The UNDP's "Inclusive Employment and Social Partnership" project along with Accosiation of Uzbek Restaurateurs organized a major training on catering services for interested NGO's and social enterprises. I participated there as a member of 'Mehr kuzda' NGO which enhances capacities of socially handicapped women. For me it was one of the most valuable experiences in my life. Chefs and pastry cookers of Caravan group, one of the Tashkent's best restaurants, coached and guided us, as well as introduced to the catering services. During 10 days we learned not only how to organize a coffee break including setting up a menu (kanape, bakery, snacks), but also practiced our knowledge in action.

Besides, we got very useful information on tender participation rules and clients searching, as well as UNDP purchase procedures, receiving orders and establishing a business enterprise.

The vivid evidence of this training's success is a fact that the newly created social enterprise by 'Mehr kuzda' already got an order to serve one of the UN-DP's events last week. The coffee break we organized was a big success and it guarantees now more orders in the future.



For me, being socially responsible is very important, and I am very thankful for 'Inclusive Employment and Social Partnership' project, it gave me an opportunity to fulfill my dreams and get all the necessary knowledge in the field I am going to work at.

The training was very helpful for me, as I am planning to set up a catering service, which will employ socially vulnerable women. I believe this will increase their capacity and provide sustainability for their lives.

Jingle bells, jingle bells... Tashkent was exploding with a bunch of Christmas bazaars and handmade gifts were going to be a sell out. We, the team, of 'Inclusive Employment and Social Partnership' project, conducted a one-day workshop for the social enterprises on creating special Christmas accessories and toys.

We invited our trainees to Tashkent's trendiest boutique – 'Human House' where they were coached by consultant on design who introduced them to color and composition, construction and materials. Sample accessories were developed together with social enterprise workers who also received handouts with tips and guidelines.

Our next step was to promote the newly developed toys and accessories on Christ-

mas bazaar on December 18. A major art fair was organized at Tashkent International Hotel, which takes place every year a few days before the Christmas. We initiated the participation of our social enterprises and NGOs at this fair and sell their products to more than thousand people who attended the event.

According to Galina Zubanova, the leading teacher at the New Millennium NGO that was facilitated by UNDP back in 2010, they sold quite a good amount of their products during this fair. Other beneficiaries have also reported on their sales that they described as 'incredible'.

We were excited by these outputs and we will definitely work more on increasing capacity of these institutions.
