Standard Grant Agreement

(Micro-Capital Grant Agreement)

This Memorandum of Understanding is provided as a tool that can be adapted to the specific needs of a particular programme. Micro-Capital Grant Agreements should be approved by an independent mechanism such as a Steering Committee. This grant agreement serves to register the commitments and results that the recipient institution has agreed to produce. It is recommended that funds be released in tranches, based on results. These results should be clearly specified, such that it is clear to all parties when a recipient institution qualifies for release of tranches of funds.

TERMINOLOGY

- 1. This Agreement utilizes the harmonized terminology in line with the revised <u>financial regulations</u> and rules (FRR) which have introduced new/redefined terms as follows:
 - a. 'Execution' is the overall ownership and responsibility for UNDP programme results at the country level which is exercised by the government, through the Government Coordinating Agency by approving and signing the Country Programme Action Plan (CPAP) with UNDP. Therefore, all activities falling within the CPAP are nationally executed.
 - b. 'Implementation' is the management and delivery of programme activities to achieve specified results, specifically the mobilization of UNDP programme inputs and their use in producing outputs that will contribute to development outcomes, as set forth in the Annual Work Plans (AWPs).

These two terms are elaborated under the <u>Legal Framework</u> section of the <u>Programme and</u> <u>Project Management Section of the POPP</u>.

- 2. It is important to note that at the level of project management, the terms "execution" under the non-harmonized operational modalities, including global and regional projects and "implementation" under the harmonized operational modalities have the same meaning, i.e. management and delivery of project activities to produce specified outputs and efficient use of resources. Therefore, this Agreement uses the term "implementation" in line with the "harmonized operational modalities" to cover also at the project level the term "execution" under the non-harmonized operational modalities. More specifically, all references to "Executing Agency" have been replaced with "Implementing Partner".
- When using this Letter of Agreement in non-harmonized or non-CPAP countries, change the following terms as follows:

A. MICRO-CAPITAL GRANT AGREEMENT

MICRO-CAPITAL GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE IMPLEMENTING PARTNER AND THE RECIPIENT INSTITUTION FOR THE PROVISION OF GRANT FUNDS

Micro-Capital Agreement (hereinafter referred to as the "Agreement') made between the Implementing Partner Ministry of Finance and the Recipient Institution MASTER PROGRAMME IN SUSTAINABLE MANAGEMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES OF THE DEPARTMENT INFRASTRUCTURE, TECHNOLOGICAL SCIENCES (SMNR), ANTON DE KOM UNIVERSITEIT VAN SURINAME.

WHEREAS the **Ministry of Finance** has agreed that the United Nations Development Programme ("UNDP") may manage the Global Climate Change Alliance Suriname Adaptation project under which the Promote the sustainable use of ecosystems of mangrove forests (hereinafter referred to as "the Project"), will be implemented at the request of the Government of Suriname.

WHEREAS the **Ministry of Finance** and UNDP desire to provide funding to the **SMNR, ANTON DE KOM UNIVERSITEIT VAN SURINAME** in the context of a Project and on the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, and

WHEREAS the **SMNR**, **ANTON DE KOM UNIVERSITEIT VAN SURINAME** is ready and willing to accept such funds from the Implementing Partner **Ministry of Finance** and UNDP through the administration of UNDP for the above mentioned activities on the said terms and conditions.

NOW, therefore, the parties hereto agree as follows:

I. Responsibilities of SMNR, ANTON DE KOM UNIVERSITEIT VAN SURINAME

1.1 The RECIPIENT INSTITUTION agrees to: 1) Undertake the activities described in its **Workplan** and **Budget** (attached), and updates related to the subsequent release of funds in **tranches**; 2) Provide quarterly reports to the Steering Committee; and 3) Provide Annual Audited Statements [Income Statement and Balance Sheets]. In projects where a technical contractor is providing assistance to the RECIPIENT INSTITUTION, the contractor shall be responsible for verifying the accuracy of these reports/statements. Funds provided pursuant to this Agreement shall be used for purposes related to producing results specified in its annual performance targets [Section C].

1.2 The RECIPIENT INSTITUTION agrees to reach the performance targets contained in Section C. If the RECIPIENT INSTITUTION fails to meet its responsibilities outlined in article 1.1, or [Optional] to attain at least 70% of any one performance target for any given year, then this will be considered grounds for the Steering Committee to suspend any further micro-capital grant support. The suspension shall remain in effect until the RECIPIENT INSTITUTION has achieved the target. In projects with a technical assistance contractor, the contractor may, at its discretion, continue to provide technical assistance to the RECIPIENT INSTITUTION during this suspension period.

1.3 The RECIPIENT INSTITUTION agrees to inform the Steering Committee about any problems it may face in attaining the objectives agreed upon.

