Brief Description

Through means of training, education, exchange and networking, the project aims at capacity building of local leaders from different sectors in 2 multi-ethnic, poverty-stricken regions of Serbia (southern Serbia region and the Banat region in northern Serbia) for effectively utilizing the EU integration process so that it contributes to local development and social inclusion. It seeks to improve the understanding of the integration processes and the benefits of accession for the local communities, addresses local problems and development priorities, makes correlation with relevant EU policies and builds local capacities in various areas. The project fosters principles of good governance and cooperation between different sectors. It works toward increasing knowledge, self-esteem and visibility of the outstanding local leaders in public administration, business, media, and civil society.

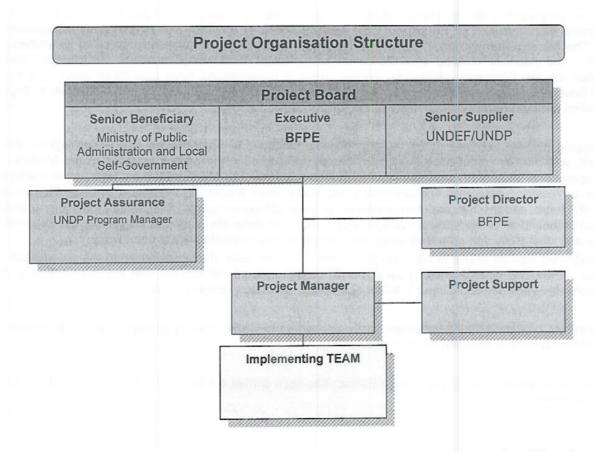
II. MANAGEMENT ARRANGEMENTS

The project will be implemented using the NGO execution modality by the Belgrade Fund for Political Excellence (BFPE) and the functions of the Project Director (PD) will be performed by the President of the BFPE. The PD is responsible for overall coordination and assumes the primary responsibility for all aspects of the project. The PD shall assume this project responsibility in the normal course of official duties and shall not be remunerated separately for this undertaking.

As an Implementing Agency, BFPE assumes overall management of the project and is responsible for the attainment of project objectives, including such tasks as the planning of project activities, the supervision of project implementation and financial accountability; the assessment of progress and technical quality; reporting to UNDP and UNDEF; and participation in monitoring and evaluation.

UNDP CO Serbia will bear all financial, monitoring, evaluation and reporting responsibilities to the UN Democracy Fund. UNDP CO will receive the grant in two instalments and disburse funds through quarterly advances to BFPE, which will report and justify expenditures.

UNDP CO Serbia will provide BFPE with all the support necessary for smooth implementation of activities; all relevant documents on UNDP rules and procedures and ensure financial and substantive oversight of the project.



The **Project Board** is the group responsible for making by consensus management decisions for a project when guidance is required by the Project Manager, including recommendation for approval of project plans and revisions. Project Board decisions should be made in accordance to standards¹ that shall ensure best

Project reviews by this group are made at designated decision points during the running of a project, or as necessary when raised by the Project Manager. This group is consulted by the Project Manager for decisions when tolerances (normally in terms of time and budget) have been exceeded. It ensures that required resources are committed and arbitrates on any conflicts within the project or negotiates a solution to any problems between the project and external bodies.

Project Assurance is the responsibility of each Project Board member, however the role can be delegated. The Project Assurance role supports the Project Board by carrying out objective and independent project oversight and monitoring functions. This role ensures appropriate project management milestones are managed and completed.

The **Project Manager** has the authority to run the project on a day-to-day basis on behalf of the Project Board within the constraints aid down by the Board. The Project Manager is responsible for day-to-day management and decision-making for the project. The Project Manager's prime responsibility is to ensure that the project produces the results specified in the project document, to the required standard of quality and within the specified constraints of time and cost.

The **Project Support** role provides project administration, management and technical support to the Project Manager and Implementation Team as required by the needs of the individual project or Project Manager.

A ToR for the Project Manager will be developed during the Running of the Project Phase as well as for members of the Implementing Team.

During the preparations of the project proposal, the Minister of Public Administration and Local Self-Government was consulted on the project goal, general scope of activities and sustainability of expected results. The Ministry granted initial support to the proposal, since it corresponds to some of its strategic priorities – the capacity building of professional and efficient local self-government officials and their preparation for the European integration process. Several consultations have also taken place with the Serbian Government Coordination Body for the Municipalities of Presevo, Bujanovac and Medvedja, to align the activities in South Serbia with priorities of this Office.

