Minutes of the DRM Project Steering Committee (PSC) Meeting

Date & Location: 12 May 2016, National Disaster Centre

1. Opening of PSC meeting

Chair of the meeting, Mr. Martin Mose opened the meeting welcoming participants, and thanking partners for their interest and nominations to be members of the DRM Project Steering Committee. Mr. Mose highlighted the importance of the project for enhancing DRM capacities in the country, and the crucial role that PSC will play in steering the project. Mr. Mose introduced the ToRs for the PSC (Annex 1), and the PSC member organizations (Annex 2). He specified the frequency of the meetings to be once a year, or more frequently if required.

Mr. Mose indicated that while the formal start of project implementation is indicated as March 2015, the actual start date for a number of project components is delayed, due to signature of the project document and eventual hiring of the International Technical Specialist. He welcomed Mr. Khusrav Sharifov, who joined the project in the capacity of the International Technical Specialist beginning of March 2016. Mr. Mose handed the floor to Mr. Sharifov, to introduce PSC members to the project.

2. Presentation of DRM Project

Background and Intro:

Mr. Sharifov delivered a presentation covering background and intro to project, hazards & vulnerabilities, DRM challenges in PNG. Key highlights:

- Project info:
 - Project donor: DFAT Australia
 - o Implementing partner: National Disaster Center (NDC)
 - Duration: 3 years (2015 2017)
 - Budget: ~ \$2.7 mln (DFAT)
 - Focus: Capacity building (NDC, PDCs, Govt. institutions, other partners)

Project components:

Mr. Sharifov continued with presenting the four project components, including:

- Risk Reduction, Preparedness, Response & Early Warning;
- Mainstreaming of DRM;
- Recovery; and
- Coordination

These four components of the project are linked with the four project outputs:

- Disaster preparedness and response mechanisms enhanced and disaster early warning procedures strengthened
- Disaster risk management integrated into development plans and budget
- Preparedness and planning mechanisms and tools to manage disaster recovery processes at national and sub-national levels strengthened
- Readiness of the Disaster Management Team members and the National Disaster Centre to prepare and response to disasters enhanced

Mr. Sharifov noted that while the implementation of the fourth component of the project (Humanitarian Coordination) has been ongoing since mid-2015, the actual implementation of other components (1 to 3) were initiated only with the recruitment of the Technical Specialist in March 2016. He also noted that the rest of the project team are yet to be hired, which will further delay implementation of specific components of the project, especially at the provincial level. In order to achieve the required objectives of the project in a timely manner, these delays will most likely require a 'no-cost' extension of the project. Timing for the recruitment of the full project team should be calculated into the extension period.

Mr. Sharifov also indicated that the current project team members (Humanitarian Coordination Specialist & Technical Specialist) are busy with supporting UN Resident Coordinator, UN Country Team as well as the Disaster Management Team with the coordination of the response to ongoing El-Nino induced drought. This will certainly cause further delays with project implementation. This has already been identified as a "Project Risk" in the DRM project document.

Project team:

The project team was also presented as part of the Project Management Arrangements. While Humanitarian Coordination Specialist has been on-board since August 2015, the rest of the project staff are yet to be recruited. These are:

- Project Manager;
- Project Analyst;
- Project Fin-Admin Assistant;
- Project Consultants (internationals and nationals);
- Project Driver;
- Provincial Project Assistants;

In addition, short term staff will be recruited to support with the implementation of key project components. Project Organogram is attached as Annex 3.

Project risks:

A number of project implementation risks were also presented, including:

- Severe and multiple disaster events;
- NDC and other Government agencies have limited staff capacity and/ or do not assign sufficient or appropriate staff;
- Lack of government's commitment to DRM in general, and unavailability to respond and attend to project activities and required consultations;
- Relevant line ministries & provincial authorities do not participate in the implementation of the project at appropriate and effective level;

NDC and UNDP committed to work together to mitigate the risks where applicable. It was indicated that the first risk (on severe disasters) is already impacting project, as the current team is involved with supporting UN RC and DMT with response to El-Nino induced drought.