II. Duration

2.1 This Agreement will come into effect on May 15, 2017 and shall expire on November 14, 2018, covering the anticipated term of the project. It can be extended, if necessary by exchange of letters, noting the new expiration date.

III. Payments

3.1 The Implementing Partner shall provide funds to the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** in an amount up to **USD ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND (USD 100,000)** according to the schedule of the project budget set out below. Payments are subject to the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** meeting the outputs as specified in the Performance Targets [Section C].

USD 45,000.00 payable in SRD against UNORE, upon signature of this Agreement USD 36,500.00 payable in SRD against UNORE, upon approval of Financial and narrative progress reports.

USD 9,500.00 payable in SRD against UNORE, upon approval of Financial and narrative progress reports.

USD 9,000.00 payable in SRD against UNORE, upon approval of Final report of completion.

3.2 All payments shall be deposited into the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION's** bank account of which the details are as follows:

3.3 The amount of payment of such funds is not subject to any adjustment or revision because of price or currency fluctuations or the actual costs incurred by the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** in the performance of the activities under this Agreement.

IV. <u>Records, Information and Reports</u>

- 4.1 The **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall maintain clear, accurate and complete records in respect of the funds received under this Agreement.
- 4.2 The **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall furnish, compile and make available at all times to the Implementing Partner, UNDP any records or information, oral or written, which UNDP may reasonably request in respect of the funds received by the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION**.
- 4.3 Within sixty days after completion of project activities, the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall provide the Implementing Partner and UNDP with a final report with respect to all expenditures made from such funds (including salaries, travel and supplies) and indicating the progress made toward the goals of the activities undertaken, utilizing the reporting format contained in Annex I.
- 4.4 [Optional: For projects with Technical Assistance] The RECIPIENT INSTITUTION agrees to submit required Performance Reports to the CONTRACTOR within 21 days of the close of each quarter using the attached reporting format (Annex 1) reporting on project progress. At the beginning of the project, the RECIPIENT INSTITUTION can request CONTRACTOR assistance for the preparation of the forms. The RECIPIENT INSTITUTION, however, should develop its own capacity to generate these reports, as they are critical to manage its activities.

V. General Provisions

5.1 This Agreement and the Annexes attached hereto shall form the entire Agreement between **SMNR**, **ANTON DE KOM UNIVERSITEIT VAN SURINAME (ADEKUS)** and the Implementing Partner, superseding the contents of any other negotiations and/or agreements, whether oral or in writing, pertaining to the subject of this Agreement.

5.2 The **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall carry out all activities described in its Workplan with due diligence and efficiency. Subject to the express terms of this Agreement, it is understood that the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall have exclusive control over the administration and implementation of the activities referred to above in paragraph 1.1 and that the Implementing Partner and UNDP shall not interfere in the exercise of such control. However, both the qualities of work and the progress being made toward successfully achieving the goals of such activities shall be subject to review by the Steering Committee. If at any time the Steering Committee is not satisfied with the quality of work or the progress being made toward achieving such goals, the Steering Committee may advise the Implementing Partner to: (i) withhold payment of funds until in its opinion the situation has been corrected; or (ii) declare this Agreement terminated by written notice to the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** as described in paragraph 5.7 below; and/or seek any other remedy as may be necessary. The Steering Committee's determination as to the quality of work being performed and the progress being made toward such goals shall be final and shall be binding and conclusive upon the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION INSTITUTION** insofar as further payments are concerned.

5.3 The Implementing Partner and UNDP undertakes no responsibilities in respect of life, health, accident, travel or any other insurance coverage for any person which may be necessary or desirable for the purpose of this Agreement or for any personnel undertaking activities under this Agreement. Such responsibilities shall be borne by the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION**.

5.4 The rights and obligations of the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** are limited to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Accordingly, the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** and personnel performing services on its behalf shall not be entitled to any benefit, payment, compensation or entitlement except as expressly provided in this Agreement.

5.5 The **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall be solely liable for claims by third parties arising from the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION**'s acts or omissions in the course of performing this Agreement and under no circumstances shall The Implementing Partner and UNDP be held liable for such claims by third parties.

5.6 Assets (Equipment) supplied by UNDP funds to the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall be the property of UNDP until the end of the project, at which time UNDP shall determine the best use of these assets. In cases where the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** has met its responsibilities under this agreement, and handover of the asset would contribute to the sustainability of activities, UNDP would normally handover these assets to the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION**. The assets shall be used for the purpose indicated in the Workplan throughout the period of this Agreement.

5.7 This Agreement may be terminated by either party before completion of the Agreement by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, and the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** shall promptly return any unutilized funds to UNDP as per paragraph 5.6 above.

