Brief Description

This pilot represents UNV's first joint undertaking with UNRWA, in support to the Palestinian Refugees from Syria (PRS) who fled to Lebanon, as a result of the escalated fighting and aggressions between the Syrian warring parties in (2014-2015). The refugees summer community-based initiatives build on the historic breakthrough UNV achieved in 2015 jointly with UNRWA-Lebanon, that resulted with the deployment of a first batch of 103 national UN Volunteer PRS Teachers who enable the agency to absorb the additional case load of PRS students for the school year 2015-2016. While UNRWA traditionally supports summer-break activities, this partnership will allow for the first time to leverage more systematically community volunteering in delivering those activities as a means of empowerment of the refugee community.

The schools are mostly located in the South around Tyre and Saida, Bekaa, North, and in different areas throughout Beirut. Around 53 per cent of the Palestine Refugees in Lebanon (PRL) live in the 12 recognized Palestinian refugee camps. Some of the schools, are located inside refugee camps such as the 'Burj al Barajne Camp' in Beirut.

With UNV's responsive undertaking, UNRWA was able not only to absorb and accommodate PRS children enrolling at UNRWA schools in Lebanon, but also to provide teachers a more stable framework of engagement - differently from the previous daily assignments that benefitted the quality of their services and allowed for continuity of the education offer as well as the relationships with parents and pupils. Adjustments were made to the existing academic system to provide quality education to the children of both PRS and PRL. The rapid onboarding of 103 additional UN Volunteer teachers has allowed for an increased number of enrolled students and to provide supplementary services for these students. As a result, a total of 5,318 PRS children were registered in UNRWA schools for the (2015-2016) scholastic year. UN Volunteer teachers received induction trainings on volunteering, mentoring from education specialists, while a few were enrolled in diploma courses for teachers to improve their technical skills.

Building on this success, the present pilot is developed to complement the efforts made during the school year (2015-2016) and further leverage the volunteer nature of the teacheres' assignment, by reaching-out and involving the PRS in summer communitybased activities, focused mainly on women and youth. Community volunteers will be mobilized, trained along with the national PRS UN Volunteers on designing and implementing awareness sessions focused on: Hygiene, Health and Nutrition. Community volunteers will assist the UN Volunteer Teachers in their outreach efforts to become agents of change within their own communities.

The project will be implemented by UNV.

Backgroun

UNRWA is the critical life-line to Palestinian refugees from Syria arriving in Lebanon where they constitute one of the most vulnerable and marginalized population in the country (UNRWA-AUB Socio-Economic Survey, 2015). Approximately 41,500 Palestinian refugees from Syria (PRS) are currently registered with UNRWA-Lebanon. UNRWA strives to absorb the increasing numbers of PRS students enrolling in its schools in Lebanon, and has committed to ensure that all PRS children who register with UNRWA receive formal education and academic assistance (including textbooks and supplies) despite the financial challenges faced and limited school infrastructure. Today, the majority of 6-18 year-old PRS children, enrolled (87.45%), attend UNRWA schools

Rationale for UNV engagement:

UN Volunteers bring added value by leveraging the volunteerism nature of their assignments which generates stronger trust and confidence among volunteers themselves and communities, while providing an example on how voluntary engagement can become a form of self-empowerment also within vulnerable groups. They further support the delivery of basic services, develop local capacities based on active civic participation and nurture social cohesion and solidarity.

UNV mobilizes motivated individuals, particularly those directly affected by the crisis and who are willing to help their own people. UNV enables participation and promotes volunteerism, which is critical in uniting efforts to bring communities together - i.e. both refugee and host communities. Online volunteers will be mobilized in the development of the awareness raising session material and for documenting the experience of the pilot project.



Management Arrangements

The UNV Programme Advisory Board will serve as the Project Board and will be chaired by the DEC (Programme) and include as permanent members: Chief of Communications Section (CS), Chief of Development Programming Section (DPS), Chief of Finance Section (FS), Chief of Peace Programming Section (PPS), Chief of Partnerships Section (PS), Chief of Results Management Support Section (RMSS), and Chief of Volunteer Knowledge and Innovation Section (VKIS). The Programme Coordination Section (PCS) will serve as a Secretariat to the Project Board.



Project Board:

The Project Board is the group responsible for making by consensus management decisions for a project when guidance is required by the Project Manager, including approval of project plans and revisions. In order to ensure UNV's ultimate accountability, Project Board decisions should be made in accordance to standards² that shall ensure best value to money, fairness, integrity transparency and effective international competition. In case a consensus cannot be reached, final decision shall rest with the Chief of PPS. Project reviews by this group are made at designated decision points during the running of a project, or as necessary when raised by the Project Manager. This group is consulted by the Project Manager for decisions when PM tolerances (normally in terms of time and budget) have been exceeded.

Based on the approved Annual Work Plan (AWP), the Project Board may review and approve project montly plans when required and authorizes any major deviation from these agreed plans. It is the authority that signs off the completion of the project plan. It ensures that required resources are committed and arbitrates on any conflicts within the project or negotiates a solution to any problems between the project and partner agency (UNRWA) or external bodies. In addition, it approves the appointment and responsibilities of the Project Manager and any delegation of its Project Assurance responsibilities.

Project Manager:

The Project Manager with support from the UNV Programme Associate will have the authority to lead the project implementation, while UNRWA Programme Coordinator (Education) will oversee the project implementation on a day-to-day basis and is responsible for day-to-day management and decision-making for the project. In addition, the Project Manager will ensure that the necessary programming, financial and legal procedures are followed. The Project Manager will also assume the responsibility of liaison / interface with different UNV sections and other partners, to coordinate the implementation and monitoring of the project. The Project Manager's prime responsibility is to ensure that the project procedures follows the results specified in the project document, to the required standard of quality and within the specified constraints of time and cost.

The Project Manager for this project will be the Snr. Portfolio Manager for the Arab States [PT-9] at UNV headquarters.

Project Assurance:

Project Assurance is the responsibility of each Project Board member; however, the role is delegated to the Chief of PPS. The project assurance role supports the Project Board by carrying out objective and independent project oversight and monitoring functions. This role ensures appropriate project management milestones are managed and completed. Project Assurance has to be independent of the Project Manager; therefore, the Project Board cannot delegate any of its assurance responsibilities to the Project Manager.

Project Support:

The Project Support role provides project administration, management and technical support to the Project Manager as required by the needs of the project or Project Manager. The provision of any Project Support on a formal basis is optional. It is necessary to keep Project Support and Project Assurance roles separate in order to maintain the independence of Project Assurance.

The administrative and financial support needed for this project will be supported by a Portfolio Associate for the Arab States Portfolio [PT-9] at UNV headquarters.
