**Brief Description:** The overall project objective is to enhance national preparedness capacities of the country for a robust and effective response to future disasters. The pattern of disasters and the type of damage it can cause (in particular when flood generated) is well known. The 2010 Floods and the 2005 earthquake provided ample learning opportunity for assessing the country's response capacities. Based on the lessons learnt, UNDP will support effective preparation for an eventual recovery response. Preparation activities will include the definition of implementation modalities and SOPs, partnership building, and pre-positioning of human and technical resources. The project will work through a partnership approach and will engage with other UN agencies, government Ministries, NGOs, and private sector in the area of their comparative advantage for a coordinated response to support communities in restoration of their basic infrastructure, revival of community livelihoods and support to the government in restoring its governance functions affected by future disasters.
