B. PROJECT DESCRIPTION AND IMPLEMENTATION

The contribution governed by this co-financing MOU shall be utilized exclusively for furthering participatory democracy and democratic dialogue to strengthen local governments and redress violence in Guatemala (see Annex 1- Project Document). It will be used by the recipients to contribute to enhance community participation, contribute to local governance and human rights respect by supporting dialogue spaces at municipal level and strengthen technical capacities of local actors that enable civil society and state institutions interact to tackle the problems posed by violence that severely affect marginalized and vulnerable social groups, state legitimacy and democratic consolidation with a focus on violence prevention. This contribution will be administered in accordance with the regulations and rules applicable to UNDP and by the Rules and Guidelines applicable to UN Democracy Fund Grants and Projects.

C. CONTRIBUTIONS AND SCHEDULE OF PAYMENTS

This contribution will be allocated in one installment of US\$ 349,650 immediately after this co-financing MOU has been signed by both Parties. The total contribution is inclusive of UNDP's up to 5% cost recovery for general management support. UNFIP will inform UNDP when the contribution is paid via an e-mail message with remittance information to contributions@undp.org.



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Narrative

Executive Summary

The project will enhance community participation and contribute to local governance and respect for human rights by supporting dialogue spaces at municipal level and strengthening technical capacities of local actors. This with the aim of enabling civil society and state institutions to interact in tackling the problems posed by the violence that severely affect in a particular way marginalized and vulnerable social groups, as well as state legitimacy and democratic consolidation. The focus will be on violence prevention.

Context Analysis

With the signature of the Peace accords in 1996, Guatemala ends an armed conflict that lasted more than 36 years and engages on the path of the strengthening of democracy. In this, the country's progress is impaired by the violence that has been a constant characteristic of its history and that now threatens the consolidation of democracy and good governance. In this post conflict context, the United Nations System supports the strengthening of the State, for it to approach violence from a new perspective based on democracy, social inclusion and participation. This vision of development requires public policies firmly centered on citizens and their rights.

Civil society has both the right and the potential to contribute to State efforts in the matter of violence prevention by participating in the processes of design and implementation of violence prevention plans. Nevertheless, citizens will not have the opportunity to exert this right if suitable spaces do not exist to carry out dialogue efforts with duty-bearers. The creation and effective functioning of such spaces requires credibility, non-confrontation skills, continuity and technical capacities.

At present, the human resources of state and civil society at national and local level lack the level of technical qualification that would make a joint approach to the problems of violence possible. In addition, democratic and governance weaknesses inhibit the interaction and dialogue of state and civil society, thus making joint interventions rare and difficult. Such limitations will be addressed in order to enable State and -civil society to intervene jointly and effectively to address the phenomenon of violence.

Project Strategy

With the support of UNDEF, the participating Agencies of the United Nations System in Guatemala will promote democracy and the strengthening of local governance through the furthering of state and civil society synergies aimed at promoting articulated and multidisciplinary institutional efforts towards violence prevention and redress.

Local violence prevention requires a thorough identification of the main problems, how they manifest themselves within the community, and their impact on people and societal groups most at risk, as well as an identification of the resources available to prevent and redress them. Citizen participation is crucial within these analytical processes as well as in the design and planning, execution and evaluation of the proposed actions. Civil society participation can ensure the required social commitment and support to states efforts without which policies usually fail. Such participation will be promoted through the development of local state/civil society dialogue spaces.

The Project strategy, focused on the promotion of democratic participation and using a human rights based approach seeks

1. To improve often deteriorated relationships between the community and local government, with the purpose of consolidating joint working spaces where the community participates in the proposals of strategies to prevent violence.
2. To strengthen the existing social networks under the presumption that this will allow the development and consolidation of the local social capital. This would also contribute to prevent violence.

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3. To consolidate local crime prevention strategies, on the basis of the assumption that types and modalities of violence are different in each locality.

The United Nations System, with the support provided by UNDEF, will promote technical support to the local governments for the creation of local spaces of dialogue between State and citizens and training for the participants. The strengthening of the capacity of participants will set the basis for the adoption of articulated approaches to violence prevention and monitoring aiming at various kinds of violent behaviors affecting the most vulnerable groups of society.

The work within the developed dialogue spaces will have as its basis diagnoses produced in a participatory way. In addition, ensuing interventions will be supported by highly developed methodologies that will allow a thorough knowledge and monitoring of the phenomenon of violence in each community.

Generated dialogue spaces will be provided with training and qualification programs by specialized human resources in order to promote capacity building and local empowerment. Participants must be enabled to produce and to use the knowledge generated in the subject of violence prevention, in order to grant greater levels of appropriation and success in the effort to reduce victimization and the levels of fear of the Guatemalan population.

Sustainability

The Project seeks to achieve technical, social and institutional sustainability by ensuring local government and citizens' appropriation of their democratic role. Sustainability will also be granted by the effectiveness and legitimacy of developed local community spaces and their proposals.

Sustainability of this experience will also be guaranteed through the capacity to materialize and carry out the proposals and actions agreed within the generated dialogue spaces.

Gender, marginalized and vulnerable groups considerations

In a post-conflict context of emerging democracy and fragile institutions, violence has uprooted entire communities, usually the most impoverished ones, eroded social capital and marginalized substantial sectors of the population. This violent context favors gross human rights violations that need to be redressed, *inter alia*, by participatory and democratic interventions that enable local communities to engage in effective mechanisms of coordination.

Violence is affecting the population at the local level, in the spaces in which it daily works and lives. It is nowadays a proven fact that the poorest countries and people are the ones most affected by violence. When acknowledging that violence has multiple causes, its treatment must contemplate multidisciplinary and inter-institutional approaches.


Women participation within democratic spaces is extremely unequal in Guatemala. Severe gender-based violence is met by fragile institutions quite unable to address this phenomenon. Feminicide, domestic and sexual violence have raised since the signing of the Peace Accords. Particular focus will be put on the need to address gender-related violence and to ensure active participation of women in the generated community spaces.

This intervention is designed in order to redress and prevent those causes of violence that affect the people and social groups most at risk, as identified through the use of a human rights-based approach and in relation to their development, human rights, health and education. Set results aim at the promotion of joint state-civil society interventions, in close collaboration with and with the support of participating United Nations Agencies.






