A. Brief Description of Initiation Plan:

The Government of Moldova has requested support from GEF to prepare the medium-sized project "Mainstreaming Biodiversity Conservation into Moldova's Territorial Planning Policies and Land-Use Practices" intended to remove the barriers for mainstreaming biodiversity priorities into district territorial planning policies and land use practices. More specifically, at the national level the project aims to establishing an enabling environment for mainstreaming biodiversity into land use planning, compliance monitoring and enforcement and test at the local level models of biodiversity compatible spatial planning and land-use. Capacity building for successful mainstreaming of biodiversity conservation envisaged by the project shall ensure a proper participatory process of biodiversity compatible special planning.

The Preparation Grant for the Project "Mainstreaming Biodiversity Conservation into Moldova's Territorial Planning Policies and Land-Use Practices" shall establish the baseline, collate and analyze the primary and secondary information and outline the GEF increment for the project through a number of relevant studies and stakeholders consultation with a view to further develop the approved project concept (see GEF PIF attached in Annex 1) into a fully formulated project document.

The final output of the initiation plan will be an UNDP-GEF project document and GEF CEO Endorsement request, together with Environmental and social screening checklist (ESSP) and relevant baseline GEF Tracking tool ready for submission to UNDP and GEF by end of July 2014.

B. Project preparation activities

It is envisaged that the medium-sized project will be implemented at both national and local level structured into 2 components: Component A, Planning and enforcement system addresses biodiversity loss and Component B, Conservation and Sustainable Use of Biodiversity on private and communal land.

In line with this structure, the following are the proposed activities for the preparation phase of the project:

- Analysis of existing policies, regulation, legal, financial and institutional instruments, monitoring activities
 that govern biodiversity conservation and in relation to production sectors (agriculture, forestry) that impact
 biodiversity with identification of gaps, risks, barriers, strengths and opportunities for biodiversity
 mainstreaming into district territorial planning policies and land-use practices.
- II. Identify the related initiatives (both national and regional) to proposed project and outline the possible coordination between them.
- III. Describe the 'business-as-usual' scenario and alternative scenario after GEF intervention for biodiversity mainstreaming into district territorial planning policies and land-use practices.
- IV. Capacity assessment to determine the existing capacities (institutional, individual and financial) for mainstreaming biodiversity conservation into district territorial planning policies and land-use practices, consultation with stakeholders for increased ownership and partnerships and recommendations for the capacity building measures.
- V. Profiling of proposed pilot areas in terms of existing and threatened species, socio-economic development, financial planning, spatial and land-use planning to define strategic interventions for the demonstration projects.
- VI. Propose outcomes, outputs and activities for biodiversity mainstreaming into district territorial planning policies and land-use practices in Moldova.

- VII. Preparation and finalization of the UNDP Project Document and CEO Endorsement request according to UNDP/GEF template, including:
 - i. Finalization of project results framework: Further define the results framework with appropriate objective-level and outcome-level quantitative and qualitative SMART indicators, and end-of-project targets. Special attention will be made to include socio-economic and sex-disaggregated indicators.
 - ii. Definition of monitoring and evaluation (M&E): A detailed M&E work plan will be developed, including clear identification of responsibilities and accountabilities, as well as an appropriate M&E budget. The plan will be based on the standard template provided in the UNDP-GEF project document template that reflects the mandatory requirements of the GEF M&E Policy.
 - iii. Definition of management arrangements: The organisational structure governing the project will be decided. This will include identification of the Project Board. Preparation of a detailed multi-year budget following the standard template provided in the UNDP-GEF project document template that reflects the mandatory requirements of the GEF M&E Policy.
 - iv. Ensuring completion of required official co-financing letters. A co-financing guarantee will be collected from participating government institutions, bilateral development partners, multilateral development partners and NGOs who wish to provide cash or in kind contributions to the project.
- VIII. A validation workshop will gather representatives from all relevant stakeholders to present, discuss and validate the final draft project document.

