### **Executive Summary**

This document summarises a Joint Programme between NUEW, UNDP, UNICEF, WHO, UNIFEM, ILO and UNFPA, of which modalities and work plan will be reviewed and approved on an annual basis. The activities under this Joint Programme are priorities identified and outlined in the United Nations Development Assistance Framework (UNDAF) for Eritrea (2007-2011) under UNDAF Outcome 5 and in the National Gender Action Plan and National Policy on Gender.

The National Gender Action Plan focuses on specific priority areas in the Eritrean context, e.g. political and social empowerment, education and training, women's health and well-being, and women in difficult circumstances. Also, the Interim Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper (I-PRSP) resolves to enhance women's participation in the political, economic and social spheres and pledges to make women both active participants in and target beneficiaries of the poverty reduction activities outlined in the strategy.

The Joint Programme consists of two major components, i.e. the establishment of a Gender Research Centre and the empowerment of women through mainstreaming of gender responsiveness and skill training within the major national sectors of development.

UN and other partners seek to enhance the situation of women and girls in Eritrea by: a) ensuring that gender responsiveness is part of research, planning, monitoring and evaluation; b) strengthening gender-sensitive research that is empirical and based on gender-disaggregated data; c) skills training and micro-credit in support of social, political and financial empowerment of women and girls in difficult circumstances.

## Section 1: Background and analysis

As per the 2002 Eritrea Demographic and Health Survey (EDHS) 55% of Eritrea's population are women, and 33% of the population are between 10-24 years old. These young people are among the most vulnerable to poverty as a consequence of low school enrolment and retention, especially for girls. Reproductive ill-health, early pregnancy and fistula increase vulnerability to poverty. Girls suffer the most from the effects of harmful traditional practices, early marriage and gender-based violence.

The National Policy on Gender is based on the conviction that Eritrea's envisaged development can be realised only when the full potential of society is brought into the development process which means, among others, effective and widespread participation of Eritrean women in the country's economic, political, social and cultural life. The Policy envisages, as a temporary measure, affirmative action "to correct longstanding imbalances and inequalities between men and women". It is the intention of the Policy to ensure that gender issues are an integrated part of the national development process.

The State of Eritrea ratified the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) in 1995. A report on the implementation of CEDAW noted positive development at all legislative and policy levels. However, it concluded that 'even if legislation provides for equal rights and opportunities, attitudes and cultural practices still constitute major obstacles, which affect possibilities of change, rendering it slow and gradual'. Scarcity of gender-disaggregated data in many sectors makes it difficult to formulate gender-sensitive policies and programmes.

The National Gender Action Plan (NGAP) focuses on specific priority areas in Eritrea. These are: political empowerment, economic and social empowerment, education and training, women's health and well-being, and women in difficult situations.

Through direct affirmative action and other measures, the I-PRSP resolves to enhance women's participation in the political, economic and social spheres and pledges to make women both active participants in, and target beneficiaries of the poverty reduction activities outlined in the strategy. It further specifies measures to improve women's access to employment opportunities in both the public and private sectors, as well as to enhance their access to land, financial credit and skills-training. The strategy also specifies policies aimed at the social protection of women, along with other disadvantaged groups in society, through measures that include direct support and social security.

### UN and partner response

To address gaps in gender-related information, support will be provided to strengthen gender-sensitive research, including generation and use of gender disaggregated data. The latter will be linked to the support provided to NSO and other pertinent national institutions. A gender research centre will be established.

Capacity of NUEW, as the main mandated national organisation, and of the other organizations will be strengthened to advocate for gender equity, promote programmes targeting women, and support economic empowerment of women in difficult circumstances.

A key objective of the National Policy on Gender is to ensure that gender issues are integrated in the national development process. This means, first and foremost, that national, sectoral, regional and local development programmes and initiatives are gender responsive. The UN agencies will support NUEW as well as a cross-sectoral range of institutions to undertake gender-neutral analysis, planning, budgeting, monitoring and evaluation.

### Section 2: Management and coordination arrangements

The participating UN agencies (UNDP, WHO, UNICEF, UNIFEM, ILO, UNFPA) will support NUEW to carry out the activities outlined in Section 3: Common Annual Work Plan and Budget for 2007. In accordance with the United Nations Country Team (UNCT) agreement on Joint Programmes, UNFPA will act as the Lead Agency (LA). NUEW is the implementing partner of this Joint Programme and assumes responsibility for implementing programme activities by signing the common annual work plan (AWP) under Section 4: Signatures of national partners and participating UN agencies. The Joint Programme on Gender Equity allows for a combination of pooled, pass-through and parallel fund management options to be applied; selection of fund management options will be based on how to achieve the most cost-effective, efficient and timely implementation, thereby reducing transaction cost for national partners, donors and UN agencies.

### Pooled funding

Participating UN agencies will pool funds through one UN agency, called the Managing Agent (MA) who will act as the interface between the UN agencies and the common national partner. UNFPA will be the MA and sign one Letter of Understanding (LoU) with the implementing partner, NUEW, on behalf of all participating UN agencies.

