In the **opening speech Aliona Niculita** welcomed all meeting participants. She outlined UNDP experience in implementing projects funded by the Russian Federation – UNDP Trust Fund and expressed the gratitude to the Government of the Russian Federation for provided financial and expert support for the country' development, as well as all partners.

Nuria Choibaeva made a presentation of the project «Digital skills and opportunities for youth employment towards digital economy in the Kyrgyz Republic».

Remarks of representatives of the Government of the Kyrgyz Republic, national partners of the project. General discussion.

Eldar Abakirov reported on a meeting dedicated to a discussion of creative economy held by the Ministry of Economy three weeks earlier using a platform provided by Ololo Company. As of today, over 60% of the population is under 30 whereas pensioners comprise around 10% of the population. The country's population is very young and this

could help promoting the country's economy. At the moment Kyrgyzstan exports labor to other countries primarily Russian Federation: according to the WTO classification export of labor is considered as export of services. Kyrgyzstan is making significant efforts supported by the Russian Federation to make its agricultural sector profit-making via increased processing of agricultural produce supported by the Kyrgyz-Russian Development Fund. Yet, most of us realize the country is at least 15-20 years behind the global competition and it needs to work on improvement of skills of the younger generations in order to catch up. IT-experts from the Russian Federation are among the most advanced and highest paid specialists in the Silicon valley. The proposed "Digital skills" project of UNDP the country will be able to achieve its goals in strengthening capacities of the younger generations to fill up the gap between Kyrgyzstan and some of the world's champions. The Ministry of Economy highly appreciates support of the Russian Federation. As most of us aware the level of education directly correlates with the national GDP: any country's economy is just as strong as its system of education. Currently the Ministry of Economy is working on a set of measures towards development of the creative economy cluster in Kyrgyzstan. The project we are discussing today fully corresponds to the Ministry's vision. As the public agency in charge of donor assistance coordination the Ministry of Economy is committed to support this project in every possible way is prepared to take an active part in the project's implementation.

Aliona Niculita thanked Eldar Abakirov underlining UNDP has enjoyed close and fruitful partnership with the Ministry of Economy for many years. The proposed project is going to be implemented in synergy with other projects: it is particularly close to the green economy project in progress at the moment. UNDP believes it is moving in the right direction especially in view of the fact that youth makes up around 60% of the country's population and development activities should be designed accordingly. She then thanked the Ministry for the cooperation and support.

Kudaiberdy Kozhobekov expressed his gratitude to the representatives of the Russian embassy in the Kyrgyz Republic and stressed the timeliness of the proposed project during the year pronounced by the President of the Kyrgyz Republic as the "Year of regional development and digitalization". The Ministry of education and science has already taken this fact into account at the time of the project's discussion. There is no need to stress in today's world any profession requires digital skills. The Ministry of education and science of the KR has already presented its vision at the stage of preparation of the project proposal including the areas that need special attention and has committee to fully support this project. The deputy minister has then expressed his hope the implementation of this project is going to help to address numerous concerns regarding digital skills development and his expectation of a successful project built upon close and fruitful partnership.

Aliona Niculita thanked Kudaiberdy Kozhobekov stressing that UNDP would not be able to perform without support from the major profile ministries and educational institutions and expressed gratitude on behalf of UNDP for the overall support. She also indicated

the UNDP counts on close cooperation during implementation of project's activities and finding the most optimal solutions and achieving mutually beneficial results.

Aida Sharsheeva informed the audience about the «Digital Casa» project which has now passed the process of ratification and is expected to be launched officially in March 2019 adding that UNDP has been the most active partner ever since the project preparation phase. Russian Federation has funded the pre-launch preparation of the Digital Casa project. She also underlined that representatives of UNDP have been actively involved into development of the road map for possible cooperation in certain areas from the very commencement of the pre-launch preparation phase. In general the Digital Casa project is perceived as an infrastructure project of the regional digital connectivity. In reality however the project is a lot more ambitious as it includes the following three key components: 1. Infrastructural development – provision of digital connectivity to reach out to every village and each social organization; 2. Creation of enabling environment of the digital ecosystems, 3. Development of the legal, regulatory and institutional foundations. The Digital Casa project expects close partnership with UNDP in this regard and it also foresees close cooperation towards development of digital skills. The main objective of the Digital Casa project is to facilitate the creation of sustainable environment for the development of the framework for digital skills and competencies required today for the development of not only the whole country but for the whole region. This transnational scale project covers countries of the Central Asia and some states of the South Asia focusing upon the development of the whole region. It appears that the proposed project of UNDP correlates to the main goals and objectives of Digital Casa which sees UNDP as the main partner in digitalization at the regional level. As Aida Sharsheeva then underlined there are many areas for working in partnership between UNDP and the Digital Casa project.

