### 1. Executive Summary

The quarter II Progress report of the project" Strengthening National and Local Disaster Risk Management Capacity, Resilience and Enhancing Preparedness and Early Warning System in Rwanda" covers the activities implemented in the period from April to June 2019.

This report presents the activities undertaken and results achievements during the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter April to June 2019 which are continuously and cumulatively linked to achievements realized during the previous quarter. The result-achievements during the reporting period contributed to the projects outputs through the implementation of different activities planned in annual work plan and in the Quarter II April to June 2019:

- 1.1. Conduct DRR/DRM Capacity Needs Assessment of MINEMA, District staff, NPDM, NADIMATEC Rwanda Meteorology Agency, DIDIMACs and SEDIMACs
- 1.3. Enhance the capacity of DRR/DRM organizations involved in disaster management: MINEMA, METEO Rwanda and local staff including disaster management committees
- 1.3. Project Monitoring and Evaluation and bank charges
- 1.4. Support to mainstream DRR/DRM into district Development Plans
- 1.5. Support program personnel to manage and coordinate the program (Salary for project staff and communication (Support to SPIU)
- 1.6. Support to the effective operation of NPDM and to the development, update and dissemination of DM policies, strategies and plans
- 1.11. Support the operationalization of District Disaster Management Officers
- 2.2. Implementation of National Risk Atlas Recommendations
- 2.4. Conduct DRR awareness raising activities among population through TV/radio programmes and production targeting vulnerable population and including specific gender awareness activities,

Furthermore, this report is providing the updated work plan for the next Quarter July to September 2019.

### 2. Background and project purpose

Since October 2018, the Ministry in charge of Emergency Management with the support of United Nations Development Programme in Rwanda has started the implementation of the project" Strengthening National and Local Disaster Risk Management Capacity, Resilience and Enhancing Preparedness and Early Warning System in Rwanda". The five year project aims to achieve the outcome 'reduce risks and build the resilience of the population to climate change and natural disasters' by strengthening the technical capacities of institutions on better disaster risk management both in the long term, and short-term emergency preparedness at all levels and build disaster resilience of the population.

The focus will be given also to the resilience, readiness, and vulnerability reduction of populations through different mitigation measures in areas prone to disasters and simulation exercises, as well as strong and adapted disaster-related early warning system.

The project will achieve the following four outputs:

**Output 1:** Institutions at national, district and community level have improved technical capacities to reduce risks, manage and respond to natural disasters and limit gender-differentiated impacts;

**Output 2:** Population, local authorities and national institutions have increased knowledge and skills of risks from evidence-based disaster risk assessments;

**Output 3:** Enhanced multi hazard early warning systems to enable effective preparedness, response and recovery;

**Output 4:** Communities in selected high-risk districts have strengthened capacity to mitigate, adapt and respond to disaster risks.

The following section highlights key achievements during this second quarter 2019 (April to June 2019) against the mentioned planned activities.

### 3. Results-based Reporting

The progress achievements were realized towards projects results during the second quarter 2019 of the Project "Strengthening National and Local Disaster Risk Management Capacity, Resilience and Enhancing Preparedness and Early Warning System in Rwanda". Key achievements based on

indicators, baseline and targets are provided as reference to indicate the results. In addition to the outputs delivered, challenges/constraints with adopted solution and key lessons learnt are presented in the table below.

OUTPUT 1: Institutions at national, district and community level have improved technical capacities to reduce risks, manage and respond to natural disasters and limit gender-differentiated impacts

Activity 1.1: Conduct DRR/DRM Capacity Needs Assessment of Ministry in Charge of Emergency Management, District staff, NPDM, NADIMATEC Rwanda Meteorology Agency, DIDIMACs and SEDIMACs

### Achievements

- 1. The consultant to conduct DRM Capacity Assessment of MINEMA, District staff, NPDM, NADIMATEC, SEDIMAC and Meteo has been hired. (Contract, TOR and inception report attached)
- 2.The final document will be available in next quarter ( UNDP is invited to Join MINEMA for validation and final evaluation )

The activity is a direct capacity development intervention and strategy adopted by the project. The results of this key action will lead to DRR/DRM capacity development strategy and plan for MINEMA, District staff, NPDM, NADIMATEC Rwanda Meteorology Agency, DIDIMACs and SEDIMACs.

Activity 1.3: Enhance the capacity of DRR/DRM organizations involved in disaster management: MINEMA, METEO Rwanda and local staff including disaster management committees

### **Achievements**

Date: 23/04/2019

1. 70 members n( 46 males and 24 females ) of 15 SEDIMACs of Nyarugenge, Kicukiro and Gasabo of the City of Kigali have been trained on disaster management (concept note and report attached)

### 2. Training in Southern Province

Dates: 28-31/05/2019 in the Districts Nyanza and Ruhango

4-7/06/2019 in Muhanga and Kamonyi Districts

In sum, the training helped the **266** SEDIMACs 'members to understand their role and responsibilities in Disaster Risk Reduction. The trained people will train other people from community so this training offered an opportunity to train trainers.

