1. Ms. MARIS WANYERA COMMISSIONER REPRESENTING THE PSST, MOFPED and gave opening remarks.

- 1.1. Apologized for the absence of PS MoFPED.
- 1.2. Went through the programme for the day
- 1.3. She explained that the design of UNDP programmes has been participatory involving all the stakeholders to effectively handle the issues pertaining to the country's development.
- 1.4. She clarified that the programmes to be reviewed are in alignment with the GoU priorities as in the NDP II with the main objective of achieving Uganda's Vision 2040
- 1.5. Appealed to the participants that the primary job is to review and agree and endorse the UNDP Programme

2. UNDP COUNTRY DIRECTOR OPENING REMARKS

- 2.1 Re-echoed that this process is a partnership which was started in April 1977
- 2.2 She mentioned that today is the last lap for final endorsement of the programme to take 5 years
- 2.3 Appreciated the stakeholders for their commitment to contribute to this programme.
- 2.4 Appealed to the participants to not only make friends but also partners who are going to take this governance portfolio programme for the next 5 years (2016 – 2020)

7. PLENARY DISCUSSION ON CODROL PROGRAMME

- 7.1 Chairperson gave guidance to stakeholders to review the activities, Responsible Partners and to see whether the programmes are in alignment to government priorities as in NDP II
- 7.2 Gideon Akangasira, Principal Planner Parliament of Uganda raised a concern that parliament was not represented in the presentation of the CODROL Programme.
- 7.3 He further noted that Parliament radio was captured as a game changer but has no result area.

- 7.4 IGG, Her Lordship Irene Mulyagonja – Commented on Game changer of overwhelming public demand for transparency and accountability and thought that e-systems will not cater for the marginalized groups. She however suggested that revamping Local Council Courts would be the suitable system which can tackle the access to justice to the rural poor and marginalized groups.
- 7.5 IGG continued to clarify that challenges of developing countries cannot be compared developed countries like Botswana and Mauritius because their population is very low compared to Uganda’s population which is increasing day by day. She further noted that even the dynamics in politics are different from those of Uganda. She therefore suggested that UNDP should compare Uganda to the countries that have the same issues of development.
- 7.6 The Executive Director of Uganda Youth Network appreciated the TOC which brings out a clear picture on the roadmap of the programme.
- 7.7 She however noted the need of bringing out the issues of Youth and PWDs clearly in the Programme
- 7.8 UNAIDS- Implored the members to take time and observe where the success and complications have been regarding the issues of Oil because of the management issues.
- 7.9 UNAIDS was very glad that issues of HIV/AIDS have been taken on board to increase the number of Ugandans to be put on treatment. He further informed members that the ARV treatment of 80% of Ugandans on treatment is paid by donors he therefore implored GoU to take on the responsibility of paying for the HIV/AIDS treatment.
- 7.10 UN OHCHR- Suggested that the CODROL Programme should consider supporting mechanisms like Promoting alternative Dispute resolutions
- 7.11 He further asked a question whether the programme could consider the use of Informal Justice Systems to cater for the unreached rural people who can’t access justice.
- 7.12 Mr. Richard Sewakiryanga Executive Director Uganda NGO Forum- He raised a concern of how the programme could address the problem of selected laws that are not well applied to the people, causing the abuse of Human Rights by law enforcers e.g POMA. He suggested one way which is through Civic education.
- 7.13 He further commented on Social Engagement and cautioned the programme team to watch out not to have platforms that are developed to serve the project. Mr.Sewakiryanga therefore suggested that UNDP needs to work more with the existing CSOs to develop lasting solutions in regards to Social engagement rather than creating new platforms. Work with the existing ones instead of creating new platforms.

7.14 Moses Mukhooli Head of Department Diaspora at MoFA suggested that the CODROL Programme should consider including Diaspora issues in regards to access to Justice and Human Rights violation while abroad.

8. PRESENTERS GIVE FEEDBACK TO COMMENTS:

- 8.1 Mr. Dison Okumu, Director Corporate planning and policy at Parliament assured the participants that Parliament is fully captured in the main document.
- 8.2 Participants were also advised that UNDP will not do everything, but they are giving a ground level for GoU to take on forward.
- 8.3 Regarding the question on choosing already developed countries as Uganda's SSC, the team leader Governance clarified that there things that Uganda can learn from the Developed countries to benefit the country. There are certain things that Uganda can learn from Botswana and Mauritius
- 8.4 There is an action point on the Local Council courts in the main document. There is also ongoing programme for Local Council Courts.
- 8.5 The programme is also looking at informal systems
- 8.6 The issues of Marginalized groups have been clearly mentioned in the main document. Issues of youth and PWDs have all been tackled.
- 8.7 The Issue of Oil being a curse, capacity building of institutions will be key in making sure that Oil is a blessing
- 8.8 The current platforms are not consistent and therefore the new platform is key
- 8.9 The Programme will identify the current platform and build on the social engagement
- 8.10 Rule by Law- the emphasis on separation of powers is an entry point to go back to rule of law instead of rule by law.
- 8.11 SSC will be broadened on the scope include Brazil and South Korea
- 8.12 The Chairperson informed participants that applicable issues raised in the plenary discussion will be included in the main document by the Programme teams and the next step was for the stakeholders to endorse the CODROL Programme.
- 8.13 *The Chairperson asked the participants whether they agree to endorse the programme and in unison they all agreed to endorse CODROL Programme.*

