Brief Description

Lao PDR is rich in wetland biodiversity, essential to the majority of Lao people whose livelihood is based upon natural resources. The Government of the Lao PDR has implemented a number of activities to improve the management of the country's wetlands. However, results are still limited due to a number of difficulties including lack of technical and human resource capacity for wetland management at all levels, the lack of supportive policies and incentives for wetland conservation and the lack of livelihood alternatives for communities reliant on wetland resources. This one-year project will contribute to the removal of these barriers at central and provincial levels.

The project aims to strengthen capacities for sustainable use of Lao PDR wetlands. It will focus on the strengthening of national wetland management regulations and policies. Wetland planning approaches at village, subvillage, village cluster and district/provincial levels will be applied in Attapeu Province. To improve communities' livelihoods, the project will also support village funds and training on wetland resources conservation and sustainable use for poor households; marketing and processing of wetlands and non-timber forest products; and income generation opportunities based on improvement of agricultural activities.

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Section I. Elaboration of the Narrative

Part I: Situation Analysis

Over the past 20 years Lao PDR has made significant progress in the area of environment and natural resource management. The Government of Lao PDR (GoL) has ratified several multi-lateral environmental agreements including the World Heritage Convention (WHC); United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC); Kyoto Protocol 2003 on greenhouse gas, United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity (UNCBD), United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD), Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Flora and Fauna (CITES); and Convention on Persistent Organic Pollutants (POPs). Recently, the GoL has been studying and preparing for joining the RAMSAR Convention on Wetlands.

Despite its rich natural resources, Lao PDR is not yet able to move up from the rank of least developed country. According to the UNDP Human Development Report 2007/2008, the Human Development Index (HDI) for Lao PDR is 0.601. Lao PDR is ranked 133rd out of 179 countries (in 2008) with a fairly high poverty rate. The results of official surveys in Lao PDR indicated that in 1992-1993, approximately 38.6 percent of poor households were living below the poverty line, and in 2002/3 it was estimated that that 28.7 percent of households in the country are poor (NGPES, 2004; Resolution of the VIII Party Congress, 2006; and MPI Background Document for the Round Table Implementation Meeting, 2008). Estimates suggest that despite considerable efforts, 37 percent of children younger than five years of age are underweight. Chronic malnutrition, or stunting, also remains a major issue, affecting 40 percent of children under five, and requires urgent attention by both Government and the development community (MDG Progress Report, 2008).

The Government of Lao PDR has put the poverty alleviation programme as the highest priority of its national development agenda aiming at lifting the country out of the list of the least developed countries by year 2020. The Six-Five Year National Socio-economic Development Plan (NSEDP) has reflected the commitment of the Government towards this goal, which is also in line with the United Nations Millennium Development Goals. The United Nations Common Country Assessment (CCA) of the Lao PDR has identified the strengthening of human capacity and sustainable use of natural resources as key issues. The United Nations Development Assistance Framework (UNDAF) of the Lao PDR 2007-2011 recognizes that Lao PDR is highly dependent on natural resources for economic and social development. Degradation of natural resources and environment poses threats to agricultural livelihoods and hinders the country's progress. Similarly, livelihood, food security and sustainable development are key areas within the assistance framework of United Nations for Lao PDR.

Recognizing the fact that conservation and wise use of natural resources is a primary coping strategy for achieving sustainable development and poverty eradication, the GoL pays special attention to human resource development. The National Growth and Poverty Eradication Strategy (NGPES) emphasizes that increasing technical and institutional capacity is a key catalyst for the socio-economic growth of the country.

In all, approximately thirty wetlands in Lao PDR have been identified that are of international or national importance and meet at least one of the criteria for designation as a Ramsar site (Claridge, 1996). Wetlands are an important contributor to economic growth, with the total economic value of wetlands in Lao PDR (natural and man-made) being estimated at US\$2.26 billion per year (IUCN, 2005). Between 6-8% of Lao PDR's GDP comes from wild capture fisheries which comprise 78% of the country's total fish production (WorldFish Center, 2003). Present fisheries yield is approximately 133,000 tonnes per year for Lao PDR (Baird, 2004). The range of benefits derived from wetlands range from these direct benefits to other indirect ecosystem services which include water retention, purification, and flood protection. Major threats to wetlands include conversion to alternative uses, expansion of hydropower development, overfishing, and others.

The Water and Water Resources Law (1996) is the key legal instrument for water resource management. Various other laws refer to conservation of water resources and aquatic wildlife, navigation, irrigation, hydropower and health.