### **Objectives**

- The training of SEDIMACs members aimed at:
- Distinguish the major disasters in Rwanda and their effects;
- Acquire basic skills and knowledge in disaster management;
- Raise awareness on hazards prone to the region;
- Spread the culture of disaster preparedness;
- Make Local Authorities able to train local community at large.

### **Covered topics**

- Disaster management concepts and categories of disasters
- Disaster management cycle
- Pertinent disasters in the region, their negative impacts and mitigation measures
- Role and responsibilities of local community in DRR
- Role and responsibilities of SEDIMACs members in DRM

### Lesson learnt

The trainings were the best way to strengthen the capacity of local leaders as well as to increase Disaster public awareness among local leaders. The training was a direct capacity development strategy aimed at strengthening institutional and individual capacities for decentralized entities on DRM at grass root levels.

### 3. Media training on disaster prevention, risk reduction, preparedness, response and recovery communication

From 05<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> May, 2019, the training of media has been held in Musanze District at La Palme Hotel to share with the media some key information on "disaster prevention, risk reduction, preparedness, and response and recovery communication".

25 people from different Media houses were trained on emergency data collection and reporting

### Objectives of the training

The key objectives of the training were:

- a. Increase the knowledge of journalists on disaster management, risk reduction and communication
- b. Enhance the media relations in terms of disaster related messages dissemination.
- c. Increase the disaster risk reduction news coverage

### **Topics Covered**

- 1. Welcoming remarks and Introduction of the training... (Purpose of the training, objectives, expectations and outputs, the MINEMA in a nutshell)
- 2. Disaster management (concept and cycle) and current emergency status in Rwanda
- 3. Communications before, during and after emergencies (rumours managements, communication channel, timing, tools, behaviour changing information,)
- 4. communication during and after the emergency analysis and way forward
- 5. Types of footages to feature audio-visual news stories before, during and after

emergencies

- 6. What is the content to be included in the News stories? What to be pitched before, during and after emergencies.
- 7. Disaster management and Development (effects, loss and damages) and opportunities, in investing in DRR)
- 8. Group discussion on appropriate communication and reporting channel tool, impactful content, for Rwandan prone disaster and emergencies management

### Lesson learnt

There is a need to have a clear policy or guidance on identification of high risk zone, safer zone with a complete scheme of relocating the population as it is confusing even in reporting.

The Population working on daily basis in general and especially in Mining sector are more vulnerable and once affected there are no legal basis for compensation which undoes the advocacy done by media.

### Activity 1.5: Support program personnel to manage and coordinate the program

### **Achievements**

100% of project staff is regularly supported to manage and coordinate the programme. Seven programme staff timely and regularly remunerated.

MINEMA technical capacity is continuously reinforced and strengthened through financial support; Programme activities were effectively implemented by the programme staff.

### Activity 1.6: Support to the effective operation of NPDM and to the development, update and dissemination of DM policies, strategies and plans

### **Achievements**

Date and Venue: 28th-31st May 2019 in Splendid Hotel - Muhanga

MINEMA organized a workshop for the National Platform for Disaster Management with the aim of reviewing and updating the National Matrix Contingency Plan.

The activity was conducted to ensure in order to identify gaps and challenges as well as improve the national readiness to handle sectorial crisis..

Following institutions participated to the workshop: MINIMA, MININFRA, WASAC, RTDA, MINALOC, MoH, RNP, RDF, Care International (1), World Vision International, Trocare, Caritas Rwanda, Save the Children, Concern Worldwide, and Rwanda Red Cross.

### Activity 1.11: Support The operationalization of District Disaster Management Officers

### **Achievements**

All DDMOs are regularly supported for operations and they are performing their duties in

districts where they are deployed.

Five District Disaster Management Officers (DDMOs) deployed respectively in Burera, Huye, Karongi, Nyarugenge and Rwamagana Districts have been provided with logistical facilities such fuel, airtimes, office stationeries etc.

Each DDMO in his/her District is performing the following activities:

- Day to day operational management of disaster management activities at district level;
- Ensure that the Early Warning and the disaster monitoring information systems are fully operational and maintained at district level;
- Support all organs of the Government at district level in preparing for and reducing the risk of disasters;
- Monitors, analyses and reports on humanitarian response provided to affected population in the district;

Output 2: Population, local authorities and institutions (which institutions) have increased knowledge and skills of risks from evidence-based disaster risk assessments

### Activity 2.2: Implementation of National Risk Atlas Recommendations

### **Achievement**

The concept note to undertake a workshop for MINEMA staff was developed. The workshop would be facilitated by the consultant/Experts who developed the National Risk Atlas. Since consultants are not yet available, the activity will be implemented in the next quarters.

