### **Project Brief Description**

The overall project objective is to enhance national preparedness capacities of the country for a robust and effective early recovery response to current and future disasters. Based on the lessons learned, UNDP will support National, Provincial and District authorities to increase their knowledge and preparedness for eventual early recovery responses. At the same time, this project will coordinate UNDP's ongoing Early Recovery Response to the complex emergency in KP/FATA.

ERPR Project will continue through first quarter of year 2016. During this period, support to District Governments, local communities, and Temporary Dislocated People (TDPs) living in selected UCs of District Bannu, FR Bannu, D I Khan, FR D I Khan, Karak, Lakki Marwat and District Peshawar will be continued. Through ERPRP support, local infrastructure rehabilitation and capacities of district government and hosting communities will be enhanced to prepare them for effective early recover responses. In year 2016, ERPR Project will increase community resilience of at least 50,000 people in the targeted districts by expanding access to basic services / infrastructure and promoting improved livelihoods.


