## Narrative

The UNDP's Improving Access to Justice in Sierra Leone Project has been ongoing since 2009 and has the objective of contributing to Sierra Leone's peace consolidation agenda through supporting initiatives that focus on enhancing access to justice for vulnerable people, especially women and children. It seeks to foster an effective, responsive, accessible and fair justice system, promote the rule of law, including both formal and informal processes, with due consideration for the rights of the poor and in particular women.

The project's continued relevance has been determined by its alignment with national strategic frameworks including the Justice Sector Reform Strategy and Investment Plan (JSRSIP II) 2011-14 which complements the Government of Sierra Leone's draft 'Agenda for Prosperity'. The project is also consistent with the United Nations Transitional Joint Vision for Sierra Leone Programme (2013-14) and UNDP's Strategic Plan 2008-2013 specifically on Rule of Law and Access to Justice.

In the period preceding the 11 year civil war, Sierra Leonean society was characterized by a dysfunctional judicial system, wherein most Sierra Leoneans, particularly those residing in the provinces, had limited access to justice. Weak rule of law institutions, a perception of a lack of independence of the judiciary, and unpunished human rights violations resulted in poor overall governance, and was identified as one of the root causes of the hostilities. Despite many positive achievements in developing a stronger justice system, post-conflict Sierra Leone continues to be characterized by a weak formal justice system and a strong reliance by many Sierra Leoneans in traditional justice mechanisms. In addition, the lack of infrastructure and the difficulty in both access and awareness further hampers the administration of justice by the formal system.

UNDP, through its Access to Justice Project, has adopted a two pronged approach in seeking to promote access to justice. On the one side UNDP is seeking to develop the capacity of state institutions such as the Police, Prosecutors and the Judiciary to provide quality services to Sierra Leoneans and in parallel supports civil society to improve their capacity to provide services to victims of SGBV, to enhance paralegal assistance at local court level, to increase public legal awareness and promote increased demand from the public for a functioning justice system. Creating stronger linkages between state and civil society is a key part of this approach. Recognising that the continued widespread violation of women's rights through SGBV and lack of gender equality with regard to women's rights to property are fundamental human rights issues in Sierra Leone UNDP has placed the prevention of SGBV and the promotion of women's property rights as priorities of the project.

In 2013 UNDP will build on previous project achievements by scaling up promising practices that have achieved a high impact as well as expanding into areas based on clearly evidenced needs. The project will focus on building justice capacity in functional areas having a direct impact on the promotion and protection of gender equality and gender justice and also building capacity in core areas of the justice sector which are a pre-requisite for the promotion of gender justice. The project will therefore seek to enhance access to justice through increased application of human rights standards, effective implementation of relevant national legislation and adoption of gender-sensitive practices in both formal and customary justice systems in Sierra Leone.



## Narrative

The UNDP's Improving Access to Justice in Sierra Leone Project has been ongoing since 2009 and has the objective of contributing to Sierra Leone's peace consolidation agenda through supporting initiatives that focus on enhancing access to justice for vulnerable people, especially women and children. It seeks to foster an effective, responsive, accessible and fair justice system, promote the rule of law, including both formal and informal processes, with due consideration for the rights of the poor and in particular women.

The project's continued relevance has been determined by its alignment with national strategic frameworks including the Justice Sector Reform Strategy and Investment Plan (JSRSIP II) 2011-14 which complements the Government of Sierra Leone's draft 'Agenda for Prosperity'. The project is also consistent with the United Nations Transitional Joint Vision for Sierra Leone Programme (2013-14) and UNDP's Strategic Plan 2008-2013 specifically on Rule of Law and Access to Justice.

In the period preceding the 11 year civil war, Sierra Leonean society was characterized by a dysfunctional judicial system, wherein most Sierra Leoneans, particularly those residing in the provinces, had limited access to justice. Weak rule of law institutions, a perception of a lack of independence of the judiciary, and unpunished human rights violations resulted in poor overall governance, and was identified as one of the root causes of the hostilities. Despite many positive achievements in developing a stronger justice system, post-conflict Sierra Leone continues to be characterized by a weak formal justice system and a strong reliance by many Sierra Leoneans in traditional justice mechanisms. In addition, the lack of infrastructure and the difficulty in both access and awareness further hampers the administration of justice by the formal system.

