While doing this, it employs a two-tiered approach where NEET women who can easily be converted to education and employment, namely "reachable NEET" women are actively involved in skills development and mentoring while those less fortunate NEET women which are called "invisible NEET women" are also actively involved in the intervention with awareness raising, networking and mentoring activities. The project actively contributes to "Leave no one behind" agenda and HRBA by investing in this dis-advantaged group among NEET.
