heading to and from East Honiara yesterday successfully made their way but late in the afternoon the Burns Creek road was suddenly flooded and covered the entire road.


Only big and high vehicles managed to drive through the road leaving all low vehicles to remain at both sides of the flooded Burns Creek road.

UN lauded for peace efforts here

PRIME Minister Rick Hou has hailed the United Nation's (UN) peacebuilding programme in the country.

In his speech to officially launch the new peace-building programme supported by the UN Peacebuilding Fund, Prime Minister Hou said the UN peace-building programme is important for a lot of reasons.

Firstly, the Prime Minister said, RAMSI left Solomon Islands last year and there is a need to sustain the many gains and achievements in the country, as well as deepening of the peacebuilding efforts through accelerating development and reform.

Secondly, the Prime Minister added, as the country prepares for the National General Elections next year, it is important to ensure the integrity of the

process and for a clean and peaceful election outcome.

But equally important, the Prime Minister said the UN peace-building programme is also about accelerating inclusive development, participation, and nation building.

He said the current UN programme design should allow for open dialogues on key development issues connecting to peace and stability in the country.

"This is also my Government's commitment, but all of us have to work harder to deliver development and peace in our communities," he said.

Prime Minister Hou said development of the Solomon Islands as a whole is essential to building long lasting peace in our communities.

"We surely cannot have peace at the national level if some of our communi-

ties are left behind. Nobody should be left behind. This is our international commitment and it is our government's commitment," he said.

Meanwhile, the Prime Minister also commended the role of the UN Peacebuilding Fund, and Peacebuilding Commission (PBC) which are firm supporters of our efforts to building peace globally.

"I am very encouraged by the strong partnership the Solomon Islands has with the UN family of agencies, more especially the UNDP and the UN Women.

"To that end I would like to take this opportunity to thank the UN peacebuilding team in Solomon Islands who have worked very hard to provide support under the first peacebuilding programme," he said.

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