Even though formal Wetland Management is still relatively new to Lao PDR, communities have been managing wetlands for centuries and in the last few years formal management activities in the areas of wetland biodiversity conservation and sustainable use have made substantial progress. The first wetlands study project was started in 1991 under the technical assistance of the Mekong River Commission. In 1996, an inventory of wetlands in Lao PDR was produced by the IUCN. Subsequent work has included the Mekong Region Water Dialogues Programme led by IUCN that aims to improve water governance in the broader Mekong Region, and wetlands management activities being supported by WWF.

Aiming at enhancing efficient and effective management of the country's wetland biodiversity, Lao PDR, Cambodia, Thailand and Vietnam jointly implemented and completed Phase A (from July 2004 to March 2007) of a regional wetlands programme named The Mekong Wetlands Biodiversity Conservation and Sustainable Use Programme (MWBP) (see Annex XV). This project was funded by the Global Environment Facility (GEF), UNDP, MRC, IUCN and the Government of the Netherlands. See Annex XII for information about MWBP. The Wetlands Alliance Programme jointly implemented by WWF, AIT, CORIN and WorldFish with 30 local partners, financed by Sida works to strengthen local capacity for sustainable wetland management for improved livelihoods and food security. 1

Part II. Strategy

Goal

The overall goal of the Support to Lao PDR Water and Wetland Policy Project is to strengthen capacity for sustainable use of wetlands in Lao PDR for improved food security, local livelihoods and sustainable economic development.

Specific objectives

The two key objectives are:

- 1. To strengthen national wetland management policies
- 2. To support the livelihoods of rural communities depending on wetlands in Attapeu Province

Key outputs and activities

This project directly 1) supports potential accession to the RAMSAR Convention on Wetlands through the realization of an economic valuation of one potential Ramsar site (likely Xe Pian), 2) addresses key issues related to wetland policy making, 3) strengthens integrated management planning capability of the stakeholders at the local level, and 4) supports alternative livelihoods related to wetlands in Attapeu Province. Key expected outputs include: 1) strengthened case for accession to the RAMSAR Convention on wetlands, 2) recommendations for the development of national wetland management regulations and policies, 3) strengthened government institutional capacity in wetland planning, and 4) improved livelihoods of rural communities in target pilot areas. For details on specific outputs, indicative activities and indicators of achievement see section II.

UNDP has committed its Regular Resources funding for this process up to a total of US\$170,000 and the Government of the Lao PDR (GoL) will contribute US\$22,650 worth in kind.

The project is designed to operate at two levels:

1. **National level** – in which the focus will be on: 1) providing recommendations for the formulation of national wetland management policy and regulations; and 2) supporting Lao PDR in acceding the RAMSAR Convention.

2. **Provincial / local level** – in which capacity for wetland planning for target authorities at provincial, district and village level will be strengthened. Support for alternative livelihoods will also be provided.

The experiences and results at each level will be developed in parallel and will be mutually complementary. Local institutions provide practical experience and knowledge to the national policy planning processes.

In order to facilitate the sustainability of project activities, a focus will be placed on developing the capacity of key existing institutions that are responsible for the management and use of water and wetland resources at all levels, as well as the community members with whom the project will work.

This current LWP project will be based on the experience gained from the implementation of the MWBP and it will support the development and implementation of an integrated Water and Wetlands Policy for Lao PDR at national, provincial and local levels.

Reporting, monitoring, and evaluation of the LWP project are based on the UNDP Results Management Guidelines (RMG).

Linkages with National Plans, UNDAF, CCA and MDG

UNDP is firmly committed to provide support for national development, its needs and priorities. Natural resources, especially water and land resources are among the most threatened because the economy of Lao PDR and the livelihoods of its people depend heavily on these resources. Technical and human resource development, legal frameworks, and alternatives for livelihoods of local people are needed to enable the country to cope with environmental degradation and to achieve sustainable development.

