Narrative

In 2015 UN will continue to focus on improving good governance and institutional capacities to uphold the rule of law, while major democratic processes take place in the country. Through building stronger capacities of a number of oversight institutions, electoral management bodies and civil society, UN work is aiming at more responsive and accountable institutions towards citizens' rights, especially women and children.

Albania is preparing for the Local Elections of June 2015 and Electoral Reform under the new Administrative and Territorial Reform, which is being re-organized from currently 373 LGUs into only 61 larger ones. This is the ideal timing to engage different stakeholders, decision-makers and professionals that handle improvement and implementation of the electoral legislation in a constructive thinking and discussion process over strengthening of the gender quota, with a view to reach gender balanced representation in future elections. Before elections, UN will support Central Election Commission to improve the quality and sex-disaggregated data collection, tracking of results and reporting, strengthening of its monitoring role on gender quota implementation, registration and financing of political parties, but also increase knowledge on a number of areas through BRIDGE training. After elections, analysis and lessons learned on ensuring a fair and transparent election process and sharing of best practices will be enabled at national and regional level.

Based on previous interventions and identified gaps, UN will continue to focus on strengthening Parliament oversight and monitoring role, promotion of legislation in support to women's and children's rights and support stronger interaction with independent institutions on key Conventions such as CEDAW, CRC, CRPD and other processes and commitments, such as UPR, ICPD etc. Knowledge sharing, public hearings, technical support will be provided to increase capacities especially of Parliamentary Commission on Population and Health, Alliance of Women MPs and Child Rights Caucus in a number of areas. After increasing awareness on ICPD beyond 2015 and Post 2015 Agenda, information will be provided on important issues related to Human Rights, Gender Mainstreaming, Women Political Representation, WEE, GBV, Sexual and Reproductive Health and Population Dynamics including Ageing. During 2015 activities will aim to raise awareness about UPR and CEDAW CoB as well as important issues related to Gender biased Sex Selection, Early Marriages and Children's Rights. Meanwhile with the political parties will conduct research and provide support to empower women within internal structures.

The public oversight functions of People's Advocate Institution and Commissioner for Protection against Discrimination will be further strengthened to enable them to monitor, report and redress violations of rights especially of vulnerable groups such as women and children. Strengthening of institutional capacities, improvement of legal framework and strengthening of their role in promoting equal rights, non-discrimination and children rights will be achieved through a number of new interventions and building on previous exchanges with other countries public oversight bodies to strengthen their partnerships and outreach.

Civil society will be an important partner to watchdog, monitor and hold decision makers to account towards national and international commitments on human rights, equal representation and children's rights. Children's rights, particularly while they try to pursue them or have to interact with judicial, administrative and oversight systems are undermined by a predominant and inherited mentality that promotes a punitive criminal justice, on the one hand and fails to see children as rights-holders, on the other. UN will seek to (i) Promote a shift in social norms to support children's access to justice and their engagement as law-abiding citizens in society (ii) Legally empower children to pursue their rights (iii) Support legislation that appropriately addresses particular needs and situation of children (iv) Promote accountability of governmental and judicial institutions (v) And strengthen the oversight role of the Parliament, of the Child Rights Caucus, civil society and other public oversight bodies as advocates of children's rights.