Annex 2: Summary of Consultants Financed by the Initiation Plan

Experts

Local Consultants

National Coordinator and Biodiversity Specialist

- Coordinate the work of the national consultants under the guidance of the International Lead Expert,
 prepare the TORs for national consultants for the preparation phase, collate the information received from local consultants and provide these to International Lead Expert.
- Support the International Lead Expert.in preparing the CEO Endorsement request and provide consolidated inputs to the UNDP Project Document, provide consolidated response to UNDP and GEF comments and liaise with the line ministries/LPAs when needed and upon UNDP request.
- Prepare Annex on the Training Output 1.5 in the area of participatory spatial planning with respect to biodiversity concerns – scope, target group, host institution, draft curricular, logistics and sustainability beyond project and on Training Output 2.4 focusing on biodiversity mainstreaming
- Under the guidance of the International Lead Expert initiate discussions with the relevant national stakeholders on development of the spatially based digital decision-making system for biodiversity conservation and together with national experts define the default parameters of the GIS system to be put in place.
 - o In this line, the issues to be clarified at the PPG stage would around the hosting institution, appropriate layers, compatibility with the cadaster and other existing land use maps and systems currently used by institutions and connected to satellite, the technologies needed, and how regularly it needs to be updated. Cost identification for a functioning system will also be the concern of the preparation phase, as well as ownership and financing after the project end.
- Hold consultations with potential LPAs and further liaise with them to finalize selection of the two pilot districts including in terms of LPAs commitment for piloting of the project outputs at the implementation stage of the project. Secure the agreement/commitments of the LPA's for land allocation for planning and restoration activities. Define the criteria for district selection and profile these in terms of:
 - Brief administrative and population data, socio-economic context
 - List threats to biodiversity from territorial planning and territorial-planning related sectors and their root causes and against each of this list the biodiversity species and ecosystems affected. In identifying these guide by the IUCN Red List species as indicators as per GEF requirements, not only species of national importance. Define indicator species and ecosystems that will be used to measure the success of mainstreaming in each district.
 - Define measures that would need to be put in place to eliminate or mitigate the threats and budget of these measures (GEF and co-financing).
 - Prepare a detailed TORs for setting biodiversity standards through species passport and habitat in each district as an Annex to Project Document
 - Prepare terms of reference for economic valuation of ecosystem services and goods in each district as an Annex to the Project Document
 - Attach the description and maps of the two pilot districts, as above, as Annex to the CEO and UNDP Project Document.
 - Together with the LPAs and under the guidance of the Lead International Expert identify the best option for the biodiversity compensation scheme in the pilot areas and jointly with the national team work out the mechanism/required agreements/technical details for its implementation in an Annex to the Project Document
- Contribute to identification of technical and knowledge barriers, and of political and administrative risks
 that might prevent from effective mainstreaming of biodiversity concerns into territorial planning and
 land-use practices and from implementing successfully the project. Coordinate finalization of the project
 risk matrix.
- Support the UNDP CO in completing the Social and Environmental Screening of the project in terms of providing the needed information and conducting public disclosure, if needed.
- Support the International Lead Expert in completing the required GEF SO-2 Tracking Tool (baseline) which will be further used to track the project progress and the Capacity Needs Assessment Tracking Tool.
- Analyze and propose a biodiversity monitoring system which would enable identification of acceptable level of change in biodiversity important areas it terms of which institution will host, financing and sustainability beyond the project, regularity of monitoring, monitoring methods to be used, how will it be

used to monitor biodiversity results at the project implementation stage.

Ensure organization of the validation workshop at the end of the project preparation phase.

Land use and Pasture management expert

- Assist National Coordinator and Biodiversity Specialist in holding consultations with potential LPAs to finalize selection of the two pilot districts.
- Provide inputs for the pilot districts profiling in terms of the current land-use and spatial planning practices in the respective areas and support the consultation process with local communities on the measures to be piloted.
- Under the guidance of the national coordinator gather and analyze data on standards and norms in agriculture, forestry, livestock management and water management that currently prevent mainstreaming of biodiversity at the local level.
- Contribute to the analysis of potential incentives (and disincentives) for land-users to modify their practices, analyze which of the proposed solutions could be applicable and in which district.
- Initiate discussion with the LPAs on the upcoming support in developing/updating the Municipal Spatial
 Plans accommodating biodiversity concerns, identify the concerns related to this activity, issues and risks
 and based on that contribute to the development of the project risk matrix. As a follow up propose an "exit
 strategy" for this component.
- Identify areas in the selected 4-6 communities (100ha) to showcase biodiversity-compatible land uses in line with the developed spatial plans.
- Secure LPA's decisions for land allocation for restoration activities.
- Based on the consultations with the LPAs, develop an outline of the optimal grazing plan/pasture
 management plan which will be piloted by the project during project implementation. Propose and
 describe the work plan for restoration activities as well as the implementation costs. Consult the plan with
 local communities and present evidence of consultations.
- Identify the needs for further methodological support required to ensure mainstreaming biodiversity conservation into district territorial planning policies and land-use practices (e.g. cattle owners associations or cooperatives etc.).

Forestry expert

- Define on a provision basis where and what forest blocks (max.100ha) will have to be
 planted/restored/conserved to create the ecological connectivity by implementing forest landscape
 practices within the linear ecological corridors (e.g. reforestation adjacent to existing protected areas or
 protection forests) and stepping stone corridors.
- Provide a description of the corridors in terms of the habitats they try to connect, and species that need them and the barriers that threaten them and present a map of the future corridors, if possible at this stage.
- Consult with local forest experts and communities where relevant, identify the sensitive issues that might
 arise in relation to the establishment of new corridors and propose measure to mitigate this. Ensure
 obtaining agreements from the land owners for corridors establishment.
- Define the technical details and activities needed to implement this at the project implementation stage and the budget. This should include delimitation of the corridors area and development of the planting technological schemes (species to be planted, type of works etc.)
- Explore and define together with the local communities the structure of the future "corridors management plan".

- Guide the overall project preparation phase and provide the quality assurance of the delivered project preparation outputs; coordinate the work of the team;
- Provide technical advice to the national consultants in completing the required GEF SO-2 Tracking Tools and Capacity Needs Assessment Tracking Tool and others as required
- Ensure identification of required baselines as per the Project Identification Form
