CONTEXTUAL ANALYSIS

FEDERAL LEVEL

The new federal government will have reflections and an influence on future project strategies and priorities. Furthermore, given the government's control of Kismayo, the Juba region has emerged as a priority intervention area in addition to Gedo and Bay regions which have been the focus thus far.

The recent floods in Baladwyne has led to the displacement of thousands of people according to the central authorities, and the project will re prioritize and revise its planned interventions in South Central Somalia to include these areas.

PUNTLAND

The President's reshuffle of the cabinet affected project partner ministries, namely the ministries of fisheries, livestock, agriculture, commerce, and labour and youth. The impact of the reshuffle is still unclear though the intention was to enhance the ministries capacities. Additionally, the recent devaluation of the Somali Shilling against the U.S. Dollar (approx. 30%), created a drastic rise in the costs related to project / activity implementation.

Lastly, the security situation continues to be challenging, particularly in Galkayo, with increased incidents of armed conflict and kidnapping of development staff, subsequently the implementation of field monitoring missions was difficult to facilitate in Q3.

SOMALILAND

The National Election Commission declared that local elections will be held on the 28th of November 2012. This announcement has led local investors, in particular the Somali diaspora, to put their investment activities on hold until the election results have been announced. The suspended investment activities has had a negative affect on the vulnerable population who are often dependent on casual work to cover daily living expenses.

Conversely, Q3 saw positive economic impacts as well, owing to Eid Alfidr / the Hajj season. The volume of livestock trade (export) increased for the 2 months before Hajj, and it subsequently contributed to an increase in income of the people involved across the business chain. The higher income, and disposable income, increased liquidity in the market which in turn stimulated demand for other commodities.

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ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS

FEDERAL LEVEL

In response to the floods in Baladwyne, the project has designed sub-projects to help maintain the livelihoods of those affected, and strengthen the resilience of the town. Proposed projects include the rehabilitation of a slaughter house which will generate work for approximately 100 retailers.

PUNTLAND

As a result of field missions both inland and in coastal areas, community priority areas were identified in a participatory manner. Appropriate interventions designed and developed targeting vulnerable women and youth in Eyl, Karin, Beyla, Galdagob, Bosaso, Galkayo and Qarhis. Access to water and non-functional community productive infrastructure remain the primary community challenges.

SOMALILAND

In Somaliland, Burao airport rehabilitation is planned in 3 phases. In close cooperation with ILO, WFP, and other actors, the project has contributed to designing the intervention in phase 1 of the work plan. The proposed intervention will focus on Cash for Work activities while ILO will provide technical assistance.

PARTNERSHIPS

The project partners with government agencies, NGOs, and UN agencies. In coordination with UNDP Somalia's HIV / AIDs unit, the project advertised 3 Request for Proposals (RFPs) to help the livelihood of the people living with HIV / AIDs in Somaliland, Puntland, and South Central.

The project has also contributed to the Mogadishu Rehabilitation Coordination Mechanism.

In Somaliland, the project is working closely with ILO, WFP, and governmental partners to support the airport rehabilitation work in Burao.

In Puntland, the project has conducted joint missions with MoPIC, MoLYS and MoF on several occasions to assess community needs.

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PEACE AND CONFLICT

In harmony with the 'Do No Harm principle' and to avoid creating conflicts within targeted communities the project emphasizes meeting and listening to the views of a diversified stratum of representatives and community groups - this was followed during all joint missions and visits to the field.

One of the major contributions the project participated in to encourage peace building between people in conflict was the establishment of a project board for the 'Alternative Livelihoods to Piracy' activities. The boards are led by the Minister of Labor, Youth and Sports and include representatives from other ministries and councils of target districts in Puntland and Central regions. Although some of those areas are officially in conflict with the Puntland Government, the project has managed to have all members together to discuss and decide on the strategy, plans and progress.

GENDER

Engagement in the economic empowerment of women is a significant component of the overall strategy and policy of the project. The sub project mandates the involvement of women groups in all stages of project activities, starting from the needs assessment, to community mobilization, and monitoring and evaluation of the project.

The LED project also ensures women's representation in the Project Management Committee in the targeted communities. Also, the project has a policy that mandates at least 30% of the beneficiaries in employment generation must be women. During the reporting period, the project successfully engaged women workers who represented 32.5% of the total short term workforce. 70 - 80% of direct beneficiaries of long-term job opportunities were women.

UPCOMING QUARTER

The Local Economic Development (LED) project will continue to support communities contributing to the local economic development plans (gender, conflict and disaster sensitive). It will also continue to rehabilitate priority social basic and productive infrastructure in South Central, Puntland, and Somaliland.

The project plans to invest in activities that aim to create long-term job opportunities, of which 50% would be self-employed, for women, youth and other vulnerable groups through the provision of skills training, cash grants, and physical assets. At the same time, activities to generate short term employment remains to be the priority. Through short term employment, women, youth and other vulnerable groups including IDPs, ex-combatants, people living with HIV / AIDS, and disabilities will benefit.

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REFLECTIONS / LESSONS

Conducting joint missions with government and NGOs partners, and other UN agencies is an excellent approach to coordinate activities, unify understanding, and to plan comprehensively. Furthermore such missions highly assist in the understanding needs of different communities and different groups within the community and assist in proper planning.

These missions have brought to light the fact that basic infrastructure in most sectors is almost absent or damaged and special attention from different actors needs be paid to this. It also emerged that the remote areas were in more need of infrastructure rehabilitation and the impact of any intervention, big or small, is felt and appreciated as compared to more heavily populated towns and districts..