This is an environmental project. It supports most of the recent national development priorities, policies and strategies, including National Growth and Poverty Eradication Strategy (NGPES), National Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan (NBSAP), Forest Strategy up to 2020, Agricultural Development Plan as well as the Six-Five Year National Socio-economic Development Plan. The objectives and activities also comply with UNDP's policies and strategies, specifically in the following key areas:

- MDGs, namely Goal 1 (Eradication of poverty and hunger) and Goal 7 (Ensure environment sustainability).
- CCA 1.11 (strengthening human resources) and 1.18 (ensuring the sustainable use of natural resources).
- UNDAF Outcome 1 (By 2011, the livelihoods of poor, vulnerable and food insecure populations are enhanced through sustainable development).
- Country Programme Action Plan (CPAP) Output 1.2 The role of biodiversity, agrobiodiversity, land management and environment in general in the livelihoods improvements and poverty reduction strengthened through enhanced knowledge and management capacity.
- Output 1.3 Enhanced management capacity of the Government in meeting its international environmental obligations through strengthened implementation of multilateral environmental agreements and related national policies and legislation. UNDP Strategic Plan 2008-2011: UNDP's goal in the area of environment and energy is to strengthen national capacity to manage the environment in a sustainable manner while enduring adequate protection for the poor. Specific results are to mainstream environmental and energy issues into development planning; mobilize finance for improved environmental management; address increasing threats from climate change; and build local capacity to better manage the environment and deliver services, especially water and energy.

Part III. Management Arrangements

<u>Project Board:</u> The Project Board is responsible for giving guidance and making executive management decisions to ensure the project will deliver as planned. Approval of project revisions also falls within the scope of the Project Board's responsibility. The Board will meet on at least once during the year and it consists of three figures: an Executive to chair the group, a Senior Supplier to provide guidance regarding technical input and delivery of the project output, and a Senior Beneficiary to represent the beneficiaries of the project. Annex VI outlines the responsibilities of the Project Board. The role of Executive will be held by the Governor of Attapeu, who is also the leader for overall project outputs emphasizing the effectiveness of project management and implementation (see Annex VII for more details on the responsibility of Project Board Executive). The role of Senior Supplier will be held by Chief of the UNDP Environment Unit as the source of funding (see Annex VIII). The role of Senior Beneficiary will be held by three people: a representative from WREO Attapeu, DLF and a representative from NAFRI (see Annex IX).

Project implementing partner: The Provincial Agriculture and Forestry Office (PAFO) of Attapeu Province will be the key implementing partner of the project. At national level, other parties include: National Agriculture and Forestry Research Institute (NAFRI) who conducts targeted research into water and wetlands management; the Living Aquatic Resources Research Centre (LARReC, which forms part of NAFRI), and Department of Livestock and Fisheries (DLF) of the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry (MAF). At provincial level, the key responsible partner for the project is the Provincial Agriculture and Forestry Service Extension Office (PAFO) of Attapeu Province. Each partner plays a vital role in the realization of the project outputs. Technical working groups, which consist of representatives from relevant ministries/agencies, will be formed as appropriate. Annex X outlines the responsibilities of the agencies in water and wetlands management in Lao PDR. The management arrangements are detailed below.




Figure 1. Project Management Structure

<u>Project Assurance</u>: UNDP will be responsible for ensuring the overall performance of the project planning and management. The Project Assurance will also carry out activities such as delivery of project inputs and conversion to project outputs through effective process management, regular reporting and effective use of UNDP Core funds. Annex XI outlines the responsibilities of the Project Assurance.

<u>Project Manager</u>: The project manager will be a senior officer from PAFO who has experience working in the area of wetland management. The Project Manager is supervised by the Project Board Executive. He/she will supervise the technical and management input provided by the project implementation teams. The Project Manager will sign all Funding Authorization and Certification of Expenditure (FACE) forms. (ToR for PM see Annex XII). The Project Manager will work closely with the UNDP Project Board Senior Supplier and Project Assurance to ensure proper integration of the project activities within the national and development priorities. Project activities will also have to be aligned to the UNDP goals. Other staff at the LWP Project and UNDP Lao PDR will also contribute to the process, namely:

- The UNDP Project Board Senior Supplier providing overall guidance;
- The Director Generals of NAFRI/LARReC, DLF and PAFO providing technical and managerial guidance to project teams in their respective agencies on behalf of the Project Manager for effective coordination and communication;
- The PAFO Working Group Team Leader coordinating day-to-day project activities at provincial, district and village levels.
- The NAFRI, LARReC, DLF and PAFO accountants and administrators providing accounting and administrative services.

The activities agreed in the annual work plan (AWP) will be undertaken appropriately. To ensure coordination between national and provincial levels, the Project Manager will regularly communicate with LARReC, DLF and project working groups; and a Board meeting will be held at least once during the project.

The Board has the responsibility for overseeing the activities realized by the Working Groups, as indicated in the approved AWP. The Working Group Team Leaders from LARReC, PAFO and DLF have responsibility for the day to day management of WG activities, and provide the day-to-day operational coordination for the project.

