I. SITUATION ANALYSIS

The Ministry of Economy and Trade (MoET) is mandated to undertake, along with other line Ministries, the formulation of Lebanon's economic and trade policies. Within the Government's overall objectives, MoET has the responsibility of developing the economy through stimulating external trade through negotiating and implementing commitments of international agreements, protecting intellectual property, protecting consumers, preventing anti-competitive practices, both in international and domestic trade, as well as ensuring food security needs by monitoring wheat levels in the market and ensuring enough reserves.

With the support from a UNDP Project established at MoET in 2001, the Ministry of Economy and Trade actively worked on institutional modernization and development in line with the Government's overall administrative and economic reform program. This was pursued in order to improve the business climate and reposition Lebanon as the centre of trade in the region. Accordingly, MoET has forged strategic partnerships with various national and international organizations such as the European Union (EU), the International Finance Corporation (IFC), the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), the Lebanese Economic Association (LEA) and private sector institutions (such as Microsoft) amongst others. These partnerships have proven to be pivotal in building the Ministry's technical capacities, as well as solidifying its image with donor organizations for future project funding.

Furthermore, a wide range of institutional and administrative activities, including the introduction and upgrading of IT capabilities, have taken place over the past 10 years. This has resulted in the effective implementation of Lebanon's international trade and economic commitments (multilateral and bilateral trade agreements—free trade agreements with the EU, EFTA and Turkey and implementing the tariff dismantlement with Arab countries), as well as to strengthening the institutional capacities of the Ministry, and to drafting of laws to fulfil the requirements to accession of the WTO as well as other agreements.

The outlook for the Lebanese economy has been showing great potential. Lebanon's economy has been characterized by two key opposing trends: the first is the (relatively) high level of growth achieved, especially during the period of global financial crisis. Indeed, the banking, real estate, and tourism sectors were amongst the leading contributors to the country's economic recovery and average growth rate of 8% for the 2008 to 2010 period. At the same time, however, there remain large disparities between the country's economic centre, Beirut, and the rest of the country. Therefore, one of the main challenges facing policymakers is the attempt to create and broaden the opportunities for economic growth. The MoET will play a key role in this process, particularly by aligning international trade and Investment activities with national economic growth priorities.

II. STRATEGY

The UNDP Project at the Ministry of Economy and Trade was initiated in 2001 with substantive revisions carried out in 2004 and 2005. An external evaluation, for the period 2001-2010, was undertaken in November 2010. It sought to assess the effectiveness and efficiency of the Project in terms of achieved outputs and results. The evaluation is expected to lead to improvements by proposing adjustments in the implementation approach, including strategies, resources, and an enhanced project design. Accordingly, the overall objective of phase II of this project will remain the same: to build-up and strengthen the institutional capacities of the Ministry of Economy and Trade with respect to economic policy formulation, public sector management and control, private sector development and other related matter falling within the competences of the Ministry. However, and in light of the achievements made in the past 10 years, revisions of project deliverables will be reflected in the new project plan as described below.

In concrete terms, the Project will support the Ministry in the realization of the above stated objective through one main outcome and two specific outputs.

Project Outcome: Capacity gaps at both the policy formulation and institutional levels enhanced

Output 1: Support for sectoral trade and economic policy formulation and implementation provided

The Objective of this output is to aid policy makers and negotiators in making informed decisions regarding the drafting of policies and strategies based on reliable data and quantifiable measures. Moreover, circulation of reports, newsletters and studies on current trade and economic issues will enhance the Ministry's outreach to and interaction with various stakeholders including the general public, the Lebanese and international private sector, and the donor community and improve its image, thus attracting more funding. Additionally, the objective of this output is to draft, amend, comment on and follow up on economic and trade related regulations, including laws, implementing decrees, ministerial decisions, contracts, MoUs, bilateral and multilateral agreements, etc...

Activity 1.1: Economic sectoral studies and policies developed

Output 2: Institutional capacity of the Ministry of Economy and Trade developed and enhanced

In 2001, MoET launched an automation campaign aiming to increase its productivity, effectiveness, and transparency as a public institution. This step was inspired by similar international developments that sought to provide citizens' services in less time, and with maximum efficiency. In the absence of a Ministry IT unit, The UNDP IT Team assumed responsibility for and planned a full automation for the ministry's departments. The key principles involved were to improve operational performance by, a) clearly defining objectives and performance reviews against desired goals; and, b), optimal usage of resources for better results. The methodology utilized was to re-engineer work processes by taking simplification and organization as guidelines. Training the MoET's Human resources on new techniques is an ongoing activity along with building the ministry's systems and data bases, which should facilitate public services in an effective, secure, and prompt fashion.

The objective of this output is also to provide CPD and its staff with necessary economic and trade-related analytical skills for drafting reports and relating economic principles with their current daily activities. Furthermore, a joint project between UNDP/ MOET and BPG, a Lebanese NGO, has been implemented since 2004. BPG funded the establishment of a call centre at MoET for consumer complaints, which has now become a 24-hour functional hotline and one of the essential pillars in enhancing the national role of CPD. The call centre operator who is a UNDP Project staff will be integrated into MoET during Phase II of the project.