11. PLENARY DISCUSSIONS

- 11.1 Ambassador .Hatega – Northern Corridor is critical for capacity building and therefore calls for continued support for four countries, Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania and Rwanda. E.g Telecom Roaming charges have been minimized.
- 11.2 Peace and Security is critical and Northern Corridor Project has achieved some mile stones like Uganda, Kenya and Rwanda have signed a Peace Pact and Security Pact.
- 11.3 Region imports and Exports, Uganda is a land locked country and containers used to take 18 days to arrive in Uganda from Mombasa but since July, it now takes only 4 days to Uganda from Mombasa.
- 11.4 NPA Dhizaala Moses – IE Programme there is need to harmonize policies is it possible to align the harmonization of polices
- 11.5 The issue of strengthening mechanisms for implementing policies. And this goes also on the mechanisms of the budget.
- 11.6 Executive Director.NGO Forum – Evaluations should not be done by the institutions that are implementing the programme (Not IPs) to avoid biases, it should rather be done an independent institution.
- 11.7 Expand the work on integrity, e.g make a clear policy around integrity
- 11.8 Output 3 of IE belongs to COPASS Programme
- 11.9 IGG - Integrity – the leadership code Act is already there to help with issues of integrity.
- 11.10 She therefore recons that education on ethics and integrity needs to be factored in the programme.
- 11.11 The issue of enumeration and welfare of civil servants feed into corruption therefore calls on UNDP to consider it in the programme

12. FEEDBACK TO PARTICIPANTS

- 12.1 Existing relevant policies- NPA has a role to play by looking at the ministerial policy papers to ensure that harmonization of policies is tackled.
- 12.2 OUTPUT 3 of IE fits in CODROL and COPASS programmes, therefore programme teams will consolidate the activities
- 12.3 The Chairperson informed participants that only applicable issues raised in the plenary discussion will be included in the main document by the Programme teams and the next step was for the stakeholders to endorse the IE and CoPASS Programmes.
- 12.4 *The Chairperson asked the participants whether they agree to endorse the programmes and in unison they all agreed to endorse SIE and CoPASS Programmes.*

13. PRESENTATION OF COMMUNICATION AND M&E BY POLLY MUGISHA (TEAM LEADER UNDP MSU/M&E SPECIALIST)

14. PLENARY DISCUSSION

- 14.1 There is need to develop detailed plans for each of the IP for effective delivery and reporting.
- 14.2 There is need to develop detailed plans of M&E for CSOs
- 14.3 UNDP was appreciated for incorporating M&E in programming
- 14.4 There is need for Capacity building on UNDP M&E and Communication strategy to all Implementing partners and Responsible parties.
- 14.5 There is a challenge of not having budgets for documenting project outcomes
- 14.6 Dhizaala Moses of NPA clarified to the participants that M&E by law is under NPA, OPM is the coordinating agency
- 14.7 Sewakiryanga – noted that knowledge management and communication as presented was not clear whether its for UNDP or for other implementing entities for all the programmes.
- 14.8 Dhizaala reckoned that alignment to NDP II of knowledge management is critical.
- 14.9 He further noted that 1% is very minimal for communication of the entire programme and suggested if more funds could be added to communication
- 14.10 M/s Asiimwe Angella from Center for Consitutional Governance (CCG) highlighted that the regional reports like the EAC report on governance, on corruption should also be used as baseline indicators.
- 14.11 Suggested strategies for enhancing knowledge management by the IPs & RPs especially documenting impact and overall support
- 14.12 There were gaps in collecting baseline data conducted by NPA to feed in to the NDP II which affects all programmes. NPA therefore suggested that UNDP could help to support baseline data collection.

15. PRESENTATION OF THE WAY FORWARD BY POLLY MUGISHA - UNDP

- 15.1 The Chairperson asked when the implementation process of the programmes will start.
- 15.2 Polly clarified that the programmes will start as soon as they have been signed by the executing agency which is MoFPED, UNDP and IPs.
- 15.3 NPA noted that in the pre-engagements during the programme design, UNDP will need to explore the possibility/feasibility of recruitment of resident UNDP Programme Officers for effectiveness at NPA and other MDAs that play key role in implementing the programmes.