Each UN agency participating in the pool will sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the MA. The MA is accountable for supporting and backstopping the implementing partner in the management of the Joint Programme. The MA is accountable for timely disbursement of funds and supplies, and for coordinating technical inputs by all participating UN agencies. The financial regulations and rules of the agency selected to be the MA applies to account for the resources received to fund the Joint Programme. The MA's internal/external auditors will be considered acceptable to all the UN contributing agencies for conducting the audits of the Joint programme.

The MA will prepare narrative and financial reports in accordance with its policies and procedures, and submit these to the contributing UN agencies and the implementing partner. All signatories to the Joint Programme will participate in monitoring and evaluation and contribute to Mid-year and Annual Review. Reporting will focus on progress/results in respect of the common outputs and outcomes. UNDG formats will be used to report. The quarterly joint monitoring activities and evaluations will be conducted in accordance with the MA's procedures and policy guidelines and the UNDAF M&E Plan.

Resource mobilisation for the Joint Programme will be undertaken by all participating UN agencies in mutual consultation with the Government Coordination Authority. The MA will account for income received to fund the Joint Programme, and recover indirect costs, in accordance with its financial regulations and rules. This will be documented in the MoU signed with the participating UN agencies, and in any funding agreement signed with the donors.

### Pass-through funding

Donor(s) may wish to channel the funds through one UN agency. The UN agency channelling the resources is called the Administrative Agent (AA). For the Joint Programme on Gender Equity, UNFPA will act as the AA. The AA will sign a Letter of Agreement (LoA) with the donor(s) in respect of the Joint Programme. The AA will also sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the participating UN agencies. Each participating UN agency will sign a Letter of Understanding (LoU) with its implementing partner. Each participating UN agency will programme and manage activities and funds in line with its established regulations and rules, and be subject to its respective internal/external audit procedures.

The Joint Programme account will be administered by the AA in accordance with its financial regulations and rules, and be subject to its internal and external auditing procedures. The AA is entitled to allocate one percent (1%) of the amount contributed by donor(s), for its costs of performing the AA's functions. Each participating UN agency will recover indirect costs in accordance with its financial regulations and rules as documented in the MoU signed with the AA. Any funds remaining after the financial

closure of the Joint Programme will be returned to the AA. The AA will return any remaining funds to the donor(s), or allocate in a manner agreed upon between the AA and the donor(s), and approved by the Gender Programme Steering Committee.

Each participating UN agency will prepare narrative and financial reports, and provide these to the AA. The AA will prepare consolidated narrative progress and financial reports consisting of the reports submitted by each participating UN agency, and shall distribute these to the donor(s) and participating UN agencies. Each UN agency's report will be annexed to the consolidated report written by the AA. Monitoring and evaluation will take place on a quarterly basis in line with the UNDAF M&E Plan, and culminate in a Mid-year and Annual Review of progress in respect of the activities and targets agreed upon in the common annual work plan (AWP). UNDG formats will be used for reporting and shall focus on progress/results in respect of the common outputs and outcomes.

### Parallel funding

Each agency will follow its regulations and rules for individual programming and will manage its own funds, whether coming from Regular Resources (RR) or Other Resources (OR) while guided by this Joint Programme document and approved common annual work plan (AWP). The participating UN agencies will be responsible for auditing their own contribution to the Joint Programme in accordance with its existing regulations and rules; audit opinions should be acceptable by the other participating UN agencies. The disposition of any balance of funds remaining at the end of programme implementation will be done in accordance with the agreements between the participating UN agencies, donor(s) and the implementing partners. Each UN agency will sign a Letter of Understanding (LoU) with the implementing partner.

Each participating UN agency will prepare mid-year and an annual narrative and financial reports in accordance with its policies and procedures, and provide these to UNFPA as the Lead Agency (LA) in this Joint Programme. The LA will incorporate all the reviews into one consolidated narrative and financial report, which will be distributed to all participating UN agencies and the implementing partner. Each UN agency's report will be annexed to the consolidated report. Reporting will focus on progress/results in respect of the common outputs and outcomes. UNDG formats will be used to report, and the planned quarterly ioint monitoring activities and evaluations will be undertaken in line with the UNDAF M&E Plan.

### Coordinating mechanism

Parties to the Joint Programme will convene legally in the Gender Programme Steering Committee. The composition of the Gender Programme Steering Committee shall include all of the signatories to the Joint Programme Document, and may also have other members in an observer capacity, such as donors and other stakeholders.

Programme Coordination and Assistance (PCA) implemented by the UNFPA Country Office provides additional support to the Government Coordinating Authority, the Programme Component Managers, the Implementing Partners and the Contractees in the implementation of the programme within the framework of the UNDAF. Accordingly, the UNFPA Country Office will convene quarterly Programme Component Management Meetings (PCMMs) to foster information-sharing and facilitate mid-year and end-of-year reporting and annual planning, and provide for timely inputs in the UNDAF monitoring and evaluation process.

Given that UNFPA is the UN Lead Agency for the Joint Programme on Gender Equity, the Joint Programme on Abandonment of FGM/C, and for the UNDAF Theme on Gender in general, the Gender PCMM will be co-chaired by NUEW and UNFPA and its participation expanded in order to allow this forum to also function as the UNDAF Gender Thematic Group meeting.