The PM reports directly to Project Board through the Project Board Executive (ToR of PB Executive see Annex VII) and to his/her government line manager(s). The reporting lines for the PM, and the Working Group Team Leaders are as follows:

- Working Group Leaders at national level report to the Project Board Executive on progress against agreed work plans and budgets. At Provincial level, WG Team Leaders report to the PM. The PM has responsibility to communicate and coordinate with implementing partners at provincial level and reports to the Board on all significant matters related to the project. The PM is responsible for communication and coordination with line agencies. The PM has an additional direct communication line to the UNDP Project Assurance and the UNDP Project Board Senior Supplier on all matters related to the project.
- The PM will compile and oversee quarterly, monthly and weekly work plans and progress reports from all the WG Team Leaders and project staff.
- The PM will report to the Project Board regarding the project implementation and the fulfilment of the contractual obligations of national and international project consultants.

The project management team (Project Manager, Assistant Project manager, Working Group Team Leaders, and the UNDP Project Assurance) will ensure that:

- The project will achieve its objectives and expected outputs by managing resources in an efficient, effective, and transparent manner:
- Project expenditures will be reported as part of the quarterly work plan approved by the duly signed project agreement between PAFO and UNDP Lao PDR;
- Delivery of quarterly progress and financial reports will be submitted regularly to UNDP Lao PDR after approval and signature from the Project Manager;
- When necessary, draft budget revisions will be prepared in close consultation with UNDP Lao for their review, approval and signature;
- International and national advisors will be recruited in consultation with PAFO and other stakeholders as appropriate;
- The project management team will raise any issues to the Project Board for decisions if problems arise.

<u>Project Support Staff:</u> Implementing agencies will assign support staff as necessary. An Assistant Project Manager (ToRs detailed in Annex XIII) and an United Nations Volunteer (ToRs detailed in Annex XIV) will be contracted to support PAFO of Attapeu Province and help the National Project Manager in daily management activities.

Funds to be allocated to the LWP will be based on the annual work plan approved by the Project Board.

The funds will be made available by PAFO as detailed in the annual workplan. UNDP will release funds to PAFO quarterly on the basis of 1) Financial reports on the previous quarter's actual expenditures, with attached updated risk, issues and lessons learned logs, updated monitoring schedule, and estimate of expenditures for the following quarter; 2) Quarterly operational work plans for the ensuing three months; and 3) Updated procurement and recruitment plans for the remaining of the current year. UNDP will make direct payments for DLF. Principles of Harmonized Approach to Cash Transfer (HACT) to Implementing Partners will be applied for LWP project fund control. The WG should submit the estimate for expenditures as well as the work plan for the ensuing quarter no later than 15 days prior to the beginning of the quarter to which they refer, to PAFO who will compile the documents received and submit to UNDP.

PAFO is to open a bank account to which disbursements of funds on the part of UNDP will be accredited for the project.

With the assistance of the implementing partner's accountant, the PM and his/her Assistant will prepare quarterly advance statements using FACE Forms according to the HACT Guidelines, which must be endorsed by the Project Board Executive before the request for funds is forwarded to the UNDP Country Office for approval. UNDP Country Office will release funds upon approval of the reports and requests for funds. Processing of advance is as follows:

- The PM is to send the request to UNDP CO by the 10th of the first month of the ensuing quarter;
- UNDP CO appraises the requests and disburses the advance to the project;
- At the end of each quarter, a financial report is to be prepared by the PM and sent to UNDP CO.

All activities and the release of funds to carry them out will be based on annual and quarterly work plans developed by the PM in conjunction with the working groups in the demonstration site in Attapeu Province, at LARReC and the DLF. The annual work plan will be approved by the Project Board.




Figure 2. Flows of funds and reporting

During the course of the project implementation, the government will provide vehicles and information technology (IT) equipment equipped by the previous MWBP as necessary. LWP will provided fund to cover the rental and maintenance of the vehicles and IT equipment as deemed necessary. At the end of the project, any unused funds remaining in the project bank account shall be returned to the UNDP Country Office within three months of the termination of this project or upon advice of the UNDP CO Resident Representative as maybe necessary under the circumstances. Flows of funds and reporting are shown in figure 2.

