**Brief Description: Climate Vulnerable Forum Support (Updated: March 2016)** 

In line with UNDP's 2014-2017 Strategic Plan, this global project supports developing countries vulnerable to the effects of a warming planet to collaborate to more effectively address climate change at international and national levels. This will be accomplished by supporting South-South cooperation among states participating in the Climate Vulnerable Forum (CVF). The CVF Support project will provide institutional assistance, including secretariat, communications and resource mobilization support, to the Forum and to the CVF ministries of finance cooperating in the context of the Vulnerable Twenty Group (V20), established in October 2015. In addition, the project provides implementation support for activities outlined in the 2016-2018 CVF Roadmap and the V20's 2020 Action Plan in the areas of South-South cooperation, advocacy, international cooperation and research and analysis, including as foreseen in the CVF Trust Fund work plan.

In alignment with UNDP, CVF and V20 priorities, the project seeks to empower CVF and V20 participating governments and their representatives to collectively make a greater contribution towards the creation/development and implementation of more effective international and national climate change policies that strive for consistency with the 1.5°C long term temperature goal of the UNFCCC Paris Agreement and leverage maximum cobenefits of adaptation and mitigation towards transformational development solutions and change.

The extension of the UNDP global support project is guided by High-Level and Senior Official meetings of the CVF and V20 in 2015 leading to the Manila-Paris decisions of the Forum (Manila-Paris Declaration and 2016-2018 Road Map) and the V20 Lima decisions (V20 Design Document, founding Communique and 2020 Action Plan). From the initial project phase of 2013-2016, the project is extended by 2 years, from 2016-2018, in order to see through implementation of the CVF Road Map and initial phase of the V20 Action Plan.

## 1. UPDATE: SITUATION ANALYSIS (MARCH 2016)

After the initial formation of the Climate Vulnerable Forum (CVF) in 2009 and through the support provided by UNDP under this global project since October 2013, the international partnership of this forum has progressed as an active contributor to global climate change and economic governance advancing the shared interests of countries highly vulnerable to the effects of the planet's warming.

In October 2013, under the Presidency of Costa Rica, the CVF adopted the 2013-15 Costa Rica Action Plan which established operational modalities for the CVF, foresaw the establishment of the Vulnerable Twenty (V20) Group of Finance Ministers of the CVF, commissioned additional CVF research and focused activities on five priority sectors – health, human rights, labour, migration and displacement, and science.

In October 2015, under the Presidency of the Philippines, the V20 Group was established at Lima, Peru in conjunction with the Annual Meetings of The World Bank Group & International Monetary Fund (IMF). At this inaugural meeting, the V20 Design Document, Founding Communique and 2020 Action Plan were adopted, outlining the operating modalities, plans and objectives of this new collaborative mechanism for ministries of finance of the CVF.

Ahead of the 2015 United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP21) in Paris, a Sherpa Senior Officers' Meeting of the CVF was held 09-11 November 2015 in Manila, Philippines, to increase convergence and consensus on key issues and elaborate future Forum activities in light of the V20 establishment and the need to ensure follow-up after the conclusion of the 2013-15 Action Plan. The conference built on the recommendations of the five CVF regional meetings convened during 2014-15 in Africa, Asia, Central America/the Caribbean and the Pacific, as well as the conclusions of the CVF Global Consultation in June 2015 at Bonn. The CVF Chair also established a 7-person Expert Advisors Group in advance of the conference to provide ongoing external advisory support to the members of the CVF. The Manila Sherpa conference issued The Manila Communique as its outcome statement and forwarded draft decision documents for consideration by the next CVF High-Level meeting.

The third High Level Meeting of the CVF took place at COP21 on 30 November 2015 and formally adopted the Manila-Paris Declaration of the CVF and the 2016-2018 Roadmap of Activities as endorsed at the Senior Sherpa meeting in Manila. The Manila-Paris agreement set out the key priorities of the CVF for the Paris Agreement, including the importance of strengthening the long term goal to 1.5°C further to the #105C campaign of the CVF launched together with civil society groups in October 2015, among other UNFCCC priorities. Ethiopia was designated as Incoming Chair of the CVF (2016-2017) and 22 countries were recognized as officially joining the CVF. At an Extraordinary Ministerial Session of the CVF also at COP21 on 4 December 2015, the Marshall Islands was additionally officially recognized as joining the Forum, bringing the number of CVF member countries to 43.

Climate change continues to progress as a top United Nations priority. The adoption at COP21 of a universal agreement, the Paris Agreement of the UNFCCC, to tackle climate change the objective that all parties collaborate to limit warming to not more than 1.5°C as called for by the CVF and more than 100 parties prior to COP21. The Paris UNFCCC decisions create a framework for increasing the ambition of climate action globally that will require concerted and upscaled efforts by all countries.

Furthermore, in March 2015, the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction was adopted at the Third UN World Conference in Sendai, Japan. The Sendai Framework succeeds the Hyogo Framework for Action, which ended in 2015, with a voluntary agreement that will continue for 15 years. The Sendai Framework contains seven targets and four priority areas for action, including strengthening disaster disk governance and investing in disaster risk reduction, which also represent critical steps to building resilience to the impacts of climate change for vulnerable countries.

At the United Nations Sustainable Development Summit on 25 September 2015, the United Nations adopted 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to replace the Millennium Development Goals whose targets concluded in 2015. Goal 13, "Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts" includes the following specific targets:

- Strengthen resilience and adaptive capacity to climate-related hazards and natural disasters in all countries
- Integrate climate change measures into national policies, strategies and planning
- Improve education, awareness-raising and human and institutional capacity on climate change mitigation, adaptation, impact reduction and early warning
- Implement the commitment undertaken by developed-country parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change to a goal of mobilizing jointly \$100 billion annually by 2020 from all sources to address the needs of developing countries in the context of meaningful mitigation actions and transparency on implementation and fully operationalize the Green Climate Fund through its capitalization as soon as possible
- Promote mechanisms for raising capacity for effective climate change-related planning and management in least developed countries and small island developing States, including focusing on women, youth and local and marginalized communities

The outcome document of the UN Summit for the adoption of the post-2015 development agenda additionally recognized climate change as a cross-cutting concern and "one of the greatest challenges of our time" whose "adverse impacts undermine the ability of all countries to achieve sustainable development."

The UNDP CVF support project, which progressed into full implementation phase 2 as outlined in the original project document, enables vulnerable developing countries to continue to actively collaborate towards achievement of the new UN development agenda targets and the implementation of UNFCCC COP21 decisions, such as the Paris Agreement.

The CVF project also continues to contribute to core priorities of UNDP as articulated in the UNDP Strategic Plan for 2014-2017, which was approved in September 2013. In particular, the project contributes towards the following Strategic Plan outputs: scaled up action on climate change adaptation and mitigation across sectors which is funded and implemented (1.4) and South-South and Triangular cooperation partnerships established and/or strengthened for development solutions (7.5).
