Govt teams up with **UN to fight floods**

THE Government and the United Nations will establish a system that will detect or disseminate early warnings of flood related risks.

workshop in Port Moresby yesterday detailed that the United Nations Program Development (UNDP) and the PNG Government would establish this system this year to enable local communities to cope with the floods, and enhance country's capacity to adapt to flood-related risks. This warning system would be set up in five selected areas in East Sepik, New Ireland, Morobe, Madang and Northern provinces.

"By increasing the weather and climate information available, this program will enhance the ability of governments and communities of Papua New Guinea to prepare for extreme climate events, build greater resilience and successfully adapt to changing climate," said Roy Trivedy, UNDP resident representative in PNG.

He said this project would be implemented by the Office of Climate Change and Development and would be financed by the adaptation fund from the United Nation Development Programme.

"As first phase of the project, an international expert company will conduct comprehensive mapping and analysis of existing mechanisms, identify gaps and opportunities for improvements, and produce report with a set of actions and resources required for establishing effective early warning systems.

"The system will be placed in the most affected areas such as the inland and coastal flooding areas of the selected provinces," Mr Trivedy said.

He said the four-year project seeks to build community resilience towards occurrences of coastal and inland flooding events through improved awareness, risk management, and institutional capacity.

It is no ordinary Bible - it is a priceless King James Version (KJV) printed in England in 1611, according to Mr Zurenuoc on the eve of his crusade to the US.

There are plans for the KJV - dubbed The National Treasure - to be part of the foundation in the Grand Hall to replace the traditional pillar which had been removed, amid outcry from leaders like Sir Michael Somare and the National Museum and Art Gallery.