Part IV. Risk Management

The following are potential risks for the project:

- (1) <u>Multi-stakeholder partnership with a variety of interests</u>. This project needs joint efforts between stakeholders at national, provincial, and community levels. The project approach for risk management is to identify clear roles for each party and make their efforts complementary to each other.
- (2) <u>Schedule for producing output</u>. Since the project activities will be done in sequence, any delay or failure in delivering some activities might affect the scheduled release of the final output. Risk management will involve identifying work plans for activities to be carried out in parallel with combined resources to save time and logistical costs. With frequent updates and adjustments, the project work plan will be regularly reported to the Project Board.
- (3) <u>Staff turnover and restructuring of the involved organizations</u>. This is outside the sphere of control of the project management team. However, the project is hosted by PAFO, who is best placed to ensure the ownership of the local partners. The risk management is to ensure commitment of the organizations and personnel involved in the project to pursue the activities no matter how often there is reshuffling or personnel turn-over.

Part V. Monitoring and Evaluation

The project is to be reviewed and reported in accordance with standard procedures and common UNDP monitoring and evaluation practices for National Implementation projects.

A detailed quarterly and annual work plan as well as a progress report on the activities will be prepared by the PM with assistance of his Assistant and the Working Group Team Leader. A financial statement of expenditures and request for funds will be also be prepared by the PM. The abovementioned documents will be submitted to UNDP Lao PDR Country Office and the Board. The PM will be responsible for completing the relevant sections of the LWP Project

quarterly progress report as well as the annual progress report using a specific standard format.

A micro assessment of the capacity to effectively manage the project and deliver the intended outputs of the project implementing partners will be conducted during the first quarter of project implementation. The primary objective of the microassessment is to strengthen management capacities. The major criteria for this assessment would include the technical, managerial, administrative, and financial capacity. A spot check will also be conducted regularly. The conduct of the micro assessment and spot check exercises will be undertaken based upon the UNDP's standard procedures and guidelines.

<u>Technical Report:</u> Technical reports are detailed documents covering specific areas of analysis or scientific specializations within the overall project. The project team will prepare a list, detailing the technical reports that are expected to be prepared on key areas of activities during the course of the project, and tentative due dates. Annex I. Technical component of the project proposal

1. Background

Lao PDR lies at the heart of the Indochina peninsula, in Southeast Asia. It shares borders with China to the north, Cambodia to the south, Vietnam to the east, Thailand to the west, and Myanmar to the northwest. It covers a total of 236,800 square kilometres, three-quarters of which consists of mountains and plateaus. The Lao population reached 5.6 million in 2005 and is likely to be 6.4 million in 2010 if the overall growth rate is 2.86. The majority of Lao people live and work in the Mekong River Basin, which covers almost the whole of the country.

The Mekong River Basin in Lao PDR is abundant with fresh renewable water, and wetlands. It is important to underline that biodiversity is one of the defining features of this area. It is believed that the Lao Mekong River Basin may contain endemic aquatic fauna and flora (i.e. that are not found elsewhere in the region).

Like many other least developed countries, natural resources and wetlands in Lao PDR face severe threats from over-exploitation, poor management capacity and others.

Many studies have shown that a variety of obstacles to sustainable environmental management exist, namely [1] uncoordinated sector planning approaches; [2] weak policies and institutional frameworks; [3] inadequate information; [4] inadequate human and technical resources for wetland management; and [5] lack of options over uses of natural resources by local communities. These obstacles need to be addressed urgently. This project will play a vital role in tackling these obstacles.

2. Project outputs

The expected outputs of this project are:

- 1. Support for accession to the Ramsar Convention by Lao PDR strengthened
- 2. Recommendations for Lao National Fisheries and Wetland Management Policies formulated
- 3. Capacity for integrated planning processes for Attapeu Province developed
- 4. Livelihoods of target communities in Attapeu Province improved

A summary of proposed project activities is presented below:

3. Project deliverables

3.1 Support to Lao PDR in acceding to Ramsar Convention.

Over the last few years, IUCN Lao and MWBP have been providing support to the Government of Lao to assess the ratification of the Ramsar Convention and to assist the Government to prepare for such ratification. Thorough reviews of the Ramsar Convention have been carried out with high-level established Ramsar Working Groups. MWBP has supported the participation of representatives of the Government of Lao to the COP 9 of Ramsar in Uganda (November 2005) followed by a study tour to draw on the experience in implementing national wetland policy and in establishing a National Wetland Action Plan in Uganda. MWBP has also supported the visit of the Lao delegation from Attapeu and Champasak Provinces and from ministries to a RAMSAR site in Vietnam in October 2006. Since then, the identification of the first Ramsar Site for Lao PDR has progressed considerably.

