**Project Title:** **Support to the Government of Timor-Leste in responding to COVID-19**

**Expected UNDAF/CP Outcome(s):** By 2019, state institutions are more responsive, inclusive, accountable and decentralized for improved service delivery and realization of rights, particularly of the most excluded groups. Capacities and system of sub-national institutions developed to provided more efficient, accountable and accessible service to citizens, particularly for the rural poor and other disadvantaged.

**Brief Description**

Timor-Leste already faces multitude of immediate challenges including weak health system, political instability and economic vulnerability which could be exacerbated by the COVID-19. Thus, this project is to support the Republic of Timor-Leste to prepare for, respond to and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, with a particular focus on the most vulnerable groups.

Through the project's support, the Parliament will continue its critical role during the crisis. The project will also support both national and municipal authorities with the procurement of PPE/sanitization materials as well as awareness campaigns on COVID-19 through various channels. It will also support the Government in the procurement of essential health supplies, medicines and equipment for COVID-19. Lastly, local farmers, women, marginalized communities, and SMEs, will be supported for greater economic opportunity.

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## I. PURPOSE AND EXPECTED OUTPUT

The Project is to support the Republic of Timor-Leste to have better preparedness, response and business continuity under the current emergency situation created by COVID-19. Timor-Leste, as a small island developing state (SIDS) and the least developed state (LDC) is highly vulnerable to the impact of COVID-19. Although there's only one confirmed case of COVID-19 so far, given that testing capabilities in Timor-Leste are limited (all tests are flown to Darwin, Australia, thus making the tests prohibitively expensive), there is a high chance that this number does represent the country's actual situation.

The country faces a multitude of immediate challenges such as a) border closure directly impacting the import of essential food, consumables, medicines and equipment; b) weak health systems are already overburdened with very high incidence of TB (1 in 4 individuals), wasting (especially among children), dengue, and other tropical diseases; c) as Asia's youngest nation, the governance structures have not yet matured to effectively respond to crises and risks; d) more than 60% of the country is facing multi-dimensional poverty (lack of water and sanitation, widespread GBV, many HHs subsist on less than \$1 per week, cash-based subsistence economy, one of the last countries not digitized, etc).

In addition, the country's Petroleum Fund (with \$17.5 billion reserves for now), which finances the country's public expenditures, will be severely impacted by the economic downturn (the return on investments may fall by at least 60-70%). The country, furthermore, does not have an approved state budget for 2020 as the Parliament did not approve the state budget and is currently operating under a monthly budget system limiting public expenditure significantly and thereby curtailing economic opportunities for the population. While the Prime Minister submitted his resignation in late February after the state budget was not approved, the efforts to form a new coalition government has not materialized yet and the political impasse continues.

Against this background, UNDP, together with UNCT, under the overall guidance of RC, has developed the Initiation Plan for this project and the following are the expected outputs and associated activities:

### **Output 1. National and municipal capacities to respond and recover from COVID-19 are strengthened**

- 1.1. Production of public service announcements and other programmes to raise awareness on COVID-19 on TV, Radio and social medial platforms.
- 1.2. Community outreach for COVID-19 awareness campaign with community volunteer brigade and procurement of PPE for these volunteers and community health workers
- 1.3. Setting up hand washing facilities in the municipal public spaces
- 1.4. Support to the Parliament for its business continuity and communication with the public on COVID.

### **Output 2: Essential supplies, medicines and equipment procured for the GoTL's preparedness and response to COVID-19.**

- 2.1 Procurement of supplies, medicines, equipment as per the request from the Government of Timor-Leste
- 2.2 Transportation of supplies (if specialized charter flights or other additional arrangements are needed beyond the regular shipment methods)

### **Output 3: Local solutions developed, social monitoring increased, and capacities enhanced for COVID recovery.**

- 3.1. Circular' service innovation models and blueprint developed to deliver essential food and other services to 100+ most vulnerable households across 4-5 municipalities, with subsequent scaling up by the government, partners and private sector
- 3.2. Community/citizen sensing network launched for early detection of signals and changes in social cohesion, public health (COVID-tracing) and human rights protection (countering domestic violence against women/children/elderly)

3.3 Activity 3: Anticipatory/foresight governance and e-governance introduced to prepare the country's leadership for post COVID-world, and real-time support provided to the leadership at national and sub-national levels in identifying and responding to emerging trends/needs for current COVID response.

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## II. MANAGEMENT ARRANGEMENTS

This project will be implemented directly by UNDP. The funding will be implemented by UNDP through existing projects in the Governance and Sustainable Development thematic units and the Accelerator Lab, and will mostly use existing human resources, capacities and networks. The socio-economic impact assessment will be closely coordinated with WB, FAO, WFP, UNICEF, UNFPA, UN Women and the relevant units in the government.

For output 1, on the government side, besides the Parliament, the main coordinating ministry will be the Ministry of State Administration (MSA) and local municipal authorities. Other partners include Media (community radios, TV, press council), community youth volunteers and community organizations (women's groups, youth groups and people with disability groups). The Ministry of Foreign Affairs will be the primary partner for Output 2 on procurement services that will be implemented in close coordination with the Ministry of Health.

The private sector- SMEs and community groups of women, people with disability, LGBT who will be engaged in locally producing some of the goods and materials will be the main partners for the implementation of output 3. The UNCT's Multi-sectoral response efforts are divided into several teams, including the team on Socio-Economic Recovery, which is co-led by UNDP and ILO. The project will contribute to the design and development of multi-sectoral coordination approaches for economic recovery.

A project board will be formed comprising of key partners for this project for the overall governance and oversight.

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## III. MONITORING<sup>1</sup>

As the activities will be managed and implemented through existing UNDP projects, this project will also rely on the existing monitoring and evaluation systems of each project team. Each project team will develop additional monitoring tools and gather data on a regular basis to evaluate the project's progress against targets. The monitoring practices will help identify and manage any risks and also capture good practices and lessons as well as beneficiaries' stories. Per UNDP's practice, the project progress will be reported annually using a standardized template. The CO team conducts the quality assurance of the project results, which are then published in UNDP's transparency portal.
