EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The first quarter of 2013 involved strengthening and providing technical support to the Parish Safety and Security Committees (PSSCs). All Pilot Parishes led their initiatives in addressing Parish Safety and Security issues peculiar to their local environments. In this regard, the PSSCs are now fully established Committees of Council as the respective parishes brought resolutions to their general council meetings and received approval for their establishment.

The Westmoreland PSSC created the opportunity for an organised coordinated response to the alleged police killing of the three family members from the Petersfield community in March 2013. The PSSC led by the Mayor and Councillor for the division was able to promptly coordinate a meeting with key parish stakeholders and the police to obtain critical information and then developed a collaborative response to the crisis. The Council decided to postpone the formal PSSC launch and concentrated instead on developing a coordinated response through assisting the community with counselling interventions, discussions on building sustainable solutions, this resulted in counselling in the four primary and high schools in the district. Of note, is the fact that the Custos is a member of the PSSC and lives in Petersfield, he continues to play an integral role in both information gathering and roll out peace-building strategies.

In response to over-bushed areas being one of the critical safety challenge which was cited in almost all initial PSSC meetings, safety audits and parish forums, the Trelawny and Portmore Safety and Security Committees have launched Best Street and Best Community Competitions respectively. Trelawny's was done in collaboration with one of their cruise line shipping partners.

Partnerships between the police and local authorities have now been strengthened through the establishment of the PSSCs as the Police have informed the Parish Safety & Security Committee of Council that as a partner in the PSSC, they will commit to creating a safer environment by assisting with bushing; this will be done by using their front-end loaders to clear areas that pose a threat to citizens' safety and security.

In playing a more pivotal role in the coordination of initiatives at the parish level, partnerships between the Manchester and Clarendon Parish Councils and the police through the Special Projects Unit of the Ministry of National Security are being further strengthened in relation to the management and maintenance of close circuit television systems. These are expected to improve safety and security in the parishes, in particular town centres and expected to be managed through the PSSCs.

Additional achievements are as follows:

In recognition of the role safety and security plays in national development and the St. Elizabeth Local Authority in designing their three year corporate plan, invited the project team to make presentation on the impact of crime on development and to assist in the development of their action plans on the 'Social Policy and Governance' segment at their Strategic Planning Retreat.

Public messages continued to be disseminated largely through the parish forums. During the reporting period Trelawny PSSC held their second Parish Forum and launched their PSSC with the main guest speaker being the Attorney General who is the Member of Parliament in the Parish, Hon. Patrick Atkinson. This was held on February 5th 2013.

Portmore PSSC in collaboration with Groots Jamaica, a project partner of UNDP's 'Strengthened Civil Society Capacity through Local Governance Capacity Building', co-hosted a Safety & Security rally in recognition of Global Day on "Violence against Women".

St. Catherine PSSC also launched their gender based campaign "Real Men Don't Rape' in February and subsequently hosted two district area meetings viz. Linstead and Old Harbour.

A two-day technical workshop was also held to equip St. Elizabeth to set up their PSSC.

LESSONS LEARNED:

- Provision could be considered for lead agencies when substantive changes in function are to result from project initiatives
- Project time is actually shortened due to major calendar and national events and as such work plans timelines should be extended to makeup for loss time
- Change requires time, especially in relation to mind-sets and traditional approaches in government institutions.
- Respective local authorities evolve and mobilise at varying pace, so provisions need to be made for this variance
