### **Annex 4. Budget and Work Plan**

## **4.1 Budget per UNSDG categories**

The overall cost of the programme is **USD \$870,000** of which **USD \$662,000** is requested from the joint SDG Fund and USD **\$208,000** is PUNO's contribution. This contribution amount complements the activities, as well as technical assistance to ensure adequate implementation of the activities. Contribution from the Joint SDG Fund is distributed between the four PUNOs: **UNEP \$200,000**, **UNDP \$162,000**, **FAO \$200,000**, and **UNFPA \$100,000**.

PUNO's will also contribute in terms of co-financing through their parallel on-going programming (in the areas of Climate Change, integrated approach to water management using innovative solutions and promoting financing mechanisms, Biodiversity Conservation and REDD+).

66% (\$438,477) of the budget corresponds to Year 1 and 34% (\$223,523) of the budget corresponds to Year 2.

#### 4.2 Budget per SDG targets

The joint programme contributes directly to the acceleration of Sustainable Development Goals - 5 Gender Equality, 11 Sustainable Cities and Communities, 13 Climate Action, 15 Life on Land, and 17 Partnership for the Goals. From the total budget of \$872,229, 30% (\$261,000) is allocated towards SDG 5, 12% (\$104,400) is allocated towards SDG 11, 14% (\$121,800) is allocated towards SDG 13, 14% (\$121,800) is allocated to SDG 15, and 30% (\$261,000) is allocated towards SDG 17. The lion share of the budget is allocated to gender-focused and partnership-focused Goals and reflects the importance that is attached to ensuring gender responsiveness in the work we do as well as the need for partnerships in mobilizing support and resources for implementing the Sustainable Development Goals in Suriname.

#### **Annex 5. Risk Management Plan**

Continued commitment of the government and other partners to strengthen capacities, reflected in corresponding fiscal policies and related reforms, is essential for not only successfully implementing the Joint Programme, but also sustaining results for a sustainable financial framework. The risk of lacking resources (or their allocation) will be mitigated by working and coordinating closely with governments and relevant partners beyond the already organized consultations and alignment with national strategies and priorities, as well as by supporting ongoing budget analysis and fiscal space to ensure efficient allocation and use of available resources.

The Joint Programme assumes that development partners will support the programme and its integration within existing and forthcoming initiatives and investments in the country. Associated with this are potential institutional risks in terms of accountability and governance. The partners aim to mitigate these risks by ensuring an effective, multi-sectoral coordination mechanism, including monitoring and reporting on planned results and complementary activities, and building on the UNCT mechanism to address bottlenecks and barriers to implementation in the broader partner context.