Aliona Niculita informed all participants that UNDP has built great partnership with the World Bank. She was very pleased with an opportunity for close cooperation within the framework of implementation of the proposed UNDP project and the «Digital Casa». UNDP also engages with the World Bank under the Development Partners Coordination Council (DPCC). At the DPCC, there is a group that deals with new technologies and ICT and UNDP jointly with the Soros Foundation and the World Bank coordinate the activities of the DPCC in this area and this cooperation would support the joint implementation of the two projects.

Abdykadyr Abidov explained that the Osh Technological University (OsTU) is the only university in the south of Kyrgyzstan that teaches technical specialties and develops professionals in technical areas for the Osh, Jalal-Abad and Batken provinces. The department of information technologies at the OsTU that offers professional training in areas covered by the proposed project. Every year the university delivers training to teachers of computer literacy on free of charge basis. Last year it has created a technopark focusing *inter alia* on the IT development. Another project implemented currently in cooperation with private entrepreneurs delivers free of charge training to secondary school students on 3D construction design.

In view of the new garment factory being constructed in Osh with a plan to provide around 7000 new jobs the university also explores the garment sector-specific digital innovation technologies in modelling and design of apparel. Students utilize green software products for computer modeling and design. In addition the president of the university underlined the OsTU was very actively involved into development of the project proposal and is fully prepared to participate in its implementation.

Gulnara Kabaeva thanked UNDP for initiating this project and for the attention to the ICT education indicating the Kyrgyz State Technical University (KSTU) is the leading technical university in Kyrgyzstan whereas the ICT department offers the greatest variety of training courses related to information and communication technologies. The KSTU is a member of the Russian Kyrgyz Consortium of Technical Universities; every year it organizes online conferences on education in ICT-related areas covering all regions of Kyrgyzstan. In her opinion the most important element of the project is the proposed modernization of educational standards and curriculums:

Activity 1.4: Introducing and piloting new educational standards and curriculums at the Kyrgyz State Technical University named after I. Razzakov (Bishkek) and Osh Technological University named after M.M Adyshev (Osh) and their subordinated vocational technical colleges and institutions based on agile approach;

Activity 1.5: Modernization of equipment and the introduction of new 'digitalized' teaching standards at the Kyrgyz State Technical University named after I. Razzakov (Bishkek) and Osh Technological University named after M.M Adyshev (Osh) and their subordinated technical colleges and institutions, including in apparel sector.

Activity 1.6: Enhancing professional development of teachers through training and communities of practices to raise their awareness as well as level of digital skills, help them understand the impact of digital technologies on their specific subject and encourage teachers to create digital content and enabling pedagogic innovations.

Activity 2.2: Supporting a series of hackathon/hackfest events to engage young computer programmers, interface designers, private sector project managers and subject-matter experts to collaborate on the designing of new business scalable solutions and software products;

Activity 2.3: Facilitating intensive knowledge exchange and master classes that will engage digital-savvy experts from Skolkovo, Kazan Techno Park and other global creative spaces to bring advice and tips for starting a digital business and establishing business models for scaling business-lead technology solutions;

Activity 2.6: Capacity building of new generation of IT teachers and raising awareness of new learning methods, including designing and prototyping new learning products for girls and youth with special needs.

KSTU is ready to support all the above-mentioned activities and confirms their importance for the university's future performance. As a public university the KSTU primarily depends on the Ministry of education in terms of curriculum development and planning thus limiting its ability to modernize or deliver experimental training programs. The fact that the proposed project pays specific attention to the modernization and that the Ministry of education is one of its partners provides reasons to believe that educational standards and the curriculums can be upgraded and improved.

Aliona Niculita thanked for the support of the project and indicated that UNDP brought together all stakeholders and all partners who would be interested to contribute to the achievement of outcomes covered by the project document.

