Brief Description

UNDP Barbados and the OECS has provided support to St. Vincent and the Grenadines in the area of disaster risk reduction and specifically through the national partner, the National Emergency Management Organisation. Based on the work plan of NEMO and priorities established at the national level including implementing the Comprehensive Disaster Management Strategy (2006-2012); now 2014 - 2024 and the Hyogo Framework for Action (2005 -2015), now the Sendai Framework, the focus of the support has been in three specific areas, notably:

- Public Awareness and Education (PAE) in DRR
- Community Resilience
- Enhancing national DRR structures, including in emergency communications, response, post disaster assessments and recovery

This project will build on the areas of support provided by UNDP over the period 2015 to 2016 and will include specific support to the Government following a tropical disturbance which produced severe weather conditions over the Central-Eastern Caribbean islands from Monday November 28 into Tuesday 29 November 2016. Specific to St. Vincent and the Grenadines and as at 30 November 2016, 30 persons were in shelters; 15 houses reported destroyed and 20 damaged; 15 reported cases of landslides; 8 reported damaged bridges; 8 report damaged roads and extensive damage to water systems.

The project will support the emergency response operations in country.
