Governance and Dispute Resolution Mechanisms (by Allen Paye – Liberia Land Authority) Presentation on the Draft Proposal - Sustaining Peace and Reconciliation through Strengthening Land

The presentation outlined the key highlights of the new project proposal. These include;

- The Project aims to address land related drivers of conflict through supporting the implementation of the Land Rights Act (LRA) and Local Government Act (LGA). The two acts provide opportunities for decentralising land services, and empowering communities to manage their own land and land related resource hence reducing land related conflicts.
