Brief description

The project will help to expand the coverage and improve the regional protected areas system to include tugai ecosystems, which were not adequately represented in the system. This GEF project will also demonstrate new approaches and models for the effective protected areas system management by helping to establish a new multi-zoned protected area and by introducing an efficient enabling environment for sustainable natural resource management and biodiversity conservation in the Autonomous Republic of Karakalpakstan within Uzbekistan. The project will demonstrate more inclusive and more sustainable protected areas management and contribute to strengthening the overall Uzbekistan national system of protected areas.

SECTION I: Elaboration of the Narrative

Part I: Situation Analysis

The overall protected areas system of Uzbekistan covers most of the ecosystems and habitats present in the country. However, in terms of IUCN Category I and II areas (Zapovedniks and National Parks) coverage is inadequate with all ecosystems (except mountains) being badly represented or not represented at all. The globally significant Tugai gallery forests ecosystem is one of the most dramatic examples of such misrepresentation. Moreover, many of the protected areas in the Republic are considered too small to maintain the ecological integrity, particularly in Category I areas. In addition to their small size, many areas are widely dispersed, with no linking corridors and largely surrounded by areas of low biodiversity value, thereby reducing the possibility of maintaining their ecosystem functions via bio-geographical processes. The responsibilities for management of protected areas are distributed between a number of governmental authorities and uncoordinated contributing to a lack of clarity and ad-hoc implementation of policy and planning, duplication of staff and activities, competition and confrontation over control and access to resources, etc. One of the most critical issues remains to be the involvement of local communities into management of protected areas and bringing alternative rural livelihood options to achieve objectives of sustainable development and biodiversity conservation in the long run. Tugai forests, particularly in the Amu Darya delta, have been identified in the National Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan for Uzbekistan as one of the ecosystems requiring urgent conservation measures and as such will be the focus of the current project. For a detailed situation analysis please see the relevant text in Section C of the approved MSP.

Part II: Strategy

The project goal is “conservation of the globally significant biodiversity of the Southern Aral Sea Zone of the Republic of Karakalpakstan through the demonstration of new approaches to the conservation and management of biodiversity and natural resources in and around protected areas”. The project objective is: “The Karakalpakstan system of protected areas is strengthened through the enhanced enabling environment and establishment of a multi-zoned National Park which demonstrates the collaborative conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in Amu Darya Delta and provides lessons and best practices replicable throughout the national protected areas system”. The project will introduce effective conservation and sustainable land use practices in the riverine forest areas of Karakalpakstan, thereby preventing loss of nationally and globally important biodiversity and reduction or reversal of land degradation. The project will also provide a demonstration of appropriate approaches for conservation and sustainable land use which will be applicable to other riverine areas of Uzbekistan and the region as a whole. A new protected area will be established in the Republic of Karakalpakstan that will contribute to strengthening the overall coverage and representativeness of the national protected areas system. The project’s strategic intervention will aim to build capacity within both conservation agencies and natural resource management agencies (water managers, forestry, agriculture, local government, etc.) important for increasing the long-term sustainability of natural resource and protected area management in Karakalpakstan. It will take the important step of testing and demonstrating new and more sustainable use of biodiversity and natural resources in and around the established protected area thereby contributing to its long term viability and also providing crucial replicable models for initiatives possible at other PA’s in the region. In addition to the strategic priority benefits within the Karakalpak Republic the project will generate wider benefits and lessons for the Uzbekistan protected areas system as a whole, particularly in the context of riverine and wetlands protected areas management and sustainability. The detailed description of the planned activities and proposed results of the projects are given in Part I, Section IV of the present document.

Part III: Management Arrangements

The project will be executed in accordance with the NEX modality applicable by UNDP in Uzbekistan. The Implementing Partner (State Committee for Nature Protection of the Republic of Karakalpakstan on behalf of the Council of Ministers of the Republic of Karakalpakstan) will appoint a National Project Coordinator (NPC) who will provide strategic oversight on behalf of the Government. The NPC is the focal point for responsibility and accountability in the responsible national implementing agency for the project. However, the NPC is not remunerative position and thus is not paid from the project budget. It was agreed during the preparation stage that the NPC will be a staff member of the implementing agency at the highest or senior-management level. While the NPC has many duties and responsibilities, his/her primary function is to ensure the provision of the Government contribution and cooperation/guidance and thus the achievement of the project objectives agreed by both UNDP-GEF and the Government.

A Project Steering Committee chaired by the NPC and including representatives of the State Committee for Nature Protection, the Ministry of Agriculture and Water Management (particularly depts. responsible for forestry, water distribution, and relevant land use activities), representatives of each of the relevant rayons (districts), UNDP and other major stakeholders will meet on a regular basis to review project implementation and endorse/approve significant decisions and outputs. In the long term it is expected that the PSC will evolve into a Management Board or some such similar structure for the Amu Darya National Park.

A full time Project Manager (PM) will be employed on the project in Nukus to oversee and ensure the timely implementation of project activities. The Project Manager will have the authority to execute tasks according to the Annual Work Plan approved by the NPC and the UNDP Resident Representative, in accordance with the project document and work-plans approved by the UNDP office. The project manager will be directly responsible for achievement of the project activities and all reporting requirements. He/she will be held accountable for proper use of the project resources in carrying out projects activities. The PM will also be responsible for coordination of the activities with other projects related to successful implementation of the present project. Administratively, s/he will be supported by project support staff, including an Administrative Finance Assistant (AFA) and a driver. Administrative and logistical implementation of the project will be carried out by a recruited Administrative Finance Assistant (AFA) with support from the Business Center of UNDP country office. The tasks and responsibilities of the AFA will include disbursements, procurements, recruitments and other financial management and administrative support according to the approved Annual Work Plan (AWP) and instructions of the Project Manager. At the end of the year at the Annual Project Review meeting, the Project Manager will report to NPC and UNDP on the activities carried out, the successes achieved, the difficulties encountered and the work, which, although approved, could not be carried out. The Project Manager will also be required to assess the situation and indicate to the NPC and UNDP what measures will be taken to overcome the difficulties encountered. Project staff will be recruited according to UNDP rules and regulations. The detailed description of the project structure can be found in organigram in Part II, Section IV of the present document and detailed Terms of References for the core staff are in Part III, Section IV.

A project implementation team will be established in Nukus to manage the major field activities of the project. For this purpose the Government of Karakalpakstan will ensure the provision of suitable office space. The structure of the Project Implementation Unit will be decided on the inception stage.

In order to accord proper acknowledgement to GEF for providing funding, a GEF logo should appear on all relevant GEF project publications, including among others, project hardware and vehicles purchased with GEF funds.