Significant progress has been made and the final consultations with the Government of Lao PDR have led to a number of specific follow-up recommendations. In 2006, five potential Lao RAMSAR sites were identified including Siphandone, Xe bangfai, Nong Khe, Xe Pian and Xechamphone wetlands. But only data fact sheet of Siphandone was prepared, and that for Xe Pian is in the process of being elaborated. Today, the GoL is strongly considering Beung Kiet Ngong wetland in Xe Pian in Champassack Province and Xe Champhone Wetland in Savannakhet Province, as the potential first two Ramsar sites. Data sheets sufficient for

Ramsar designation have now been prepared for both sites. A case study involving an economic valuation of one of the potential Ramsar sites (exact site to be determined in the discussions with the Ramsar Working Group) will support the case for Ramsar accession.

3.2 Review of national policies

Amongst the most important policies that the project will support are the development wetlandspecific legislation (under the framework of the new draft fisheries law) and a national wetlands policy.

3.3 Fisheries Legislation: Fisheries constitute the main wetland and freshwater resources that contribute directly to rural people's livelihoods and to national economic development. Currently there is a draft fisheries law for Lao PDR. The Department of Livestock and Fisheries proposes to prepare specific regulations under the draft fisheries law that will guide wetland management. The DLF will draw on its extensive experience in this field. The DLF has prepared a draft that now requires further development and consultation with key government stakeholders.

It is proposed that a small Working Group be established to oversee the development of these regulations to ensure effective participation from key government agencies. This Working Group will review existing legal and institutional frameworks on fisheries that have been developed with support from FAO and WWF.

The review of fisheries policy will also draw on case studies of good practice (including community based fisheries management) in order to develop policy recommendations.

<u>3.4 Community based fisheries management</u>: Local communities have a long history of experience in managing different kinds of fishery resources (such as Fish Conservation Zones in Siphandone), deep pools (in the Mekong and other major rivers), and wetland fisheries. Communities have adopted a wide range of management styles that provide useful lessons and recommendations for policy development.

This activity will contribute to the effort to produce a draft Fisheries Legislation that will be presented for endorsement to the Government of Lao.

- 3.5 Wetland policy: Although the significant role that wetlands play in the subsistence and commercial economy, culture, rural livelihoods, and living aquatic resources management is recognized, formal legislation on wetlands management is not yet available in Lao PDR. In order to prioritise topics and issues for detailed wetland policy development, a review of current wetland and related sector policies will be undertaken by key leading government agencies. In this review, an appropriate mechanism for the effective involvement of inter-ministry and key stakeholders' will be established and strengthened. The Department of Livestock and Fisheries (DLF, under MAF) will analyse and synthesize issues and/or inputs obtained from stakeholders into a framework for development of a national policy, regulations and guidelines for Government approval. The overall RAMSAR guidelines for wetlands policy formulation will also be applied during the development of this policy.
- <u>3.6 Strengthening integrated wetland management (iWM) planning approaches</u>— The IWM approach is one of the key area-based planning approaches being adopted in Lao PDR. The main focus of IWM is on sloping lands, and encompasses wetlands, streams and rivers.

The key planning unit for both approaches is at the District level, ensuring the linkages with villages utilising these resources.

It is proposed that the Integrated Wetlands Management Approach is tested in the MWBP target Districts in Attapeu building on village level interventions undertaken by MWBP and partners. This will build on mapping exercises, village and intra-village planning and the incorporation of these plans into District planning processes. This will involve training based on a Training Needs Assessment in order to strengthen the planning capacity of villages, Sub-Districts, and District/Provincial administrations. The strengthening of capacity will be through participatory learning and action processes to mainstream wetland management.

This exercise will produce a draft of District and village wetland management plans.

3.7 Supporting pilot livelihood activities in Attapeu Province – Rural livelihoods in the three target districts in Attapeu Province depend largely on wetland resources. During 2005 and 2006 MWBP and partners have begun the implementation of a number of livelihoods improvement activities. This proposal will build on the progress made in implementing these activities.

The focus of livelihoods interventions will be on the following:

- Marketing and process of aquatic resources and Non-timber Forest Products A number of wetland resources and NTFPs have already been identified with market potential. At present, many of these resources are being traded but with few financial benefits accruing to local people. The LWP project will support the local people (including women) to identify market opportunities and will support a combination of sustainable harvesting practices, domestication, value-adding processes and marketing to ensure that financial benefits accrue to local people.
- Agriculture improvement activities In the LWP project, these include promoting indigenous vegetable gardens, use of bio-fertiliser, and improvement of agricultural yield.

All these livelihood interventions will build on the technical support of provincial and district extension services. Where appropriate, support should come from LARReC, DLF and NAFRI.