In developing detailed curricula of the capacity-building seminars in South Serbia and Banat regions, the BFPE will seek further consultative input from the Ministry, to align the project activities to the Ministry's annual operational plans and ongoing initiatives in these regions. The Ministry staff will take part in training sessions as expert lecturers on relevant topics, especially when discussing the issues of decentralization issues, IPA funds and the role and responsibilities of local self-governments. Also, Ministry will play a vital role in co-organisation of the closing event for every region in Belgrade, aimed at presenting development priorities and local plans and proposals to the national public and interested donor community.

The Ministry will provide essential institutional support to project goals, thus contributing to the sustainability of results. At the end of each training cycle, the BFPE will present the Ministry with the key findings and conclusions and seek additional input in terms of institutionalization of project results.

All deliverables produced during the project term, will adhere to UNDP visibility standards as per the Project Cooperation Agreement attached as Annex IV.

A capacity assessment of the Implementing Partner has been carried out and is attached as Annex III of this Project Document.

III. MONITORING FRAMEWORK AND EVALUATION

The Implementing Agency/BFPE will prepare annual and quarterly work plans for the UNDP CO clearance. Based on approved work plans, UNDP will disburse funds through quarterly advance payments. The Implementing Agency must submit financial reports to the UNDP CO within 15 days after the end of each quarter, along with a short narrative explaining the utilization of the funds and realization of the quarterly work plan.

The Implementing Agency is required to establish and maintain a separate bank account for the receipt and disbursement of project funds.

Review meetings (Project Board meetings) will be held to discuss the progress of the project every six months from the start of the project.

The Implementing Agency/BFPE will submit a draft Mid-Term Progress Report and the Final Narrative Report to UNDP CO Serbia, according to the timeline specified by UNDEF. UNDP CO Serbia will then be responsible for the submission of all project reporting to UNDEF. All reports must be in English, the official working language of the UNDP CO Serbia.

According to UNDP procedures for NGO Execution, the project may be subject to annual financial and performance audit.

UNDP CO will be responsible for project monitoring and evaluation in accordance with UNDP regulations. UNDEF may commission a third party evaluation that may be needed for comparative or thematic evaluation.

In addition, the BFPE will conduct an ongoing qualitative evaluation of the program, in order to best follow the achievement of the desired objectives. The main form of external evaluation for the program will be the information obtained from the direct beneficiaries of the program. Each activity will conclude with an approximately one-hour evaluation session, during which participants fill out anonymous questionnaires assessing various aspects of the activity, followed by a discussion with the project team and oral commentary of the activity. In addition, the BFPE also expects to receive feedback from the parties/organizations/institutions the participants belong to, evaluating the perceived contribution of the program to their work. Lecturers and workshop facilitators will also invited to share their views of the activities and contribute their suggestions on how they could be improved.

Internally, the BFPE holds regular staff meetings to analyze the results of the external evaluations and assess the effectiveness of the program. The time between the implementation of each consecutive activity is sufficient to make modifications in the curriculum and smaller adjustments to program design (e.g. planning to have more/less time for discussion after lectures, changing the design of workshops), while the overall methodology will be thoroughly examined at the end of the year. The annual work plan for the following year will be adjusted according to the results of this examination.

Since the project will be a continuation of the same program commencing in Sandzak earlier in the year (preparation activities are already underway), additional inputs will be provided prior to the start of project implementation, allowing smaller modifications in program design.

Annex II: Overview of other ongoing projects in the region and sustainability of project results.

UNDP projects in the regions:

Joint Programme on Youth, Employment and Migration (April 2009 – October 2010) covers the regions of Pcinjski (Vranje and surrounding area), South Backa and Belgrade. It will begin next month and include:

- active labour market measures for vulnerable youth
- support for youth offices
- integration of social welfare and employment service delivery
- NGO advocacy for inclusion of youth employment & migration issues into national policies
- from the other agencies (IOM, ILO, UNICEF): lots of research, data collection, M&E capacity building at central level

Strengthening Rural Social Capital and Networks (March 2008 – December 2009) covers Alibunar, Zitiste, Coka, Mali Idjos and Irig. The project focuses on promoting the LEADER participatory approach for rural development planning, as well as creation of Local Action Groups.

In South Serbia we have two projects in the hard pipeline. Both projects are going to be managed through one joint management structure and are heavily interlinked and compatible so they could be considered basically as one larger action. Both projects will cover Jablanicki and Pcinjski district (all 13 municipalities) and are joint UN projects (UNDP, UNICEF, ILO, HABITAT, UNHCR, IOM) where UNDP is the Lead agency and they should start in parallel over the next three to four months.

