Challenges are in the area of deriving funds for people centred developmental programmes to support peace. Quite often, it is faced with the challenges of paucity of funds to execute its programmes of peace promotion, peace building and conflict resolution. In the operation of the corps, particularly in resolving conflicts and entrenching peace in the communities where it operates, the key challenges to our operation, partnership and interaction with other stakeholders and communities are:

- Lack of co-ordination and coherence with other actors working in the area of conflict prevention and peace building;
- Inadequate manpower with the right skill and competence in conflict prevention and peace building
- Lack of respect for human rights and distrust in the justice management system.
- Lack of sustainable environmental practices and inequitable distribution of resources.

Lessons Learnt from 2014 Implementation (This section highlights the lessons learnt in programme implementation and partnerships with UNDP and other stakeholders form the implementation of previous AWP)

- There is need for continuous advocacy and sensitization of citizens on the importance of tolerance, mutual respect, peaceful coexistence and the building of a culture of peace.
- Nigeria deserves peaceful conduct of 2015 general elections and there is therefore the need to engage with various stakeholders at all levels
- Peace is central to every religion and interfaith dialogue can be used to bring about sustained peace. There
 is need for facilitated dialogue sessions amongst adherents of different religions in Nigeria.
- Peace and harmony can be achieved in Nigeria through regular and constructive interfaith dialogue

 Evaluation and the use of Peace and Conflict Impact Assessment (PCIA) are at a low level. Evaluation and PCIA are needed for decision-making that is conflict sensitive, in areas such as news reporting; mainstreaming gender in conflict resolution and peace building; and budgets and development processes by governments (good governance).

The programme priorities for 2015 include:

- dialogues towards peaceful conduct of 2015 general elections;
- deepening the culture of peace through interfaith meetings;

- advocacy for good governance, conflict sensitivity and researching, and
- early recovery for victims of violence in the North East

Proposed activities will be implemented as indicated in the table for the work plan (below) by Responsible Partners. Where necessary, consultants/facilitators will be engaged to work alongside a team of Responsible Partners for the activities, like the NSCDC will draw on the expertise of NSCDC professional staff, NAPKC facilitators and personnel of the Institute of Chartered Mediators and Conciliation of Nigeria (ICMC) and where necessary, engage external resource persons and facilitators for successful implementation of the AWP's activities. UNDP will undertake periodic monitoring and evaluation of the AWP activities completed with the regular spot checks from the UNDP Programme Finance Unit. Responsible Partners senior management will also constitute a team of monitors to conduct quarterly review of the 2014 AWP activities. To measure the relevance and usefulness of the implemented activities, questionnaires will be designed for participants' completion at the end of each programme activity, as well as, biannually to measure impact of such programme on targeted audience. Quarterly progress report will be prepared and submitted to UNDP by the Responsible Partners