- 15.4 Richard Musinguzi raised a question regarding the date of convening project board meetings
- 15.5 In response to the above concern, Polly informed members that the project board meetings will take place in the week of 28th of March to present the annual and quarterly work plans as well as firming up other management and administration modalities for the respective programmes.
- 15.6 The Chairperson informed members that by Law the minister of finance is mandatory to sign the programmes and not Permanent Secretaries.
- 15.7 Onesmus Muhwezi raised a concern on whether there is a framework in which CSOs are going to be assessed.
- 15.8 In response to the above concern, Polly informed members that CSOs will be selected through expression of interest and it will be dependent on whether the Programmes have been approved by MoFPED and IPs
- 15.9 Annet raised a concern to the Chairperson M/s Maris Wanyera whether UNDP can start the process of identifying the CSOs through calling for expression of interest even when the Programmes have not been signed.
- 15.10 In response to the above concern, the Chair clarified that some of the activities like selecting CSOs can start even before the programmes have been signed because the E-PAC members have already endorsed the programmes.

16. CLOSING REMARKS BY CHAIR – BY MARIS WANYERA

- 16.1 Appreciated the support of UNDP to GoU and hopes that the partnership will continue until when Uganda achieves Vision 2040
- 16.2 She anticipated that the IPs, RPs and MoFPED meet their respective responsibilities to deliver these programmes effectively in order to benefit the country.
- 16.3 She reckoned that accountability is very critical to avoid unlikely cases of misappropriation of funds
- 16.4 She advised ministries that the programmes should be incorporated in the respective Ministerial policies and be included in the ministerial budgetary frameworks to allow for co-funding where necessary and applicable depending on the availability of resources.
- 16.5 The chair appealed to participants to attend project review meetings and clarified that the new government is strict on accountability and therefore MDAs should take issues of timely accountability serious.

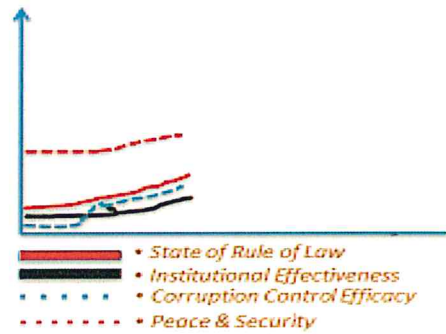
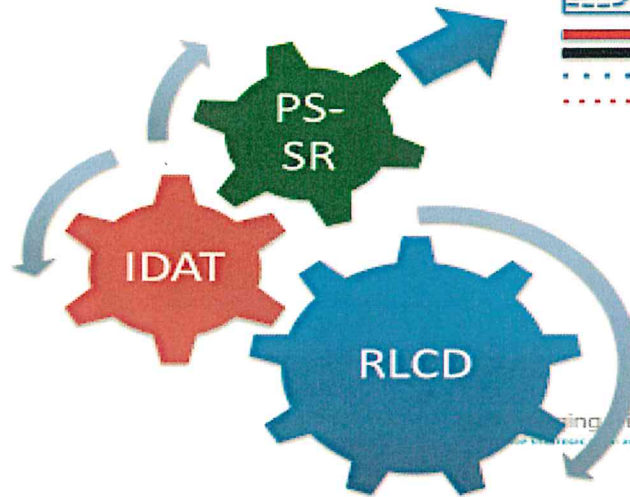
Hypothetical Governance Transformational Model for Uganda



Governance TD Hypothetical Model Based on Botswana & Mauritius' Experiences



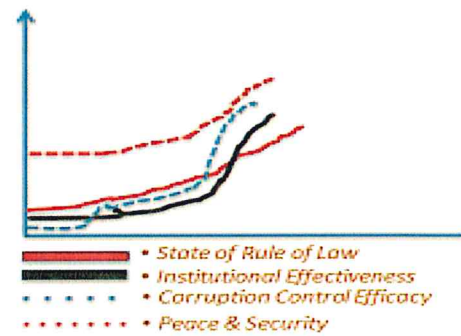
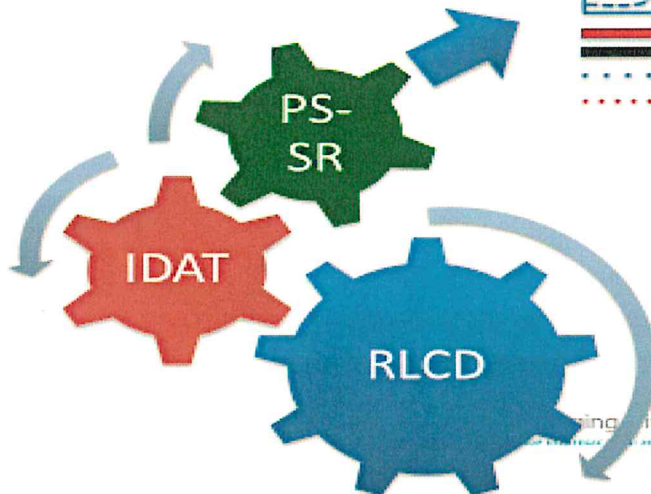