Additionally, the output aims at supporting the existing Trade Department's personnel strategy. Currently the Department dealing with foreign trade has only one person acting as Head. The Department needs to boost its staffing efforts, and consequently provide a lot of training on the understanding and negotiations of international trade agreements. Accordingly, support will be provided towards staffing, training, and facilitating technical assistance sponsored through international organizations and donors.

Finally the objective of the output is to support the Trade Remedies Investigative Authority (TRIA) in recommending decisions related to anti-dumping, countervailing, and safeguard measures. The initial phase will involve the creation of a management framework for the implementation of the Law on the Protection of National Production (of 12/2006), its Implementing Decree (number 1204 of 3/2008), and future amendments. Support will also go towards helping the TRIA respond to trade remedies cases initiated by international parties against Lebanon. Accordingly, policy advisory and technical consultation services on legal, economic and financial matters related to the full scope of the law and implementing decree will be given. This will also include creating processes and procedures for the management of daily tasks, and other activities needed to meet legal requirements for the initiation (pre-initiation, initiation, and preliminary determination phases for any provisional measures) and completion (final determination phase for any definitive measures) of investigations. Training activities for the transfer of knowledge will benefit from existing and new bilateral agreements covering this area.

It is to be noted that project staff, under the direction of H.E. the Minister, will continue to interface with international organizations in meetings on behalf of MoET for attracting donor funding and ensuring economic and trade obligations are met in a timely fashion as well as coordination activities among ministries and other stakeholders until such activities can be transferred to core staff.

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IV. MANAGEMENT ARRANGEMENTS

The Ministry of Economy and Trade is designated as the National Executing Agency for this project. The Executing Agency will be responsible for managing the project and will provide overall support to enable it to achieve its intended outputs and results. The Executing Agency will thus be accountable to UNDP for all resources allocated by the latter, whether their source is UNDP or from government cost sharing. This accountability calls for very concrete capacities in the administrative, technical and financial spheres.

The UNDP National Execution modality will prevail, with the support of the UNDP country office. In addition to regular technical backstopping and monitoring activities regularly provided, the UNDP Country Office shall provide the Executing Agency with support services for the execution of the programme. This will ensure that technical and substantive expertise is available to the Programme for coordination, recruitment, and procurement and contracting. (See Annex 1: Standard Letter of Agreement between UNDP and the Government for the Provision of Support Services).

Services shall be provided in accordance with UNDP procedures, rules and regulations. The Government, through its designated executing agency, shall retain overall responsibility for the execution of the project and shall be responsible for and bound by any contracts signed by the UNDP Resident Representative, on behalf of the Executing Agency and upon its request, for the procurement of goods and services and /or recruitment of personnel for the programme. Costs incurred by UNDP Country Office for providing the above described support services will be partly recovered from the Programme budget.

A Project Board will be established to provide technical support, share relevant information, and review progress. The Project Board will comprise: (i) Executive: a representative of UNDP providing in particular technical guidance to the project and secretariat services; (ii) Senior Supplier: a representative of the MoET; (iii) Senior Beneficiaries: representatives of the administration at the MOET. Additional partners/stakeholders can be invited as Observers to share relevant information as and when required. The Project Board, which will meet at least twice a year and will be reviewing annual workplans and budget.

Project Management: The Project Manager will be responsible for day-to-day management and decision making for the project. S/he will also be responsible for planning, budgeting and managing project activities; facilitating support services from the UNDP country office; training and mentoring national staff; oversight, guidance and insuring technical quality of short-term consultants; to prepare and provide the mandatory reports on project progress and achievements, and financial management; and for early flagging of events and changes in the environment which can affect project implementation and delivery and for providing suggestions for problem solving. The Project Manager will report to UNDP's Programme Manager and the National Focal Point.

The Project Staff (as per the organizational chart) will support in project implementation. Staff will report to the Project Manager. For specific tasks the project will be recruiting consultants to provide advice and technical support in project implementation.

MOET and UNDP will also designate the governance Programme Manager to be the Project Assurance and provide objective and independent project oversight and monitoring functions, as well as facilitate relations with other UNDP programmes and cost-sharing donors.

Project Office: The project will be located at the premises of the MOET.

Sustainability: The project will be implemented with a view to achieving sustainable improved institutional capacity and permanent beneficial effects on the Lebanese economic system, present and future.

At the end of the project it is expected that the independence, financial autonomy and human capacity of the MOET will have been reinforced to allow it to better perform its mandate with no or minimal external support.

In accordance with the decisions and directives of UNDP's Executive Board reflected in its policy on cost recovery, the contribution shall be subject to cost recovery by UNDP for two distinct cost categories related

to the provision of support services, namely UNDP General Management Support (GMS) and UNDP Implementation Support Services (ISS).

GMS is recovered with a flat rate of 5% for contribution from government of Lebanon funds and 7% for contribution from other donors. GMS cover the following services:

- · Project identification, formulation, and appraisal
- Determination of execution modality and local capacity assessment
- Briefing and de-briefing of project staff and consultants
- General oversight and monitoring, including participation in project reviews
- Receipt, allocation and reporting to the donor of financial resources
- Thematic and technical backstopping through Bureaus
- Systems, IT infrastructure, branding, knowledge transfer


