Prime Minister Hou said development to building long lasting peace in our communities.



"It is common scenes that heavy rain can cause flash flooding and natural destruction to human lives or properties.


"Everyone must stay safe and listen for further warning and from weather information authority," Liu said.

It's understood that most schools in Malaita suspended classes early to allow their students to return home.