Annex X. Key institutions dealing with wetlands management in Lao PDR

The Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry (MAF) has overall responsibility for the management of wetland resources including activities related to the exploitation, development and utilization of water for agriculture; prevention of floods in agricultural areas; the survey of data on meteorology and hydrology of the Mekong River and its tributaries as well as other rivers; and the inventory of water reservoirs for agricultural and domestic purposes.

Irrigation Department is tasked to study, survey and collect data to determine the development of water resources and monitor water discharge from irrigation; formulate strategies and plans for water resource development for irrigation; formulate plans to prevent flood and draught; and supervise, monitor and evaluate the implementation of action plans and projects.

Department of Livestock and Fisheries (DLF) is responsible for transforming of the guidance, policies, strategies and plans of the MAF into action plans and projects to support the development of livestock, veterinary and fisheries sectors; coordination with relevant agencies to survey socio-economic conditions and natural resources and their potential to be used as an information base for zoning the management of livestock and fisheries; collecting, compiling and maintaining of information on livestock and fisheries; and inspecting, controlling and quarantining of livestock and its products, animal and fish.

National Agriculture and Forestry Research Institute (NAFRI) established in 1999 under the supervision of the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry and has equal status with the line departments under MAF. The NAFRI undertakes integrated agriculture, forestry and fisheries adaptive research in order to provide technical information, recommendations and results for agriculture, forestry and fisheries development and strategic formulation of policies and programs in accordance with the Government of the Lao PDR's policy. NAFRI was the executive agency on behalf of the MAF for the management of MWBP in Lao PDR.

³ This role may require more than one person to cover all the user interests. For the sake of effectiveness the role should not be split between too In some cases, a role of the Executive and Senior User could be combined.

Living Aquatic Resources Research Centre (LARReC) established in 1999 as one of ten research centres under the NAFRI of Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry. Its mandate is to organize assessment of the living aquatic resources and socio-economic studies of fisheries in streams, rivers, reservoirs, and wetlands; organize research on fish propagation, especially culture of indigenious species and improvement of the brood stock of introduced species; identified appropriate aquaculture systems with due consideration to potentials of agroecological zones; provide data, information and technology on fisheries for implementations to promote fisheries in collaboration with other institutions. LARReC was the key implementing partner for the Mekong Wetland Biodiversity Conservation and Sustainable Use for Lao PDR.

Water Resources and Environment Administration (WREA) established in 2007 is mandated to coordinate, consult and assess water and environment issues; formulate environment management regulations and guidelines in coordination with the relevant development agencies; develop direct a public awareness programme on the environment; and develop and assist in public education and training on environmental issues. It has right to cooperate, negotiate, and enter in contracts, protocols, memorandum with foreign and international organizations based on the laws and regulations.

Department of Environment (DoE) established in 1992 and merged with WREA in July 2007 acts as the focal point on behalf of WREA in relation to environmental management for the whole country. Its overarching role is to translate broad party and government directives into strategies, policies, regulations, programs and projects, and in this it is to coordinate with other sectors and ministries, and foreign organisations. It also has responsibilities in relation to environmental impact assessments, education, and a range of other activities. The department is also the focal point for three international environmental conventions, namely the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity, the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, and the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification.

Local government/authorities

Provincial Level

The Provincial Agriculture and Forestry Extension Service Office (PAFO), supervise the agriculture and forestry units, offices and sections in the province and districts levels, play the key role in wetland management at the provincial level. PAFO has responsibility in providing specific technical support and backup to district staff through the development of subject matter specialist.

Water Resources and Environment Office (WREO) is mandated to coordinate, consult and assess water and environment issues; formulate environment management regulations and guidelines in coordination with the relevant development agencies; develop direct a public awareness programme on the environment; and develop and assist in public education and training on environmental issues at provincial level.

District and village level

Following the Government policy and decentralization context, the Government gives the utmost importance to not only province but also districts and villages for planning and implementation of the national policy and strategies related to natural resources management. Government promotes the application of participatory approach therefore encourages the 'bottom-up' planning as basis for local government to deal with any development and management issues.

The Provincial / District Agriculture and Forestry Extension Service Office (P/DAFES) under the supervision of PAFO has responsibility to focus on two technical sections devoted to 1) farming and forest extension and 2) technical backup, supervision and coordination of extension activities at district and community levels. PAFES are therefore considerably actual nucleus of MAF interaction with farmers, cooperation closely with other district authorities and serving as the anchor of the village implementation. This takes place through village task force in close cooperation with village community and head of village and his/her administration including mass organizations representatives.