5.8 The **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** acknowledges that the Implementing Partner and UNDP and its representatives have made no actual or implied promise of funding except for the amounts specified by this particular tranches Agreement. Although project related documents may indicate a total amount of funds that could be available for this **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION**, actual disbursements will be based upon the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** meeting performance targets. If any of the funds are returned to the Implementing Partner and UNDP or if this Agreement is rescinded, the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** acknowledges that the Implementing Partner and UNDP will have no further obligation to the **RECIPIENT INSTITUTION** as a result of such return or rescission.

5.9 No modification of or change to this Agreement, waiver of any of its provisions or additional contractual provisions shall be valid or enforceable unless previously approved in writing by the parties to this Agreement or their duly authorized representatives in the form of an amendment to this Agreement duly signed by the parties hereto.

5.10 Any controversy or claim arising out of, or in accordance with this Agreement or any breach thereof, shall unless it is settled by direct negotiation, be settled in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules as at present in force. Where, in the course of such direct negotiation referred to above, the parties wish to seek an amicable settlement of such dispute, controversy or claim by conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules as at present in force.

The parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such controversy or claim.

5.11 Nothing in or relating to this Agreement shall be deemed a waiver of any privileges and immunities of the United Nations, or UNDP.

Executive Summary (in English)

Globally the importance of protecting mangrove forests is being emphasized. It encompasses the protection of human by protecting the shorelines against hurricanes, coastal erosion, waves and floods. It also provides a huge amount of ecosystem services that guarantees a livelihood. It is also a very important carbon sink which is crucial to preserve with regards to combatting climate change. The Bigi Pan Lagoon which is part of the Bigi Pan Multi Purpose Management Area (MUMA) also contains an enormous area size of mangrove forests. Many individuals depend on the ecosystem services provided by the mangroves for their livelihood. Unfortunately, due to inadequate management, but moreover uncontrolled human activities the mangroves are at risk. Consequently, the livelihoods of different stakeholders are at risk, but also are the citizens in the vicinity of the Bigi Pan Lagoon vulnerable to the intrusion of the sea water due to the disappearing mangrove forest. Hence it is critical to increase the awareness of the benefits of the mangroves for us as human being, but also for the entire environment. In order to be able to manage the mangrove forest up-to-date data is essential, therefore a research station in this lagoon is needed.

2.1 Summary of the project (max 250 words)

Worldwide in close collaboration with key stakeholders the United Nations Development Programme is providing assistance towards building resilient nations. As for Suriname's national goal one of the focus aspects is environment recovery. Also with regards to combatting climate change this project will surely contribute to achieve the goal through protecting the mangrove forest, which is an important carbon sink, in the Bigi Pan Lagoon in district Nickerie. Most importantly the livelihood of different stakeholders that rely on the ecosystem services of the mangroves, will be secured by increasing their awareness about the benefits of the sustainable use of mangroves. Regarding the management of the mangrove forest it is crucial to monitor the dynamics of the mangroves, hence research is also a key component of this project. Therefor a research station in the Bigi Pan Lagoon will be set up that will enable scientists and students of the MSc. in SMNR to enhance their academic skills. The obtained up- to- date data sets will improve the decision-making processes for management purposes. In addition, data on the potential threats/hazards and risks in the Bigi Pan Lagoon that might affect the mangrove forest is needed in order to undertake measures into account for managing the management of the mangrove forest. Consequently, the mangrove forest will be protected and accordingly the ecosystem services that are the source of the livelihood of different stakeholders will be guaranteed.

2.2 Problem Statement (problem that is to be addressed) (max 500 words)

Nickerie is recognized as the major rice producing district of Suriname which is very important for many households since they find a living in this rice sector. Except of the rice sector, families also find a livelihood from the fisheries sector for which the Bigi Pan lagoon located in this district is a well-known source. For the last decade Bigi Pan is also very attractive for tourists (local as well as foreigners), especially since relatively comfortable accommodation is possible due to constructed cabanas in the Bigi Pan itself. Unfortunately, it has been observed that the Bigi Pan lagoon is under great threat and it is assumed that overfishing and the great influx of tourists within this area might be one of the leading contributors to that threat. Hence, the interrelated connections that exists in any ecosystem between the flora and fauna, which also applies for Bigi Pan, might be susceptible to extinction in the long term. This might have significant consequences on the biodiversity within this lagoon. Consequently, the livelihood of many households is threatened which might disrupt their families. Another great threat that the community near this lagoon (Zeedijk, Voorland Waldeck, Nw. Nickerie, Nationaal project, Waterloo, Karan Anjar, Longmay, Paradise, Boonackerpolder, Hamptencourt, Krapahoeklaan, Henar) might face in the near future is the intrusion of the sea water, since parts of the mangrove forest is disappearing due to unknown reasons. In light of safeguarding the livelihoods of the households it is important to manage this mangrove forest. However, the lack of knowledge on the potential value of intact mangrove resources both tangible and intangible benefits may result in errors in formulating mangrove resource management policies that could instigate in damage and even destruction of mangrove ecosystem. In addition, the lack of sufficient data about the dynamics of the mangrove forest in this lagoon is also inhibiting the improvement of the management process.

