarter 2 UNDP was able to mobilse additional funding to support HIV work at UNDP. This highlights the benefits of working closely with other UN Agencies as ONE UN on a Joint Programme, which in this case is supported by the Global Fund.

In Quarter 2 UNDP together with UNAIDS and WHO provided inputs to the Technical Working Group on Health to try and ensure that HIV is mainstreamed in the National Development Plan 2017-2019 currently being developed for Somalia. This is critical to support resource mobilization for HIV work as well as the longer term sustainability for all HIV work in Somalia.

Financial	Due to the reduction in the overall HIV grant from the Global Fund for Somalia for the period 2015-2017 (approximately \$2-3 million less than 2013-2014), there is less funding available to support HIV Prevention activities, that are key areas of work where UNDP is expected to take the lead (as per UN Global Division of Labour). Due to these cuts UNDP will not be able to provide the same level of support to the AIDS Commission, NGOs working on HIV or to the Networks supporting People Living with HIV in Somalia in 2016-2017. This is of great concern to partners in Somalia.	The HIV Project is working with UNAIDS and the UN Joint team on AIDS (JUNTA) to try and raise additional resources for HIV work in Somalia. The HIV Project will also make a concerted effort to strengthen mainstreaming HIV into other UNDP projects where appropriate. This was one of the recommendations of the Assessment of Development Results report from 2014 – 'From a programme efficiency perspective, mainstreaming HIV and AIDS into other programmes has the potential to be very efficient, especially in the context of a relatively low prevalence. Moreover, working with JPLG on including HIV and AIDS issues, and specifically the community conversations, into district plans is an efficient way of undertaking this work' (page 75; ADR Report, UNDP Somalia 2014)