UNDP, through its Access to Justice Project, has adopted a two pronged approach in seeking to promote access to justice. On the one side UNDP is seeking to develop the capacity of state institutions such as the Police, Prosecutors and the Judiciary to provide quality services to Sierra Leoneans and in parallel supports civil society to improve their capacity to provide services to victims of SGBV, to enhance paralegal assistance at local court level, to increase public legal awareness and promote increased demand from the public for a functioning justice system. Creating stronger linkages between state and civil society is a key part of this approach. Recognising that the continued widespread violation of women's rights through SGBV and lack of gender equality with regard to women's rights to property are fundamental human rights issues in Sierra Leone UNDP has placed the prevention of SGBV and the promotion of women's property rights as priorities of the project.

In 2013 UNDP will build on previous project achievements by scaling up promising practices that have achieved a high impact as well as expanding into areas based on clearly evidenced needs. The project will focus on building justice capacity in functional areas having a direct impact on the promotion and protection of gender equality and gender justice and also building capacity in core areas of the justice sector which are a pre-requisite for the promotion of gender justice. The project will therefore seek to enhance access to justice through increased application of human rights standards, effective implementation of relevant national legislation and adoption of gender-sensitive practices in both formal and customary justice systems in Sierra Leone.



## Narrative

The UNDP's Improving Access to Justice in Sierra Leone Project has been ongoing since 2009 and has the objective of contributing to Sierra Leone's peace consolidation agenda through supporting initiatives that focus on enhancing access to justice for vulnerable people, especially women and children. It seeks to foster an effective, responsive, accessible and fair justice system, promote the rule of law, including both formal and informal processes, with due consideration for the rights of the poor and in particular women.

The project's continued relevance has been determined by its alignment with national strategic frameworks including the Justice Sector Reform Strategy and Investment Plan (JSRSIP II) 2011-14 which complements the Government of Sierra Leone's draft 'Agenda for Prosperity'. The project is also consistent with the United Nations Transitional Joint Vision for Sierra Leone Programme (2013-14) and UNDP's Strategic Plan 2008-2013 specifically on Rule of Law and Access to Justice.

In the period preceding the 11 year civil war, Sierra Leonean society was characterized by a dysfunctional judicial system, wherein most Sierra Leoneans, particularly those residing in the provinces, had limited access to justice. Weak rule of law institutions, a perception of a lack of independence of the judiciary, and unpunished human rights violations resulted in poor overall governance, and was identified as one of the root causes of the hostilities. Despite many positive achievements in developing a stronger justice system, post-conflict Sierra Leone continues to be characterized by a weak formal justice system and a strong reliance by many Sierra Leoneans in traditional justice mechanisms. In addition, the lack of infrastructure and the difficulty in both access and awareness further hampers the administration of justice by the formal system.

UNDP, through its Access to Justice Project, has adopted a two pronged approach in seeking to promote access to justice. On the one side UNDP is seeking to develop the capacity of state institutions such as the Police, Prosecutors and the Judiciary to provide quality services to Sierra Leoneans and in parallel supports civil society to improve their capacity to provide services to victims of SGBV, to enhance paralegal assistance at local court level, to increase public legal awareness and promote increased demand from the public for a functioning justice system. Creating stronger linkages between state and civil society is a key part of this approach. Recognising that the continued widespread violation of women's rights through SGBV and lack of gender equality with regard to women's rights to property are fundamental human rights issues in Sierra Leone UNDP has placed the prevention of SGBV and the promotion of women's property rights as priorities of the project.

In 2013 UNDP will build on previous project achievements by scaling up promising practices that have achieved a high impact as well as expanding into areas based on clearly evidenced needs. The project will focus on building justice capacity in functional areas having a direct impact on the promotion and protection of gender equality and gender justice and also building capacity in core areas of the justice sector which are a pre-requisite for the promotion of gender justice. The project will therefore seek to enhance access to justice through increased application of human rights standards, effective implementation of relevant national legislation and adoption of gender-sensitive practices in both formal and customary justice systems in Sierra Leone.