Building Capacity for Inclusive Development in South Serbia - UNDP, UNICEF, ILO Multi-donor: Sweden, Norway, Swiss and UNDP

1. Communities in South Serbia are stronger, more integrated, and better able to reduce inter-ethnic tensions and conflict risk

- Strengthened inter-ethnic understanding and collaboration among adolescents and young people

The Capacity Development for the Standing Conference of Towns and Municipalities – II Phase project has two components:

- 1. Support to CD of SCTM Secretariat (organizational re-structuring, CD for Secretariat staff, support to Secretariat in development of services to it's members, and development of lobbying capacity)
- 2. Support to SCTM Training centre in developing methodology for capacity assessment and capacity development of the secretariat / The capacity assessment is currently being conducted in 8 pilot municipalities. This exercise will be consequently followed by CD actions (based on CA) in above mentioned municipalities.

The activities under the project will end in June 2009.

Summary with ongoing projects of other partners:

The region of South Serbia has received considerable attention of government institutions, international organisations and development agencies in the previous period. Following democratic transition in 2000, one of the first actors was USAID/CRDA supported CHF International. Their six year programme (2001-2007) was aimed at fostering advocacy, economic development and stability in South Serbia, in co-operation with local communities and selfgovernments. The OSCE has been another major international actor in this area, focusing on security issues, most notably through efforts to establish and maintain the multi-ethnic police force. Since December 2005 the consortium of strategic partners of EAR, UNDP, SIDA, the Norwegian Government. ADA and the Government of the Republic of Serbia funded the second phase of the Municipal Improvement and Revival Programme in South Serbia (MIR 2). The programme focused in improvement of regional co-operation, municipal strategic planning, improved municipal management and access to administrative services. The accomplishments of this three-year programme have been considerable, yet the remaining challenges include low levels of social cohesion and human capital, poor economic prospects and high unemployment rate, migration from the region. More recently, the USAID supported MEGA (Municipal Economic Growth Activity) Programme included several municipalities from designated areas into its activities - Vranje (phase 1), Vrsac, Pancevo (phase 3), while there was a specific South Serbia Initiative formed for

three municipalities of Bujanovac, Presevo and Medvedja. Standing Conference of Towns and Municipalities, in co-operation with a number of international partners, has been active in providing technical training and resources for municipalities in South Serbia and Banat. In addition to their ongoing multi-year project aimed at strengthening capacities of municipal administration and improvement of services for citizens, the latest initiative concerning municipalities in South Serbia and Banat represents the second phase of project focused on support to local communities for social inclusion and development of social services. This initiative will be carried out in 18 least developed municipalities in Serbia, including two also participating in this project. Local self-governments in South Serbia have also provided their share in improving strategic planning on communities' priorities. Development Office of Bujanovac and Presevo was established in July 2007.

The project Strengthening Democratic Governance at the Local Level for EU Integration provides additional resource in this ongoing process of building capacities for better economic prospects and local development. It starts at a moment when a number of "hardware" programmes, providing resources for building infrastructure and improvement of local services, are phasing out. Its "software" focus on building human capital in the regions of South Serbia and Banat in the process of EU integration, as well as working with representatives of different sectors responds to the needs of local actors, also expressed in a number of strategic municipalities documents and plans.

The Sustainability of Project Results

The overall programme Strengthening Democratic Governance at the Local Level for EU Integration will take place in all of Serbia for at least 5 years. The duration of the programme provides an element of sustainability, since the participants will have the opportunity to implement the acquired knowledge and simultaneously take part in additional activities, exchanging experiences with their peers from other parts of Serbia through study visits and joint meetings. The network created among project participants represents a starting ground for improved cross-sectoral co-operation and joint initiatives in local communities.

Each phase of the programe will be completed through a presentation meeting in Belgrade, organised in co-operation with the Ministry. Representatives of local communities will have a chance to discuss their situation, strategic development priorities and local initiatives projects with government representatives and international donors, thus contributing to the sustainability of project results.

The project corresponds to proclaimed programme goals and needs of the Ministry of Public Administration and Local Self-Government in the period 2008-2010. More precisely, it closely relates to the third programme goal of the Ministry (*Building Professional and Efficient Local Self-Government*), i.e. to *building capacities of local self-government for responsibilities in the EU integration process*. Institutional support to the project, provided by the Ministry, represents the first step in seeking modalities for sustainable solutions. Long-term impact of building human capital in local communities, both local self-government and representatives of other sectors, will surely have a positive impact on this process.

The activities in South Serbia will be consulted and closely co-ordinated with the Coordination Centre of Presevo, Bujanovac and Medvedja, to secure synergy of our efforts in this region.