Annex XI. ToR for Project Assurance

The project assurance role supports the Project Board and the Outcome Board by carrying out objective and independent project oversight and monitoring functions, which are mandatory for the project. During the running of the project, this role ensures appropriate project management milestones are managed and completed.

Annex XII. ToR for Project Manager

The Project Manager is responsible for day-to-day management and decision-making for the project. Overall responsibilities

Annex XVI. Mekong Wetlands Biodiversity Programme (MWBP)

The LWP project will build on the wetlands work and experiences gained during the implementation of the Mekong Wetlands Biodiversity Conservation and Sustainable Use Programme (MWBP). The MWBP was approved in 2004 by the three implementing partners (UNDP, the Mekong River Commission, and IUCN) and the four participating countries – Cambodia, Lao PDR, Thailand, and Vietnam, each of which have territory in the Lower Mekong River Basin. The Programme is a GEF-funded initiative executed through UNDP in Lao PDR and with the national and provincial components in each country implemented by IUCN.

MWBP is tackling the difficult issues of wetland biodiversity conservation throughout the Lower Mekong Basin with an emphasis on the sustainable use of wetland resources. Without this emphasis, the conservation of both globally and regionally important species, habitats and ecosystems may come to be seen by some as an irrelevant luxury in comparison to the urgency of human needs and development. The Programme aims to strengthen the capacity of organisations and people to develop sustainable livelihoods and manage wetland biodiversity resources wisely. Originally, the programme was designed for five years (2004-2009). The programme has intervention at three levels – regional, national and local – with demonstration wetland areas in each of the four countries: in Lao PDR the demonstration site was in Attapeu Province.

The programme aimed to:

- Improve coordination for wetland planning from regional to local levels
- Strengthen policy and economic environments for wetland conservation
- Generate and share information
- Train and build capacity for the wise use of wetlands
- Create alternative options for sustainable natural resource use and improve livelihoods

The activities within this project contributed to Component 3 of the MWBP, which aimed to strengthen Lao capacity to manage the biodiversity conservation and sustainable use of wetlands at national, provincial and local levels. The relevant outputs were:

- Output 3.2: Support to Ramsar Convention in Lao PDR
- Output 3.3: Policy recommendations for wetland management formulated for Lao PDR
- Output 3.7: Strengthen capacity for wetland planning to integrate with national IWM planning processes
- Output 3.11: Increased understanding of economic and livelihood values in Attapeu Province

Possible Technical Support (IUCN Lao Proposed Inputs)

IUCN Lao is committed to continuing its support to the MWBP follow-up activities. Given its relationship with the Government of Lao PDR and its long history of involvement in wetlands issues, IUCN Lao is strategically placed to make unique contributions. The IUCN Lao office has played a role in coordinating and facilitating discussion of water and water-related policy issues at the national level. For example, IUCN Lao has been involved with the RAMSAR process since its inception, and has been taking the lead in supporting Lao inputs to regional and national level water dialogues. IUCN Lao has also overseen the MWBP Lao component, and built concrete relationships with implementing government agencies in the field sites.

IUCN Lao has made a long-term commitment to wetlands issues in its Strategic Framework for 2007-20011, through the *Nam*: Water, Wetlands and Watershed theme of activities. Furthermore, IUCN Lao is working to make linkages with other areas of related work in the project area, such as Health and Environment. IUCN will be conducting, in conjunction with the regional Water and Nature Initiative, a Lao National Water Dialogue, in which wetlands will feature prominently. There are also planned follow-up activities in the Xekong River basin to assess and monitor environmental flows, implementing an E-FLOWS approach to water resources management. Through these complementary activities, IUCN Lao will bring additional resources and information to the proposed collaboration.

IUCN Lao is prepared to provide technical support to the following areas of work under the current proposal:

National Level

Technical support at this level will focus on collaboration with central agencies responsible for the formulation and supervision of policy relating to wetlands, including activities regarding:

- Accession of GoL to RAMSAR
 - Support case study of wetlands valuation in Siphandone wetlands complex
- Review of national wetlands policies
 - Provide technical support to cast study on community-based fisheries
 - Conduct review of existing legal and institutional framework and sectors policy

Provincial Level

Inputs at the provincial level will be made in support of provincial implementing agencies through their work in the field to:

- Strengthen Integrated Water Resources Management for wetlands
 - Contribute to development of provincial wetlands management plan and elaborate implementation strategy
- Livelihood activities in Attapeu
 - Provide support to farm-level aquaculture activities