Project Workplan 2016:

Mr. Sharifov continued with presenting project workplan for 2016, which was printed and distributed to participants (refer to Annex 4). Presentation provided key activities currently planned for 2016.. The list of key activities is included as Annex 5. The estimated budget for 2016 is USD 1,065,000.

Selection of Pilot Provinces:

The presentation continued on the selection of pilot provinces for implementation of project activities at the sub-national level. The Project Document indicates that five pilot provinces will be selected for this purpose. The rest of the presentation covered criteria used to select pilot provinces. It was noted that Autonomous Region of Bougainville (ARoB) was recommended by NDC and UNDP to be pre-selected as a pilot province, regardless of the results of applying the selection criteria. This is mainly due to the fact that ARoB has major and ongoing recovery needs, and is also prone to various natural disasters. The initial criteria selected were the following:

- Vulnerability to hazards;
- 2. Historical disasters/damage data;
- Socio-economic & poverty indicators (i.e. HIES survey);
- 4. DRM project implemented/being implemented (at the provincial level);
- 5. Number of DRM/DRR Projects implemented/being implemented in the province;
- 6. Low capacity (technical and resource-wise);
- 7. High motivation of provincial authorities;
- 8. Low political/institutional risk;
- 9. Alignment with ongoing DRM/Risk Reduction projects of UNDP (i.e. Adaptation Fund);

Due to unavailability of data, only the following 3 criteria could be used for the selection of pilot provinces:

- 1. Vulnerability to hazards;
- 2. Historical disasters/damage data;
- DRM project implemented/being implemented (at the provincial level);

As a result of application of the first two criteria, the following 7 provinces were identified for further review:

- 1. Central
- 2. WHP
- 3. Morobe
- 4. Madang
- 5. WNBP
- 6. ENBP
- 7. ARoB

The following three provinces were not further selected as a result of application of the third criteria (# of project implemented/being implemented):

Morobe

3. ENBP

It was also highlighted that the existing DRM capacities in WNBP and ENBP are higher than the average, in addition, these two provinces have already benefited from comprehensive Risk Assessment supported by DFAT in the past. As a result, the following four provinces remained:

- 1. Central
- 2. WHP
- 3. Madang
- 4. ARoB

It was noted that these four provinces also represent the four regions of the country:

- 1. Central Southern Region
- 2. WHP Highlands Region
- 3. Madang Momase
- 4. ARoB NGI Region

For the selection of the fifth province, DFAT representative suggested to consider Chimbu (Simbu) province, due to it's high vulnerability to disasters, and the planned development interventions in the province. PSC members endorsed this suggestion.

3. Decisions taken

PSC endorsed key decisions taken during the meeting, including:

- PSC ToRs & membership (refer to Annexes 1 & 2)
- Project workplan, budget and key project activities for 2016 (refer to Annex 4 & 5)
- Five pilot provinces for the implementation of project activities at sub-national level

4. <u>AOB</u>

Next meeting was suggested to be organized at the end of the year, to review project implementation progress and agree on workplan for 2017.

No other AOB were raised and discussed at the meeting.



UNDAF/ Expected CP Outcome(s): By 2015, Government and civil society have enhanced their capacity to implement biodiversity conservation, low carbon and climate resilient development initiatives for environmental sustainability and improved community livelihoods to reduce the vulnerability of women, girls, men and boys to disaster risks.

Expected Output(s):

Implementing Partner: National Disaster Centre (NDC)

Brief Description

This three-year project is geared towards helping the Government of Papua New Guinea to strengthen its overall Disaster Risk Management capacities. The project was signed with the National Disaster Centre in in September 2015. In the first year the project will mainly focus on: the establishment and strengthening of disaster risk management committees to strengthen the planning processes; strengthening of Provincial Disaster Management offices through provision of emergency communication systems/equipment; and the strengthening of disaster response and preparedness through development of disaster management plans. This will include the development of standard operating procedures for the following; early warning dissemination; disaster response, including control, command and coordination; and damage assessment and reporting. Besides, the project will also assist the National Disaster Centre in its ongoing response to the El Nino induced drought situation in Papua New Guinea that includes supporting the Disaster Management Team and NDC in Monitor the situation in the country, information-sharing, drought assessment and any other support that might be required. The project will be implemented in partnership with a range of stakeholders