Daniar Amanaliev described the Ololohaus established in 2016 serving as the common platform for the creative class by providing working spaces, conference halls and meeting rooms that support and facilitate interactions in between the creative class members. The company based on investments of just 10.000 KGS was created three years ago as the first co-working space provider; two more co-working spaces created during its second year and another one in the following year. Currently, the Ololohaus is the only network in the Central Asia that operates 4 co-working centers. Most co-working spaces around the world are loss-making and are not based on chain development whereas the Ololohaus generates profit and continues development of its network. This year it plans to launch 4 more co-working centers. Last year when it decided to expand over to the Osh region the company undertook a market analysis and held numerous meetings with the creative community in Osh. The company shares concerns about the situation in the south of the country as well as the understanding that working with the youth and promotion of the ICT-technologies may serve as the key to address these concerns. They therefore appreciate very highly the efforts made by UNDP to develop projects in the area of digital skills development. In 2018 the company set up its fourth co-working office in Osh where it provides spaces for courses delivered by IT Academy. In the opinion of Ololohaus the Attractor School and the IT Academy are the monsters of informal IT education outside of universities in Kyrgyzstan. For those who initially choose to get other than IT-related university education but then wish to be re-trained it is important to have an access to informal education opportunities. The company vies its platform in Osh as accessible for a variety of courses in cooperation with numerous partners. In September of 2018, the students IT-Club visited Osh to organize and hold the IT-week which was that year attended by 1000 school students. There are very successful master classes organized and conducted in Osh that feature great attendance and good outcomes. IT professionals make around USD 14000 per year at the average compared with the GDP per capita of just USD 2219 a year according to the World Bank in 2017; therefore IT-related professions are not only highly demanded and profitable but also capable of contributing to the country's economic development.

Daniar Amanaliev then spoke about the importance of continued development, particularly in the Osh provinces. Importantly, any IT-related profession is technically of green nature as it does not generate environmental pollution or waste, especially in view of the degrading ecological situation throughout the country, including the city of Osh. IT-related professions are also gender neutral as girls can also be very successful in this sector. Another important fact is that IT-professions are ethnically neutral as employment in the IT-sector allows professionals work from their birthplace and still have an access to the most developed markets and decent income. Most companies and freelancers in the IT-sector have clients from the Silicon valley. In the Osh region in particular, development of the IT-related professions may provide opportunities for creation of cross-national products for the whole Fergana valley and lead to attract students from Uzbekistan and Tajikistan; while this situation is not unique for Osh universities, development of IT-sector

could serve as an important precedent. Daniar then thanked UNDP underlining the importance of creation of such a platform as IT-Hub in Osh and expressed his hope that this new space of at least 800m² would feature attractive design that Osh desperately needs. As an example of similar developments he pointed to the AstanaHub launched in Astana in November 2018 – an 8000m² space based on enormous state investments with an expectation of future state investments into start-up projects of around USD 200 mio in the next three years and to the Skolkovo project in Russia. These examples show the importance of creation of such platforms in Kyrgyzstan.

Aliona Niculita thanked for intervention stressing the project would not be possible without successful companies active in the area of IT-technologies. UNDP considers it important to engage with successful local companies as it hopes that new successful projects will emerge using the platform provided by Ololohaus so to support the Kyrgyzstan's regional leadership in the IT sector.

Azis Abakirov spoke about the high demand for programmers among employers today. He clarified that IT-professionals currently make around USD 16000 per year compared with USD 14000 last year. His company has been engaged in the south for many for many years and its cooperation with the OsTU dates back to at least 5 years ago. The High-Tech Park fully supports the idea of IThubOsh as it sees a lot of great potential in the south and many young talented individuals. His company provides informal IT-education along with Attractor School and IT Academy. One of the areas that require joint consolidated efforts for development is the capacity building. Investments of USD 1 million translate into just one thousand USD per 1 programmer. There are just around 500 programmers engaged into the High-Tech Park. Whereas generation of one thousand new programmers may immediately create the preconditions for improvement in Osh. Bishkek already experienced a similar situation around 20 years ago having very few, literally just one or two companies active in the IT sector compared with over a hundred of companies today. There are 45 companies that export IT technologies at the High-Tech park alone. Kyrgyzstan needs to create 50.000 new jobs in the programming sector by 2030. Due to high demand for programmers the company hunts candidates in all universities throughout Kyrgyzstan offering jobs to third year students. The High-Tech Park shows its support to the proposed project and to the choice of Ololohaus as the main implementing partner. In conclusion, Azis Abakirov reiterated his hope that the investment of 1 million USD should help to raise at least one thousand new programmers.

