UGANDA	integrating catchment management in conservation  He appealed to participants to make an honest opinion of the progress on the project since this would determine the future direction  Key objective of the meeting was to consider the no-cost extension given that there were delays in the commencement of the project.  Remarks by UNDP Country Representative  He commended the great work done by the Project Implementation Team as witnessed during the field visit which also provided opportunity to have a real feel of what is on ground and to know how to move forward.  He noted that the COBWEB Project is a pilot concept which will guide future actions  Cautioned that there is need to carefully and realistically manage the many expectations raised by the communities during the field visit  It is critical to examine the linkages between the stakeholders at all levels, from Central and Local Governments, as well as communities, to ensure these linkages are sustained.  UNDP aware that the project commenced two years later than the actual planned commencement. There is need to try and accelerate the process and thus the need for the no-cost extension to ensure sustainability.  Remarks from representative of the Consortium – Mr. Achilles Byaruhanga, ED Nature Uganda  Expressed gratitude for the progress made on the project and recommended that failure should also be considered positively since it will be basis for future adjustments  60% of all biodiversity worldwide is outside PAS including wetlands, therefore it is imperative we conserve these, both for biodiversity and as a vital resource for communities.  There is no option for the project but to work with communities since they are the key users and managers of wetland resources  He recommended the no cost extension should be considered to ensure that the project is sustained  Review of Project Implementation Manual  It was proposed that the PIM should be revised by 30th July 2011 and submitted to Board for endorsement by 15th August 2011. ## Annex I DECISIONS FROM THE BOARD

- PB1-1. Co-opt Ministry of Local Government, Directorate of Water Resources Management and Ministry of Gender as full Project Board members
- PB 1-2. Change name from Project Advisory Committee to Project Board, bearing in mind the Board is the decision making body.
- PB 1-3. Project Implementation Manual should be reviewed by 30<sup>th</sup> July 2011 and approved electronically by Board on 15<sup>th</sup> August 2011. NB: Changes to be made by Secretariat in consultation with UNDP
- PB 1-4. The Board welcomed the UNDP offer of half day training for Finance Officers of IUCN and Partner Institution in order to build capacity in planning, and financial reporting. The Secretariat was tasked to liaise with UNDP on conducting the training by July 30<sup>th</sup> 2011.
- PB 1-5. The Secretariat was advised to put an addendum to the annual report indicating contributions from partners like Office of the Prime Minister, District Local Governments and other stakeholders. Include the Government of Uganda Logo and list of participating institutions supporting and involved in the project on the cover page. The report should also present the fiscal performance.
- PB 1-6. The Board welcomed the offer of a vehicle by the UNDP Country Director to District Local Governments to support effective implementation of project work. The Board tasked the Consortium and the Environment Officer Isingiro District Local Government to carry out a survey on requirements for the vehicle by Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2011. MoU will be signed between DLGs and UNDP to ensure effective management of the vehicle.
- PB 1-7. The Board welcomed the IUCN plan of recruiting a Gender Specialist who will also provide technical support to the Project. It was also recommended that gender issues should be mainstreamed at all levels of the project.
- PB 1-8. The Project should involve other departments in the implementation of project activities to enhance participation. Key departments include Community Development and Water Department.
- PB 1-9. The Board recommended a No Cost Extension for one year and tasked the Secretariat to start procedures immediately in consultation with UNDP. The Sustainability Plan should also be prepared and included as part of the No Cost Extension.
- PB 1-10. Consortium should pro-actively engage with UNDP on the new projects in place and identify linkages. Consortium should organize a meeting by 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2011 to agree on key actions.
- PB 1-11. The Board agreed to hold the next meeting in October in Eastern Uganda at a date to be communicated after due consultations.
