**Results-based Reporting** 

OUTPUT 1:Institutions at national, district and community level have improved technical capacities to reduce risks, manage and respond to natural disasters and limit gender-differentiated impacts

#### Output level achievement

The concept notes for DIDIMACs training, NPDM workshop, and monitoring of DRM mainstreaming aredrafted. They are now ready to be submitted for approval.

#### Completed activities that contributed to the above achievements

Activity 1.3: Enhance the capacity of DRR/DRM organizations involved in disaster management: MINEMA, METEO Rwanda and local staff including disaster management committees

The concept note drafted for organizing the workshop for DIDIMACs especially district staff. The concept note to conduct a workshop - training on disaster risk assessment drafted by technical staff in order to train district staff involved in development sectors at the district level. The activity is aligned with MINEMA action plan and DRR capacity development strategy, which has been developed by MINEMA at the beginning of this year.

# Activity 1.6 Support to the effective operation of NPDM and to the development, update and dissemination of DM policies, strategies and plans

The concept note to conduct the NPDM consultation workshop/meeting for national strategy for DRR drafted by the unit in charge of Response and Recovery and submitted for approval. The implementation of the activity is planned in June 2020.

## Activity 1.7 Support to mainstream DRR/DRM into national and district Development Plans and Development Sectors

The concept note to monitor DRR/M mainstreaming in district plans was drafted by technical staff. The activity will be carried out at district level so consultations with district authorities will also be done to involve them in the organization of the activity. The activity aims to assess the level DRR/M is mainstreamed into district plans such as District Development plan, annual work plan and Imihigo performance.

#### Change in plan

The training was not organized, workshop was postponed and monitoring visit postponed due the coronavirus outbreak and confinement of the staff to avoid coronavirus spreading. The staff were working at home and planned meetings and trainings postponed.

**OUTPUT 2:** Population, local authorities and institutions (District and DR management committees)have increased knowledge and skills of risks from evidence-based disaster risk assessments

#### Output level achievement

Rwanda's male, female and vulnerable population in selected 10 districts prone to disasters aware of disaster risk due to awareness activities done through TVand radio programmes.

#### Completed activities that contributed to the above achievements

Activity 2.4 Conduct DRR awareness raising activities among population through TV/radio programmes and production targeting vulnerable population and including specific gender awareness activities and organize and celebrate DRR week

From January to March 2020 DRR awareness raising activities implemented such as awareness campaign through mass media such as publicity spots, TV, Radio, interactive talk shows. The activity of public awareness on DRM and disaster risks facilitated on prevention from heavy rains, lightening, winds and other related disasters.

Activity 2.6.Collect, document and cover disaster data, events and evidences through digitalized system for public awareness and communication

Disaster communication team supported and facilitated to be operational. Disaster data and events regularly collected, documented and covered for public awareness. Pictures of some disaster events are presented as annex.

#### Change in plan

Some Disaster events were not covered due to prevention from coronavirus. The communication team did not manage to cover all disaster events as planned.

**OUTPUT 4:** Communities in selected high-risk districts have strengthened capacity to mitigate, adapt and respond to disaster risks

#### Output level achievement

The concept note to meet affected community and local authorities was drafted and ready to be submitted for approval. The Muko Sector of Musanze District selected as the project site.

#### Completed activities that contributed to the above achievements

Activity 4.4: Support the implementation of innovative mitigation and adaptation measures through community-based approach including specific measures implemented by local women's groups

The concept note to develop the project proposal of Community-Based Flood Mitigation and Adaptation project for Musanze District drafted. The project site is a flooding area in Muko sector of Musanze District. The community requested MINEMA to support their local initiatives when MINEMA staff and community in Muko sector were working together in Community works done last year.

The involvement of the beneficiary population and local authorities in the development of a project proposal for Flood Mitigation and Adaptation project will also contribute to capacity building of the community at grass root level.

#### Activity 4.5: Support innovative socioeconomic initiatives of population vulnerable to disasters

The workshop for disaster-affected people conducted from 9<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> March 2020 in Karongi District. With regard to the implementation of the activity "support innovative socioeconomic activities of population affected by disasters in Karongi District" the technical team composed of the Disaster Project Specialist and Disaster Technical Advisor facilitated the orientation and briefing workshop on implementation of income generating activities. The 143 community beneficiaries organized into seven manageable groups in Rwankuba Sector of Karongi District.

The capacity of disaster victims strengthened through orientation workshop on micro-project elaboration and implementation. After registration, the 143 disaster-affected people gathered into seven manageable groups where each group elected the committee composed of the President, Vice President, Treasurer/Secretary and two counsellors. The members of the groups completed the project formats that will be used in the distribution of start-up tool kits/project inputs once funds are transferred. The micro-projects identified are related to

agriculture, livestock, handcraft, Carpentry, masonry and tailoring. We are recalling that other 46 affected people of Murundi Sector had been organized into groups last year.

MoU between MINEMA and Karongi District submitted to District authorities for input/approval. We are still following up the MoU submitted to Karongi District but they plan to review the document by June 2020.

#### Change in plan

The field visit to collect data in Muko Sector of Musanze District postponed. The consultation with district and sector official postponed.