Dmitriy Gudov mentioned the plans of Attractor School to launch new projects in Osh in cooperation with the Ololo company. He appreciates highly the idea of focusing on the Osh area development and launching the ITHub as being very timely and conducive to letting the youth stay in Osh instead of migration to Bishkek. He then expressed his confidence this initiative should provide a great impulse for the regional development.

Aigul John thanked UNDP for the organization of this meeting and very interesting presentation of the proposed project indicating the Ololo company has generated useful experience in organization of comfortable and convenient working spaces. The High-Tech

Park's director is convinced the Osh possesses significant potential to develop in the IT-sector as she expressed their full preparedness to support this initiative.

Mukash Kaldarov advised to the participants of the meeting that the project's implementation is going to be supported by another UNDP program funded through the UN Peacebuilding Fund particularly the project's second output. As regards any questions on the relevance of the Peacebuilding Fund and IThub creation that may arise, most people realize that building peace is a process of many aspects where economic aspects intertwine with social ones. The UNDP Peace and Development program is going to engage into mentality design, i.e. building on youth tolerance through formation of social consciousness.

Aliona Niculita complemented with a clarification that UNDP Peace and Development program has plans for creation of two youth centers in rural areas so there are possibilities for synergy between the two projects as these centers can be used as the bases for development.

Bermet Ubaidillaeva informed the participants that each project is subject to gender responsiveness evaluation in accordance with the UNDP procedures. From an early design stage the project needs to ensure equal representation of girls and women as well as the gender correlation between GDP and education. The project has been found gender responsive. As Osh is quite a specific place we are very pleased that our partner, the Ololo company is aware of these specific aspects and has generated necessary experience of working in the Osh area. The gender stereotyped practices do not allow girls in the south of Kyrgyzstan plan their professional development. This makes the project even more timely and relevant. Bermet Ubaidillaeva concluded with her commitment to provide all possible support as may be required.

Elena Arhipova extended gratitude to UNDP for involvement into the project development and for the high appreciation of the contribution made by the Russian Federation. Kyrgyz Republic is a strategic partner of Russian Federation as the member of the joint integration process. It needs to be stressed that involvement and success of each member of the process of integration is the precondition for success of the Russian Federation and all of its neighbors. Indeed, Russia is interested in achievement of the development for all through the funding allocated for the proposed and other similar projects of development. Focusing upon the youth is both highly relevant and timely as it translates into development of the whole country, its regions and as a result – into transition to the qualitatively new level of the national development. It could also serve as the effective prevention of the newly emerging threats of radical extremism and terrorism. Hopefully, the common efforts supported by the UN system organizations in various aspects shall lead to launch many new projects in the future. All of these efforts are aimed at ensuring security, stability and continued development of the whole region. There is a good will towards project development among all its stakeholders; just as the interest in the project's implementation and the need for creation of new jobs. In conclusion, Elena

Arhipova has manifested the commitment to show continued support to the project and cooperate as close as possible for the common benefits.

Aliona Niculita emphasized the Russian Federation has been the major partner of UNDP supporting all creative areas of development in which UNDP engages in Kyrgyzstan and providing not only the very important financial resources but also the expertise mobilized by UNDP both at the level of project design and implementation. One of the project's activities includes building and maintaining partnerships between universities from Kyrgyzstan and the Russian Federation and this kind of cooperation has got the potential for the effective and efficient achievement of the project results.

Nuria Choibaeva her intention to add a human dimension to this discussion by reminding of the thousands of young people behind this project accidentally deprived of any opportunities for professional development. During their routine visits to the provinces of the country the personnel of UNDP meets all kinds of young talented individuals who may need just a little support to "shoot high" and make their big dreams come true. There is lot of expectations on the part of these young people who do not really need a lot of investments but rather want a motivation and facilitation; they just may need someone to open up the doors to the great world out there so that they understand how big and beautiful is this world and that they could be a part of it and may even define where this world is going in the future. Nuria Choibaeva concluded by thanking all partners and wishing huge success to the project.

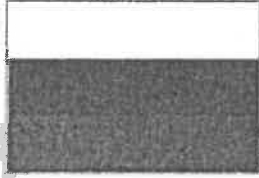