### Change in plan

The activity to implement National Risk Atlas recommendations was postponed to Q3 because of conflicting schedules of experts (consultants who developed Atlas in 2016

Activity 2.4: Conduct DRR awareness raising activities among population through TV/radio programmes and production targeting vulnerable population and including specific gender awareness activities

### **Achievements**

Disaster related programs are broadcasted by RBA on radio and television

### Activity 2.5: Organize disaster risk management awareness through secondary schools clubs

### **Achievements**

### Dates: 25-29 June 2019

The awareness campaign was organised in ten schools in Rwamagana district during the last week of June:

GS Janjagiro, GS Karenge, GS Muyumbu, GS Mwurire, GS Rubona, GS Nyagasambu, GS Cyimbazi, GS Rwamagana protestant GS Nyarusange, GS Nsinda

### **Objectives**

- Raise awareness on hazards pertaining to the region,
- Spread the culture of disaster prevention, mitigation and preparedness,
- Make members of clubs capable of conveying DRR message to students and community,
- Remind responsibilities of DRR Clubs.

### Lesson learnt

The training on fire fighting has to be also organized;

There is a need to provide CDs with photos for training materials to show different disasters occurred in different regions of Rwanda;

The teachers should help clubs to understand DRR.

Activity 2.6.Collect, document and cover disaster data, events and evidences through digitalized system for public awareness and communication

### **Achievements**

- 1. Disaster data and events are regularly collected, documented and covered through a digitalized system for public awareness and communication—(CD TV shows, radio programmes and documentary film submitted
- 2. Disaster risk identified in disaster risk atlas for Nyabihu district was collected and digitalised

Output 4: Communities have strengthened capacity to mitigate, adapt and respond to disaster risks

Activity 4.1: Assist districts prone to disasters in managing disasters where there is no District Disaster Management Officer (DDMO)

### **Achievements**

Eight districts (Rwamagana, Nyamagabe, Karongi, Burera, Kigali city, Kicukiro, Nyarugenge and Gasabo) were supported. The DDMOs have been regularly remunerated.

### Activity 4.3: Production and dissemination of public awareness materials

### Achievements

Tender for awareness materials has been completed and awarded to a successful bidder. Materials for awareness were produced and disseminated through DDMOs in 30 districts.

(CD TV shows, radio programmes and documentary film attached)

Activity 4.4: Support the implementation of innovative mitigation and adaptation measures through community-based approach including specific measures implemented by local women's groups'

### **Achievements**

The project for Flood mitigation and adaptation in Jenda Sector of Nyabihu District was selected to be implemented with the support of MINEMA through the community based approach and this would serve as pilot.

### objectives

The purpose of the field visit was to facilitate the development of the Community-Based Flood Mitigation and Adaptation project in Nyabihu District with the following specific Objectives:

- Involve community and local authorities in project identification and development;
- Conduct assessment among local people regarding the flooding areas in Nyabihu District;
- Verify if there are any measures that have been implemented by local authorities for those flooding areas;
- Seek for possible measures for implementation of Community-Based Flood Mitigation and Adaptation project in Nyabihu District;
- Identify , develop Flood Mitigation Projects to implement in Nyabihu District ;
- Enhance the Ownership and participation of Local authorities and beneficiaries.

### Change in plan

The activity is continuing in the next quarter from July to September 2019.

### Activity 4.5: Support innovative socioeconomic initiatives of population vulnerable to disasters

### **Achievements**

Beneficiaries of innovative socioeconomic initiative from Karongi districts have been identified:

- Murundi sector: 43 beneficiaries
- Rwankuba sector: 176 beneficiaries the beneficiaries will be facilitated in creating small income projects, assisted in farming activities and in vocational activities

### Key achievements:

We met Sector officials in Rwankuba and Murundi Sectors to discuss on how the disaster affected people will be supported so that they run micro-projects to recover from disaster effects.

The sectors visited are the most affected by the landslides and heavy rains occurred in last year 2018 in Karongi District.

District leaders together with affected community identified some micro-project able to generate revenues to address the consequences of disasters occurred in the region in 2018. The micro-projects identified are related to:

- Agriculture project
- Livestock
- Handcraft
- Carpentry
- Masonry
- Tailoring

In the next steps, the disaster affected people will develop project in simple format proposed.

MINEMA will develop one consolidated project to be supported in the context of Support innovative socioeconomic initiatives of population affected by disasters

MoU between MINEMA and Karongi District will be signed for providing grant to people affected by Disasters in Karongi.

The Disaster affected people will be then supported to implement income generating projects.

### Activity 4.6: Carry out demonstration and create awareness on fire and lightening prevention

### through installation of model lightning rods and fire extinguishers in public buildings

### **Achievements**

8 fire drills have been conducted in Northern province, namely:

- Rulindo HQ
- IPRC Tumba
- Gakenke HQ
- Nemba hospital
- Musanze district head office
- INES Ruhengeri
- UR-CAVM-Busogo
- SONRISE secondary school

In total 611 people attended the demonstration sessions and the activity was facilitated by 6 MINEMA staff and RNP fire rescue brigade

### **Findings and Challenges**

- Some fire extinguishers equipment were not functioning or were on expiration date
- No regular maintenance of equipment as required
- Fire extinguishers were not sufficient and enough as it should be fixed on the wall, at least one per block;

The activity of fire drill was very appreciated by beneficiaries.

### Activity 4.7: Support to population affected by disasters; Assist timely all disaster victims with relief assistance

### **Achievements**

2640 iron sheets and 952 Kg of fil galvanise, were purchased and they were stored in MINEMA store ready to be provided to the beneficiaries
