## **Opening Remarks:**

Ms. Jacqueline Olweya, Deputy Resident Representative, UNDP-Somalia, in her opening remarks, welcomed the participants and said that UNDP is pleased to partner with the Federal Government for this important initiative. The project is first ever UNDP-Green Climate Fund (GCF) project in Somalia. She acknowledged the very good efforts put in place by Government of Somalia in terms of mitigating impacts of Climate Change and moving forward environment related issues through the leadership of the Directorate of Environment and Climate Change, Office of the Prime Minister. She added that significant progress has been made on policy developments, including national climate change policy, national environmental policy and related acts. While acknowledging the progress made in recent years, she noted that vulnerability to Climate Change for Somalia is very high and associated shocks negatively impact the institutions and communities across the country. She added that the project will support upstream actions to influence planning and budgeting systems for integrating climate change adaptation at national and sub-national levels.

She then introduced to the participants to the two objectives of LPAC meeting. First to review the project and propose improvements and second to endorse the project for final approval. She then invited the participants for their introduction.

Mr. Ahmed Yusuf Ahmed, Director General, Office of Environment and Climate Change, Office of the Prime Minister, appreciated the UNDP and GCF support to Somalia. He briefed the participant on the country context and said that impact of the COVID-19 was felt globally and Somalia as well. He said that there are 500 confirmed cases in Somalia with 30 reported death. He underscored that the COVID-19 Pandemic impacted the continuity of ongoing and planned projects including the Cross-Cutting Capacity Development, Biennial Reporting Update, and the Integrated Water Resource Management. He also highlighted the impacts of the recent flash floods that occurred in many parts of Somalia including Beletweyn, Gardo and Gedo region. In Gardo alone there are reported loss of lives and livelihoods, collapse of key business centers and more than 50% of the town got displaced. He reiterated that an urgent solution to these climatic shocks and interventions including emergency response is of priority for the flood affected districts and regions.

The Director General said that the project was long awaited, the project is climate change adaptation and Climate Change is a key issue in Somalia as its effect is evident in the form of recurring droughts and flash floods in many regions and districts. He cited that Green Climate Fund (GCF) has already approved the project, and good to see the efforts of the last two years or so, and sincerely thanked all those who were involved and worked tirelessly as we look forward to the completion of remaining stages including its implementation.

Ms. Jacqueline Olweya thanked the Director General for highlighting the current Country context as it is now and reiterating the need for this project. She said that not only COVID-19 is a challenge for Somalia but also the floods that really compounds the efforts to try and mitigate its impacts. She emphasised that the GCF Readiness project is much needed as it would reinforce national efforts to respond to the challenges highlighted by the Director General.

### Presentation:

Mr. Abdul Qadir Rafiq, Portfolio Manager, Resilience and Climate Change, presented the project to the LPAC. The Project was approved for funding by the Green Climate Fund on 4<sup>th</sup> December 2019.

As part of the project overview, he said that the project is funded by Green Climate Fund with the objective to "Strengthen the Climate Change Adaptation planning for the Federal Government of Somalia (FGS) and Federal Member States (FMSs). He briefed the participants about GCF and main eligibility criteria for countries to secure funding from GCF. He also shared the approval process of GCF for the project.

Briefing the participants on the project strategy, Abdul Qadir mentioned that Somalia is one of the most vulnerable countries in the world to the impacts of climate change. The FGS is committed to the establishment a national climate change adaptation planning framework to serve as a baseline and to guide future climate change adaptation policies and projects. The project addresses each of these issues and builds upon the foundation that were created when the country formulated its National Adaptation Programme of Action (NAPA) in 2013. The project also addresses the priorities that were elucidated in the country's Nationally Determined Contribution (NDC) and is consistent with the 9<sup>th</sup> National Development Plan.

The project will be implemented through three strategically linked components, each of which contains a set of sub-components with relevant detailed activities. At the end of the project, each of the three components will result in an outcome, including: 1) Robust National institutional coordination and capacity for Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) planning; 2) Enhanced State-level technical capacity for climate change adaptation planning; and 3) Accelerated Financial planning for CCA at national and sub-national level.

Outcome 1 focuses more at the Federal level with Directorate of Environment and Climate Change being the lead. To come up with proper federal level adaptation planning the Directorate will engage other ministries including Ministry of Planning, Investment and Economic Development, Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs and Disaster Management, and Ministry of Women and Human Rights Development. This will also require coordination and consultations among state and non-state actors.

Outcome 2 focus on the federal member states where varying level of capacities do exist. The project will support capacity development, scooping studies, adaptation planning, development of the awareness guidelines, establishment coordination structure for Climate Change Adaptation (CCA), integrate CCA in budgetary systems and identify priority adaptation measures in each of the federal member states.

Outcome 3 focus on the formulation of a National Adaptation Financing Plan for CCA Strategy, identification of several projects for CCA, establishment of CCA fund and setting climate proofing guidelines for investment projects.

The presentation also covered: i) Gender Mainstreaming as per UNDP and GCF requirements; ii) linkages to the National Development Plan, UN Strategic Framework and UNDP Country Programme Document; iii) Project management structure; iv) UNDP/GCF Implementation Procedures; v) Monitoring and Evaluation; and, vi) Project Assurance Checklist. # **Comments and Feedback:**

The Chair opened the floor for comments and feedback after the project presentation. The comments from participants and responses are recorded in the table below:
