MICRO-CAPITAL GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE **UNITED NATIONS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME**(UNDP) AND ONE FAMILY PEOPLE FOR THE PROVISION OF GRANT FUNDS UNDER A UNDP-SUPPORTED PROJECT

This Agreement (hereinafter referred to as the "Agreement') is made between the UNDP Sierra Leone and One Family People.

WHEREAS One Family People (hereinafter referred to as "OFP") has been requested by the United Nations Development Programme ("UNDP") to manage the project defined in the project document "Closing the Gap in Ebola Crisis Response" with Project ID: 60863 (hereinafter referred to as "the Project"), implemented at the request of the Government of Sierra Leone

WHEREAS the UNDP desire to provide funding, in the form of a Micro-Capital Grant (hereinafter referred to as "the Grant") made to OFP (the "Recipient Institution") in the context of the Project, and on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS the Implementing Partner is ready and willing to accept such funds from the **UNDP** for the activities described in the following, and on the said terms and conditions;

NOW, therefore, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Responsibilities of OFP

- 1.1 OFP agrees to:
 - Undertake the activities described in its Workplan and Budget which are attached to this Agreement respectively as Attachment 1 and Attachment 4, or subsequent updates hereof to be approved by the UNDP of the Project;
 - Report to the UNDP on the utilization of the Grant in accordance with Article IV below.
 - 3. Provide Annual Audited Statements [Income Statement and Balance Sheets]. In projects where a technical contractor is providing assistance to the RECIPIENT INSTITUTION, the contractor shall be responsible for verifying the accuracy of these reports/statements. Funds provided pursuant to this Agreement shall be used for purposes related to producing results specified in its annual performance targets
- 1.2 OFP shall manage its operations in order to maximize its performance
- 1.3 OFP commits itself to reaching the performance targets set out in Attachment 2 to this Agreement. If the OFP fails to meet its responsibilities outlined in article 1.1, or to attain at least 70% of any one performance target for any given year, UNDP will have the right to suspend all or part of the micro-capital grant support to OFP. Upon request of UNDP, and for its consideration in determining the period of the extension, OFP shall be obligated to produce a written explanation detailing the reasons the target was missed, and measures taken by OFP to remedy the situation. The suspension shall remain in effect until UNDP is satisfied that OFP has achieved the target.

1.4 OFP shall inform UNDP about any problems it may face in attaining the objectives agreed upon, as soon as such problems are encountered.

II. <u>Duration</u>

2.1 This Agreement will come into effect on 20th September 2014 and shall expire on 31st December 2014, covering the anticipated term of the project. The Agreement may be extended beyond this period through an exchange of letters between the Parties, noting the new expiration date.

III. Payments

- thousand one hundred and one United States Dollars (217,939,350 SLL, two hundred and seventeen million, nine hundred and thirty nine thousand, three hundred and fifty Sierra Leone Leones) according to the schedule of the project budget set out in Attachment 1, with the equivalent of USD 36,211 (thirty six thousand two hundred and eleven US dollars) to be paid upon signature of this Agreement. The second tranche of the equivalent of USD 12,053 will be paid upon receipt and approval of OFP project narrative and financial reports by UNDP. The third tranche of the equivalent of USD 1,855 will only be disbursed after the receipt and approval of the final project narrative and financial reports by UNDP. Payments are subject to OFP meeting the outputs as specified in Attachment 2 below.
- 3.2 All payments shall be deposited into OFP's bank account (especially meant for UNDP Micro-Capital Grant) of which the details are as follows:

- 3.3 The amount of payment of such funds is not subject to any adjustment or revision due to changes in prices, exchange rates or the actual costs incurred by OFP in the performance of the activities under this Agreement.
- IV. Records, Information and Reports
- 4.1 OFP shall maintain clear, accurate and complete records in respect of the funds received under this Agreement.
- 4.2 OFP shall furnish, compile and make available at all times to UNDP any records or information, oral or written, which UNDP may reasonably request in respect of the funds received by OFP.
- 4.3 Within sixty days after completion of project activities, OFP shall provide UNDP with a final report with respect to all expenditures made from such funds (including salaries, travel and supplies) and indicating the progress made toward the goals of the activities undertaken, utilizing the reporting format contained in Annex I.
- 4.4 Provide quarterly reports to UNDP; and Provide Annual Audited Statements [Income Statement and Balance Sheet].

V. General Provisions

- 5.1 This Agreement and the Annexes attached hereto shall form the entire Agreement between UNDP and OFP, superseding the contents of any other negotiations and/or agreements between the Parties, whether oral or in writing, pertaining to the subject of this Agreement.
- efficiency. Subject to the express terms of this Agreement, it is understood that OFP shall have exclusive control over the administration and implementation of the activities referred to above in paragraph 1.1 and that UNDP shall not interfere in the exercise of such control. However, both the quality of work and the progress being made toward successfully achieving the goals of such activities shall be subject to review by UNDP. If at any time UNDP is not satisfied with the quality of work or the progress being made toward achieving such goals, UNDP may: (i) withhold payment of funds until in its opinion the situation has been corrected; or (ii) declare this Agreement terminated by written notice to OFP as described in paragraph 6.8 below; and/or seek any other remedy as may be necessary. UNDP's determination as to the quality of work being performed and the progress being made toward such goals shall be final and shall be binding and conclusive upon OFP insofar as further payments are concerned.
- 5.3 **OFP** and UNDP undertakes no responsibilities whatsoever in respect of life, health, accident, travel or any other insurance coverage for any person employed by OFP to undertake activities under this Agreement. Such responsibilities shall be borne by OFP.
- 5.4 The rights and obligations of OFP are limited to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Accordingly, OFP and personnel performing services on its behalf shall not be entitled to any benefit, payment, compensation or entitlement except as expressly provided in this Agreement.
- United Nations, UNDP, its officials, agents, servants and employees from and against all suits, claims, demands, and liability of any nature or kind, including their costs and expenses, arising out of acts or omissions of OFP, or its employees, officers, agents or sub-contractors, in the performance of this Memorandum of Understanding. This provision shall extend, inter alia, to claims and liability in the nature of workmen's compensation, products liability and liability arising out of the use of patented inventions or devices, copyrighted material or other intellectual property by OFP, its employees, officers, agents, servants or sub-contractors. The obligations under this provision do not lapse upon termination of this Memorandum of Understanding.
- 5.6 Assets (Credit Funds and Equipment) supplied by UNDP funds to OFP shall be the property of UNDP until the end of the project, at which time UNDP shall determine the best use of these assets, in accordance with its Financial Regulations and Rules. The assets shall be used for the purpose indicated in the Workplan throughout the period of this Agreement.

- 5.7 This Agreement may be terminated at any time by either Party giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other Party. Upon termination of the Agreement, OFP shall promptly return any unutilized funds to UNDP as per paragraph 6.6 above.
- 5.8 No modification of or change to this Agreement, waiver of any of its provisions or additional contractual provisions shall be valid or enforceable unless previously approved in writing by the parties to this Agreement or their duly authorized representatives in the form of an amendment to this Agreement duly signed by the parties hereto.
- 5.9 Any controversy or claim arising out of, or in accordance with this Agreement or any breach thereof, shall unless it is settled by direct negotiation, be settled in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules as at present in force. Where, in the course of such direct negotiation referred to above, the parties wish to seek an amicable settlement of such dispute, controversy or claim by conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules as at present in force.

The parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such controversy or claim.

5.10 Nothing in or relating to this Agreement shall be deemed a waiver of any privileges and immunities of the United Nations, or UNDP.

### Background

UNDP Sierra Leone is currently concentrating all of its efforts to assist in combatting issues arising as a result of the Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) crisis in the country. One area that UNDP is focusing on is ensuring assistance, sensitization and preventative equipment are being directed at vulnerable populations, including Persons With Disabilities (PWDs). It has been noted by UNDP, through participation in various EVD-response coordination groups, that PWDs are being marginalized and neglected in the majority of government and other partner interventions.

In order to fill this significant gap and to prevent outbreaks of EVD in disabled homes and communities around the country, UNDP is proposing to partner with a far-reaching and experienced disability-focused NGO, One Family People (OFP).

## Purpose of proposed contract with OFP

The contract with OFP will enable UNDP to reach PWDs, who are currently one of the most marginalized and neglected sections of Sierra Leonean society in the context of the EVD crisis. Through OFP, 45 disabled homes will have the facilities to prevent outbreak of EVD and to protect the rights of residents during the crisis. This is extremely important especially due to the fact that the majority of PWDs in Sierra Leone rely on begging for their income, which is no longer feasible during the crisis as a result of restrictions on movement and also the general economic hardships that are affecting the majority of the population. OFP will ensure that PWDs are engaged in the fight against Ebola and that they can also play their part, through training volunteers to sensitize other PWD communities and their caregivers and through involving PWDs in various outreach activities on EVD such as radio programming, drama performances, jingles and music. OFP will also ensure that PWD-friendly versions of factsheets and various forms of information disseminated to the public will be made available to disabled homes and communities.

OFP will be contracted through a Micro Capital Grant at a total cost of \$50,101 USD.

### Justification for partnering with OFP:

 Identified as an extremely relevant intervention: Through discussions with other partners and participation in various EVD task forces and Committees, it has become clear that the activities proposed by OFP for the direct benefit of PWDs and their caregivers are unique to the Ebolaresponse thus far.

- Relevant Expertise and Significant Synergetic Value Added: OFP is a key strategic partner of Government institutions working on disability including the Ministry of Social Welfare, Gender and Children's Affairs, the National Commission on Persons with Disabilities, the Human Rights Commission of Sierra Leone and the Sierra Leone Union of Disability Issues. OFP have six years of experience working to empower PWDs in Sierra Leone through innovative use of sports, drama and music. OFP also advocates at a policy level for the respect of rights of PWDs using the UPR platform. OFP has an existing network of grassroots organizations that can reach PWDs in the remotest parts of the country and that already have established links and relationships of mutual trust with disabled homes and communities.
- Accountability and Transparency: OFP is a reputable NGO legally registered in Sierra Leone and funded by the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the European Union and Plan International amongst others. UNDP has received OFP's most recent audit report in order to ensure financial capacity. UNDP will be working closely with OFP until the end of December in order to help monitor the success of activities. Regular feedback from direct beneficiaries will also be sought, as well as narrative and financial reporting upon the completion of the project.
- Value for Money: OFP has already done extensive groundwork to avoid what would have been initial costs incurred under the proposed project; OFP has identified disabled homes that are in most need of assistance, as well as organizations (including Heal Salone) that can share some of the cost (funded separately from the UNDP proposed contract) in order to avoid any duplication. In addition, due to the current State of Emergency and crisis situation as a result of EVD, UNDP proposes OFP as a partner that represents excellent value for money seeing as they already have the networks and contacts in place to react quickly to prevent outbreaks of Ebola amongst PWDs.

### 1. MCG Committee Meeting to Discuss OFP Budget and Proposal, 8 September 2014, 3pm at the UNDP Conference Room

2. Objective: To discuss the potential awarding of a Micro Capital Grant to One Family People (OFP) for their Project entitled: Closing the Gap in Ebola Crisis Response

### 3. Summary:

OFP Project Proposal

Orla provided a brief overview of OFP's proposed intervention, which aims to prevent outbreaks of Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) amongst Persons With Disabilities (PWDs) in Sierra Leone through sensitization and the provision of preventative equipment to PWD homes/communities. In general the Committee was pleased with the proposal but several action points were identified:

- A Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) system needs to be in place but this does not have to be part of the proposal narrative. Orla can help OFP set this up in the coming two weeks.
- Partner Organizations that OFP will employ to reach the PWDs at grassroots levels should be identified specifically but again, this is something that can be included in the M&E plan. Budget
- OFP has already met with Heal Salone, another local CSO that is covering 10 of the PWD homes originally identified. OFP should ensure continuous coordination with Heal Salone and Handicap International
- OFP should communicate back to UNDP when they are carrying out different activities so that we can monitor implementation but also to ensure UNDP visibility is emphasised (for example via OFP's media

### Project Budget

OFP already reduced the budget significantly after initial discussions with UNDP. They had included a section on the provision of food supplies to PWD homes but this has been taken out in order for UNDP to look into other options.

The Committee recommended further reduction of the budget, especially given the project timeframe (only three months). The new proposed budget is approximately 50,000USD (to be finalised after a discussion with OFP).

Several action points on the budget are as follows:

- UNDP will work closely with OFP to monitor the nutrition situation in PWD homes
- UNDP will look into whether World Food Programme (WFP) or Handicap International can support the provision of food if/where necessary
- UNDP will look into whether WFP has the PWD homes on their feeding programme
- Transport can be reduced significantly to three monitoring visits from staff in Freetown and we will confirm internally with UNDP transport for costs after verifying specific locations of PWD homes to be reached
- New budget needs to be agreed with OFP

### Note to File (NTF)

It is clear that OFP is well-positioned to carry out this intervention and that the intervention responds to a significant gap in current efforts.

Action points/comments on the NTF are as follows:

- OFP's Annual Report for 2013 is of good quality and contains financial statements however we will need a copy of their most recent audits
- The report documents similar activities demonstrating the capacity of OFP

Once several of the above action points are implemented – mainly those referring to OFP's budget – and the past audits of OFP are approved, the MCG Committee will be satisfied that this intervention can go ahead.