2.3 Number of people whom are affected by the problem? (max 250 words)

The lack of adequate management will affect the livelihood of the local community consisting of approximately 40 fishermen, 40 hunters, 3 local tour operators, but also approximately 1000 households near the Bigi Lagoon are vulnerable to flooding due to the intrusion of the sea water that occurs now and then. The effects of the damage in the Bigi Pan Lagoon will not only affect the local community, but will also impact the livelihood of citizens throughout the rest of the country, such as the stakeholders involved in the ecotourism that offers an attraction package to their guests including a trip to the Bigi Pan Lagoon. Within this sector there is a chain of stakeholders whose livelihood is at risk, such as car rental companies, food suppliers, apartment owners, and tour guides. Inadequate management of the Bigi Pan Lagoon might also enhance degradation of the mangrove forest. It is recognized that mangroves protect shorelines from damaging storms, hurricane winds, waves and floods. Hence, degradation of the mangrove forest in the Bigi Pan lagoon might consequently disrupt approximately 1000 families and homes in the vicinity of the lagoon. Future generations will be placed in a disadvantage and inequity position with respect to benefitting from the ecosystem services the valuable mangrove forest provides. Also, there might be a chance that women from different ethnicity living within the area, can be affected differently.

2.4 Beneficiaries and partners involved and how are they involved? (max 250 words)

Throughout the entire lifetime of the project in close collaboration with the District Commissariat of the Ministry of Regional Development and the Nature Conservation Department of the Ministry of Planning, Land and Forest Management and the key stakeholders, that depend on the ecosystem services of the mangrove forest in the Bigi Pan Lagoon for their livelihood, the project activities will be executed. The participatory approach will be used in order to enhance the ownership of the project, but most importantly to increase knowledge in the benefits of the ecosystem services of the mangrove forest. In addition, the participation in the research section of the project, namely the data collection part, will also enhance the knowledge in the different parameters that should be taken in consideration to identifying the ecosystem health. With respect to the summer school activity the youth will have the opportunity to broaden their knowledge about the mangroves forest and the valuable ecosystem services it provides. On the other hand, the stakeholders (for example employees of the district commissariat and Nature Conservation Department of the mangrove forest. As for the AdeKUS/SMNR the students will also be able to broaden their knowledge about the dynamics of the mangrove forests and improve their research skills and consequently this project will contribute to achieving the mission of the SMNR master programme.

2.5 Coordination/Synergy-building How does the project intend to coordinate or collaborate with other existing initiatives in the similar thematic or geographical area, in order to avoid duplication and promote synergies? (max 500 words)

The mangrove rehabilitation project that is ongoing at Weg naar Zee in district Wanica by using the sediment trapping unit, has provided so far enormous data that are crucial for decision-making in particular the management, preservation and conservation of the mangrove forest. Lessons-learned and data that might be relevant for the project in the Bigi Pan Lagoon will be shared in order to avoid duplication. Already developed material for raising awareness in the benefits of the mangrove forests through projects executed in the past by different NGO'S and governmental institutions such as the Nature Conservation Department of the ministry of Planning, Land and Forest Management, will be used as guide for the summer school activity for the students in the Bigi Pan lagoon area. Different NGO's, organizations from the government and private sector such as the Citizen Information Centre of Nickerie (BIC Nickerie), SORTS, SuReSur and others will be approached for their support with regards to the awareness sessions.

2.6 Are their earlier projects/activities carried out by you or by others with the same purpose and in the same area? If so, which ones, and how to connect this project thereupon to? (maximum 500 words)

Several projects have been implemented in the Bigi Pan MUMA that is situated in the districts Coronie and Nickerie with some similar aspects that can be found in this project proposal. In 2004 the Centre of Agriculture Research in Suriname (CELOS) executed the project "Biodiversity and economic valuation of the Bigi Pan Multiple Use Management Area". The latest known project "Suriname Coastal Protected Area Management" that has been implemented within the Bigi Pan MUMA was funded by the GEF. The project goal was to safeguard Suriname's globally significant coastal biodiversity. As stated in aforementioned project there are two interrelated barriers that are inhibiting coastal protected area managers in their duty performance, namely: insufficient management capacity and inadequate financial resources. In order to eliminate the barriers different activities were undertaken, however according to unofficial sources it is concluded that the project failed in many aspects and therefore the project goal was not achieved. Nevertheless, relevant information and data that have been collected can be used for this particular project which can contribute to achieving the project goal.
